ETHER'S ANNIVERSARY

While not generally recognized by the people of this country, March 30th was the anniversary of the first use of ether as an anesthetic, which occurred one hundred five years ago in Jefferson, Georgia.

Dr. Crawford W. Long, living in a small village away from any railroad, learned that druggist clerks inhaled ether for their amusement. Experimenting, he discovered that it not only made him unconscious, but insensible to pain. On March 30, 1842, he administered it to James M. Venable, a patient suffering from a tumor in his neck. The tumor was successfully removed and . the patient felt no pain whatever.

While Dr. Long used ether frequently subsequent operations, he lived so far from the centers of population that the report of what he was doing did not become known until 1849. Then there was a dispute as to the authenticity of his use of

The use of ether to prevent pain on the part of patients has done much to promote surgery throughout the world. It has eliminated most of the pain that, prior to its use, accompanied operations. Moreover, it has probably made possible the success of delicate operations which would hardly prove successful if the patient had to writhe in agony.

It is somewhat remarkable that many devout individuals did not approve the use of ether as an anesthetic. These "good peoargued that it was the will of God for people to suffer and that it was wrong for human beings to interfere with the workings of the divine will. The idea seems somewhat silly today when most intelligent people have concluded that men of science, in their discovery of truth, are performing the will of God for the benefits of mankind.

WEALTHY NEW YORK

The wealth of the State of New York can be seen from the fact that individuals and corporations in the Empire State in 1946 paid into the Federal Treasury in income taxes \$7,730,000,000.

This is more than was paid by the six New England States, plus ten States of the South. It is more than that paid by any two States and greater than the combination of the industrial States of Michigan. Massachusetts, New Jersey, North Carolina, Missouri and Texas,

New York has the largest number of people of any State, has the world's largset and richest municipality, has long been the financial capital of this country and now, with the advent of the United Nations, is likely to become the capital of the world organization.

U. S. CAPITAL MOVES OUT

The advocates of high tariff rates constantly assert that these protect the American working man. They say that our labor cannot compete with the low-priced labor of other countries.

It is interesting to observe, however, that American capital, which enjoys the protection of high tariffs, is not adverse to taking advantages of the low-priced la-

· of other countries. This comes to mind from reading a news dispatch that India's first rayon plant, to be constructed near Bombay, will cost \$10,000,000. Similar plants are to be erected in three other Indian cities. American capitalists are behind them.

When the United States, after the first World War, raised its tariff walls to new heights, there was a rush on the part of American industrialists to establish plants in other countries: This means that American capital, protected in this country, can accomplish what American labor is unable to do. Capital takes advantage of the protected market at home and then goes abroad to cash-in on cheap labor there. This process inevitably decreases the worldwide demand for American goods, and means, in effect, less work for American labor.

FACTS ABOUT FARMERS

The economists tell us that the farmer hit his peak of prosperity in 1946 and that the outlook for 1947 involves lower prices.

Nobody knows, not even the farmer, what is in store for agriculture after 1948, when all Government guarantees may be withdrawn. Much depends upon the carryover of the various crops and the condition of world affairs which will largely govern-demands for American crops.

It is very interesting to note that the American farmer has had some good years, but when somebody talks about an income of more than \$14,000,000,000 in 1946, the reader should compare this with the national income of more than \$161,000,000,-000 and recall that more than 26,000,000 Americans live on the nation's farms.

Republican critics of President Roosevelt and "sound money" advocates who shriek in alarm are now vying with each other in forgetting the dangers they asserted arose from the size of the national debt. They are now filling the air for tax reduction and little else.

WHY U. S. OPPOSES REPARATIONS

The Russian demand that Germany pay reparations in the amount of \$10,000,000, 000 over a twenty-year period meets with opposition from the United States and Great Britain because such a plan would mean, in effect, that the Western democracies would pay the reparations bill.

The division of Germany into various occupation zones has resulted in heavy expenses for the United States and Great Britain. The occupying powers have had o support the populations in their zones. Naturally, they are anxious for the Germans under their control to become selfsupporting. When this is possible, the occupying powers will be relieved of making financial contributions.

If the Russian plan is accepted, however, the Germans will be required to pay reparations out of production, which should go to the support of their population. This, as we understand it, is the crux of the opposition of the Western democracies. They naturally believe that the first profit from German production should go to the support of the people now receiving their assistance.

"NOT GOING TO BE PASSED"

Because of the general impression that labor questions had much to do with the result of the election last year, there have been a number of hard-boiled business men talking seriously about repealing the Wagner Act and passing laws to prohibit strikes and put into effect other drastic all-out

It is somewhat to the point that Representative Charles A. Halleck, Majority Leader of the Republican House, recently told the National Automobile Dealers Association that such legislation "simply is not going to be passed" and "there is no sense in talking about it or getting excited over the prospects of its even being serious-

COST OF LIVING CLIMBS

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

BENEFIT RETIRED WORKERS

A change in the Social Security Act that will benefit a number of retired workers was made by the 1946 amendments to the Act, according to an announcement made today by Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Social Security Administration Office in Abilene.

The amendment provides that the retirement payment may now be figured as of the date which will give the highest benefit rate. This provision will be particularly helpful to those workers who waited for some months after retirement before filing their Social Security applications. Any retired worker who thinks that this provision might cause an increase in his payments should get in touch with the nearest Social Security Administration Office at once.

Although this amendment gives added protection to the retired worker, it is still advisable for each worker to contact the Social Security Administration when he becomes 65 years of age and to





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
