H. J. R. No. 11 PROPOSING A CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON NOVEMBER 4, 1930

ON NOVEMEER 4, 1930 Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas. Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 16, which shall read as follows: in Sections 11, 12 and 15 of Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, now belonging to the Uni-versity of Texas shall be subject to taxation for county purposes to the provided they shall be rendered for taxation upon values fixed by the ame extent as lands privately owned; rovided they shall be rendered for axation upon values fixed by the state Tax Board; and providing that he State shall remit annually to each of the counties in which said lands are located an amount equal to the ax imposed upon said land for coun-v purposes."


