## Four Wells Drilling in Borden County

Sinclair Oil and Gas Co. has spudded three of its recently staked outposts to its No. 1 Williams, Ellenburger discovery, in North west Borden county and is rigging up rotary tools at the other.

The concern's No. 1 Pratt about 1 mile west of the discovery, was making hole from 3,121 in alloy drite. About one and half miles north and slightly west of the deep discovery, Sinclair No. 1 Reynolds was below 1200 drilling in redrock.

The Sinclair No. 1 T P Turner 1300 feet east of the discovery is drilling below 500 feet in lime.

Rotary was being rigged up at Sinclair No. 1 Bryan blanking the pay opener 1320 feet to the north.

All of the above tests will drill to 10,000 or more and are near the community of Mesquite, on top the caprock.

## New Water Field Is Tapped Tuesday

As we go to press Tuesday noon the switch was being installed for the electric turbin pump at the Clay's new water well 3 miles east of town. Pipe was laid last week and the 100 horse power pump was installed Saturday. The new water well is rated at 2,000 gallons per minute and is expected to furnish enough water for a town twice as large as our. Cost of this project will run about \$55,000.

## New Moore Road O. K. Is Give By State

In Lynn County the following described roads are designated as FARM TO MARKET ROADS subject to the availability of funds under the terms of Senate Bill No. 237 and subject to the condition that Lynn County will furnish all required right of way free of cost to the State;

From end F. M. 213 at... New Moore north 1 mile and west to the Terre County line, a distance of about 3 1-2 miles.

From F. M. 211 at New Home south 3 miles and east to end of present pavement, a distance of about 3.5 miles.

Upon acceptance of the provisions of this order, by the proper officials of Lynn County the State Highway engineer is directed to proceed with the preparation of plans for construction at an estimated cost of \$65,000 and when right of way and funds are available to proceed with construction and to assume the roads for main tenance upon completion of construction.

# New Taft-Hartley Battle Looms; Solons Ridicule Recession Idea; Dictator Feared in Defense Plan

## TAFT-HARTLEY: Another Try

The administration hadn't given up, despite a humiliating setback in the senate by Taft-Hartley law supporters. It was reported that President Truman's congressional aides were planning another try at repealing the measure, but had reached no decision.

THIS CAME to light after House Speaker Sam Rayburn concluded a conference with the President. The decision on a new repealer effort was to await further conferences with labor committee members in both houses.

While the persistence of the administration might be commendable, the wisdom in any further effort toward a Taft-Hartley repealer was doubtful. A majority of top leaders had conceded there was little hope of getting the bill changed at this session of congress, and all, including administration leaders, were willing to make the question an issue in the 1950 congressional elections.

THE RESULT of the vote on changing the Taft-Hartley labor law was confusing to the average observer of the political scene. If labor had played as important a part as it was conceded in the election of President Truman—and with congressional elections up next year—how could so many senators have found the courage to fly into the face of what might seem certain defeat?

On the other hand, if labor's role in politics is as negligible as others claim, why was the administration pressing so hard for the Taft-Hartley repealer. One thing appeared certain: There were many congressmen sufficiently unimpressed with labor's political importance that they didn't mind going contrary to labor's wishes on the Taft-Hartley issue.

## RECESSION: Ho, Ho, Ho!

With unemployment figures standing at the highest peak in 11 years, and many nationwide organizations and national leaders casting about for a bulwark against economic hazards, congressional leaders were laughing at the idea the nation might be edging into a depression.

THEY had just conferred with President Truman and upon emerging from the conference ridiculed the notion that all might not be as rosy as possible with the nation's economic picture.

If the lawmakers were out on a limb, they were way out, for House Speaker Rayburn and the senate Democratic leader, Scott Lucas, minced no words in expressing their optimism.

"WITH 58 million people employed in industry and 30 million farmers with money to pay for whatever they need, I'll be—If I see how you can call it a recession," Rayburn declared.

Said Lucas: "If it is, it's the most prosperous one we've ever experienced."

MEANWHILE, it was said President Truman was preparing a special economic message for delivery to congress. It was expected to carry recommendations for dealing with declining prices and the unemployment situation.

Out of all this came repetition of the additional-taxes proposal. Asked about that, Rayburn said it had yet to be determined. He did not make it clear whether he meant President Truman is reconsidering his plea for four billion dollars in additional taxes a year, or whether the matter is still up in the air in congress.

## NEW HOMES: More Cash

Buyers planning to finance homes through FHA-insured mortgages may have to make larger down payments from now on.

THE federal housing administration had cautioned its underwriters to consider declining construction costs when appraising houses for insured loans.

The result, the agency said, would be lower mortgages on many new homes. If the builder fails to cut his selling price in line with lower costs, the down payment will be higher.

THE decline in building costs and materials have been noted since late last year, the underwriters were told. Most materials are plentiful. It was said, and production rates of workers in many sections have improved.

## MUNICIPAL INCOME

### Property Tax Declines as Revenue Source

American cities were facing an unpleasant fact—general property taxation as a source of revenue was proving inadequate to meet municipal needs.

The International City Managers' association reported the finding after a survey of municipal-revenue sources. Data was gathered from census returns and from reporting members.

## DEFENSE: Dictator Feared

In nearly all discussions concerning unification of the nation's armed services, one thing stood out—many congressmen feared the possibility of a "military dictator" if framers of a unification bill weren't careful.

THIS feeling was put into words by Georgia's Representative Vinson who proposed several amendments to the pending bill, declaring that he wanted to make sure no military dictator ever arises in the United States. Vinson, a Democrat, is chairman of the house armed services committee.

The amendments he proposed would take the armed forces out from beyond the recently enacted government reorganization law, and put them beyond a shuffling by President Truman; put a civilian chairman over the joint chiefs of staff, a body which includes the highest officers of the army, navy and air force, and fix the membership of the national security council by law, requiring that other members be subject to approval by the senate.

THESE AMENDMENTS were proposed to a unification bill which already has passed the senate. The measure is one which would increase the direct authority of the secretary of defense over the armed forces.

Louis Johnson, who holds that post, has told the house committee he needs that authority to make the 1947 unification act work. He pledged to save over a billion dollars a year in operation of the military services if the bill were passed, and a civilian manager put in charge.

## INTELLECT: Women's Best?

If two Indiana university professors are to be believed, then the male of the species must face an unpleasant fact—namely, that girls (or women) can reason better than boys (or men).

THE professional gentlemen claimed, and cited figures for proof, that the female is the superior of the male in the reasoning department, and this despite ten million jokes, books, philosophical discourses and general experience to the contrary.

The professors say unequivocally that given a set of circumstances, the lassies can come up with more logical answers than boys can do. These gentlemen are Dr. William H. Fox and Prof. Nicholas A. Fattu of the research division of Indiana university's school of education.

They made the tests in two high schools, one in a city of 11,000 in north central Indiana, and the other in a consolidated rural school near Indianapolis.

TO USE the professors' own words in the report:

"Scores on the interpretation of date test, seeking to establish their relationship to measures of achievement, personality and interest, found no differentiation... but there was a clear cut advantage for girls in both schools in ability to reason, to see relationships, to make comparisons and to suspend judgment until pertinent facts are collected."

To which many a male will counter: Too bad they seem to lose those faculties when they grow up.

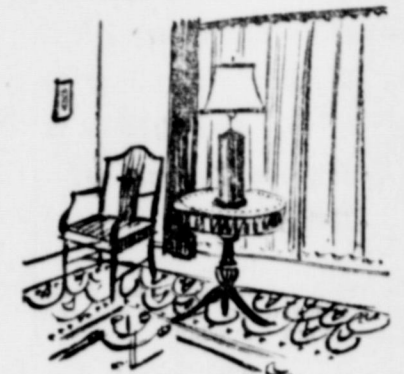

Good period patterns are frequently available for period rooms, and these are fairly easy to select.

### Wife Support—Double Trouble

#### May a Man be Forced To Support Two Wives At the Same Time?

A young couple were divorced, and the wife was granted a monthly sum as alimony. After a few years, the man remarried. Finding it difficult to support both wives, he asked the court to relieve him of his alimony payments. However,



when it appeared that the first wife had no other source of income, the court ruled that the husband must continue making the payment. The judge said: "A man may not shun the marital obligations undertaken in one relationship by contracting others!"

#### Is a Hospital to Blame For Letting a Smallpox Patient Escape?

A man caught smallpox and was confined to a special wing of a private hospital on the outskirts of town. One night the man's nurse fell asleep on the job, and the delirious patient wandered out into the fields. He finally was picked up at a farmhouse—but not until he had passed the dread disease on to the farmer. After the farmer had recovered, he sued the hospital for damages. The hospital protested that it wasn't responsible for the acts of a delirious patient, but the court disagreed and granted the farmers claim. The judge said the hospital was just as much to blame as a circus would be for letting a vicious animal loose on the streets!

#### May a Chef Collect Compensation if Assaulted By the Dishwasher?

During the breakfast rush, a restaurant chef became annoyed by a mounting stack of dirty dishes. He told the dishwasher to move them out of his way, but the latter was slow to comply. When the chef grew more insistent, the dishwasher became very angry and finally gave his tormentor a jolting uppercut to the jaw. The chef was injured, and put in a claim for workmen's compensation. At the hearing the restaurant owner opposed the claim, saying that the dispute was purely a personal matter between the two employees. But the court granted the chef an award.

#### Do Barmaids Have the Same Rights as Bartenders?

The owner of a barroom decided to economize by having his wife help him at the bar. As it happened, there was a local law prohibiting the employment of women to serve liquor. Somebody reported the matter to the police—and the man was arrested. At the trial, he



insisted that the law was unconstitutional because it discriminated against women for no good reason. If men can serve whiskey, he demanded, why can't women? But the court saw things differently and found the man guilty as charged. The judge pointed out that the law was designed to prevent "the hilarity and disturbance so often caused by the combination of wine, women, and song!"

### New Start Is Always Available

One of the blessed miracles of life is that we can always make a fresh start.

In moments of depression, of course, that is exactly what you feel you cannot do. That's one reason why they are moments of depression.

But the truth is that no matter how hopelessly tangled, how fixed and unchangeable the circumstances in which you find yourself may be, there is always the divine right to start all over again.

You begin this process by a little clear thinking. You ask yourself "what do I want my life and myself to be, and what is the first step toward realizing that ideal?" You may not be able to see the outcome, or indeed even the second step, but the first is there before you if you can recognize it.

#### Considers Suicide

Take the case of Lauranna Jackson, for example. Lauranna's affairs have become so miserably unsatisfactory that she cannot see any way out—except suicide, and she says she hasn't the courage to try that.

"I am 26, healthy, good looking and smart enough to have kept several good jobs at different times," says Lauranna's long letter. My husband, cheated by his partner and unlucky in investments, is broken in health and spirits and may have to retire.

#### Not Happy With Mother

"Sharon has visited us, but is not happy here, and assures me that she is well treated in her grandmother's comfortable home. And the most unwelcome prospect of another baby's arrival has just about wrecked my nerves. I find myself faced with the prospect of stopping work—stopping paid work, that is—but working as an actual servant in this inharmonious household, and replacing my own child with two utterly undisciplined little girls. Moreover, presently there will be the exacting care of a small baby when our finances are unable to stand the strain of present expenses.

What can I do to extricate myself from this slough of despondency, bad nights, quick temper, anxiety, and the dread of fresh responsibilities when my baby is born? There must be a solution, I'm still sane enough to believe that. For I feel

as if I could not stand this situation any longer."

Here is one more case of an impulsive woman, herself undisciplined, who builds up trouble through long years, and expects to escape from the result of her actions in a matter of days or weeks.

Trouble has to be unravelled the way knitting does. You have to go right back to the wrong stitch and start over from there. Lauranna's predicament wouldn't seem trouble at all to half the women of the world. Thousands of divorced aged husbands have been helped along by a wife's courageous courage in the rebuilding of fortune. This is an everyday story with the right man and woman.

New babies arrive every day to the hundred, all over the big world under circumstances infinitely more distressing than these. Small girls are trained to be gentle and useful under the influence of a good example.

And making her home a place of harmony and interest is the quietest and the unflinching way for Lauranna to lure little Sharon back into it.

The important problem in the picture is Lauranna herself. She's been shirking all along the line.

**KEEPING HEALTHY**  
**Self-Demand Infant Feeding**

By Dr. James W. Barton

ONE OF THE jokes commonly current is that Mrs. Smith "must" have perfect children because she brings them up by the book. As a matter of fact this bringing up by the book has saved the lives of thousands of children for, whereas, before mothers were taught proper infant feeding, about three in every 10 children died at birth or during the first year. Today only about one in 20 dies during this period.

The first great gain in extending the life span began with the saving of the lives of children by proper feeding during their first two years.

In the Canadian Medical Association Journal, Dr. C. K. Rowan, Ottawa, states what we all seem to forget is that the child has an emotional life as well as just the physical, and needs more than food to keep him healthy and happy. The feeding of infants at intervals neglects the emotional side of the child's life. Modern psychiatry feels that peace and physical pleasure make a more sound foundation for a stable personality than does too early exposure to strict discipline and denial.

The infant is born with three needs—satisfaction of hunger, comfort, affection. Food should be given when it needs it and not thrust upon it when it doesn't need it. "When the hunger rhythm or time arrives and the infant is given food, the amount of crying by the child is greatly reduced, which makes life easier for the mother."

Your family doctor knows, as do most mothers, that infants must do a certain amount of crying to stretch and strengthen the lungs, so that if well fed and comfortable, a little crying will do no harm.

Dr. Rowan-Leag points out that some infants because of their makeup or personality, need to be fed at other than the regular four hours, and if they are hungry at three hour intervals and not at four hours, the mother should tell this to her doctor or children's specialist, who will make the necessary adjustments as to amount of food and intervals between feedings.

While infant feeding is the most important part in building a healthy infant, comfort and affection closely follow.

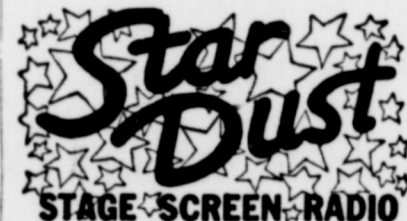

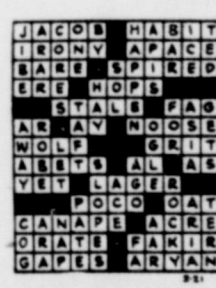

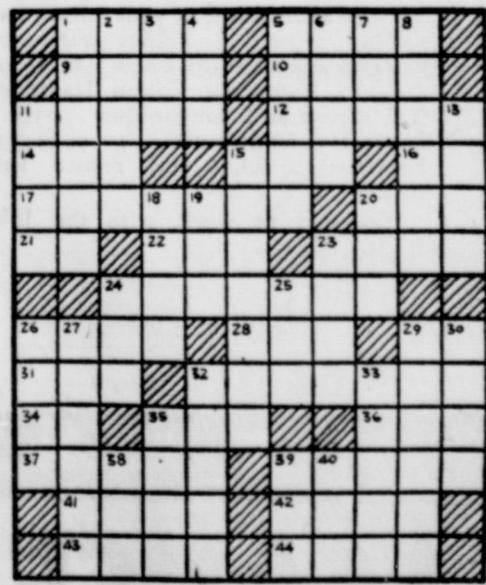

## 41 Per Cent of Land In U. S. in Herbage

**Grass Top Resource, Cattlemen Assert**  
 Grass is one of the greatest resources of this nation. In the United States there are approximately 779 million acres of land which will grow nothing but hay, grass and other herbage unfit for human consumption.

This great acreage represents 41 per cent of the total land of the nation. About 9 per cent of the lands in the United States are plowable but are used also to produce pasture, hay or forage crops. It can be concluded, therefore, that about 50 per cent of the United States would not be used if it were not for meat animals.



This little fellow, obviously so well-started in life, is symbolic of what good pasture can mean to cattle and just how much cattle depend on grass. In the United States there are approximately 779 million acres of land which cannot grow anything but hay, grass and other herbage.

Of the total feeds consumed by beef cattle 78.7 per cent is grass, hay and dry roughage. A minimum of grain is needed to bring feeder steers from 700 pounds to 1,000 pounds when the principal part of the ration is made up of hay, ensilage or other roughage.

The process of producing beef cattle normally involves the following steps:

1. The purebred operator who produces the sires and females which are the foundation of beef animal production. This branch of the cattle industry is one that requires heavy investment and efficiency in management.
2. The commercial breeder who produces the calves which are the offspring of commercial herds of female and purebred sires.
3. The pasture cattleman who grows the animal from the weaning or yearling stage to two years old, taking his profit from the poundage gained on grass and hay.
4. The feeder who "finishes" the animal from grass stage to slaughter condition, disposing of a large percentage of roughage.



## Flatter Summer Meals With Properly Cooked, Attractive Vegetables

WHEN the thermometer speeds into the nineties, every homemaker worries about meals and family appetites. Even though appetites appear robust on picnics, they are apt to seem on the slim side for a meal in the family dining room.

Is there a certain remedy for the waning appetite amidst the warring heat of hot summer days? Yes, certainly, there are several sure-fire ways of coaxing the family into eating what they should. One of the best ways is to serve attractive vegetables which are so plentiful for they add zip, in the form of vitamins and minerals, into a scanty diet.

Vegetables add color, and consequent interest, to the family dinner table with their glorious greens, reds and orange yellows. Who could ask for a better artist's palette with which to decorate the mealtime scene?

Serve vegetables fresh, whenever possible since this saves food value. When they are cooked, however, use only a small amount of water, season carefully, but not heavily, and cook until tender. Vegetables are best if they have some of their natural crisp texture, even though cooked.

Seasonings should be mild so that you don't mask the delicious natural flavors and thus jade the appetite further. You may add some of the nice sauces for variety, however, and thus create interest that might not otherwise be present.

YOU CAN'T BEAT a salad bowl of summer vegetables, especially when there's a tasty dressing to go along with it. Here's a suggestion with a delightful dressing seasoned with blue cheese and anchovies:

### \*Summer Salad Bowl (Serves 6-8)

- 2 cups fresh spinach leaves
- 1 small head lettuce
- 2 cups shredded green cabbage
- 1 bunch watercress
- Fresh dill
- Tarragon
- 1 cup diced celery and tops
- 1/2 cup green pepper rings
- 1 cup crumbled blue cheese
- 1/2 cup French dressing
- 1 2-ounce can anchovy fillets

Rub salad bowl with cut clove of garlic. Break spinach and lettuce into bite-sized pieces in the salad bowl. Add cabbage and watercress; sprinkle with the herbs, fresh dill and tarragon. Add celery and green pepper. Sprinkle with cheese. Chill. Just before serving add French dressing and anchovy fillets. Toss lightly.

### Chinese Salad (Serves 4-6)

- 2 cups canned bean sprouts, drained
- 1/2 cup diced celery
- 1 medium cucumber, sliced thin
- 1 green pepper, minced
- 2 tomatoes, cut in small cubes
- French dressing
- Minced chives

Combine all vegetables and toss



Treat fresh vegetables kindly and you'll be well rewarded for their acceptance at meals. New potatoes, quick cooked in their skins, are tender and delicious when teamed with cheese-crusted tomatoes and plump, green asparagus spears with a nippy sauce.

### LYNN CHAMBERS: Keep Meals Cool When Thermometer Soars

Refreshing fruit platters come in for a big bid during summer. Place cherries and grapes in the center of your largest, coolest platter. Surround with a mound of each of the following: peach halves with a cluster of blueberries in the center; cantaloupe edges, pineapple chunks mixed with halved strawberries, honeydew melon wedges and watermelon triangles.



Vegetables, cooked or fresh, chilled and seasoned, arranged attractively on a salad platter add appetite appeal to the main course. Arrange mounds of the small vegetables like corn kernels, green lima beans or peas with strips of carrots, asparagus or celery on lettuce and pass with a tangy dressing.

with French dressing, to which may have been added one teaspoon of soy sauce, if desired. Refrigerate the salad ingredients for one hour. Drain off extra dressing and serve with mayonnaise. Sprinkle top with minced chives before serving.

HERE'S an excellent way to prepare and serve asparagus:

- Asparagus with Sour Cream Sauce (Serves 6)
- 2 pounds asparagus spears
- 1/2 cup thick sour cream
- 1/2 cup drained horseradish
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika

Cook asparagus in a small amount of boiling, salted water until tender, about 25 minutes; drain. Meanwhile, make sauce by beating the sour cream slightly, add remaining ingredients and blend thoroughly. Serve with cooked asparagus spears.

- Broiled Tomatoes (Serves 6)
- 3 medium tomatoes, cut in halves
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup grated American cheese

Season each tomato half with salt and pepper. Blend crumbs and cheese and sprinkle on each tomato half. Arrange in a baking pan and bake in a moderate (375°) oven for 15 minutes, or broil 8-10 minutes under low heat.

A GOOD main dish to serve at home or to tote to a picnic uses corn and tomatoes, seasoned beautifully with bacon, green pepper and a cheese topping.

### Corn-Tomato Casserole (Serves 6)

- 4 strips bacon, diced
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/4 cup minced green pepper
- 2 1/2 cups chopped tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 2 1/2 cups corn, cut from cob, or canned corn
- 1/2 cup dry bread crumbs
- 1/2 cup grated cheese

Fry bacon in a skillet until crisp. Place in a 1 1/2 quart casserole. Add onion and green pepper to bacon fat and cook until tender. Add tomatoes, sugar and seasonings. Simmer for 15 minutes. Stir in corn. Cook for eight minutes, if using uncooked corn. Place all mixture from skillet into the casserole. Top with bread crumbs, then with cheese, and bake, uncovered, in a moderate (350°) oven for 30 minutes.

Don't discard cold, fried trout. Serve it on a bed of watercress or lettuce and pass with sour cream in which are floating thin slices of cucumber. Serve with a lemon wedge.

Lamb chops take well to barbecue sauce and broil quickly to keep your kitchen cool. Serve with a fruit garnish of pineapple, banana half and grapefruit segments. Chilled soups are ideal for starting off the meal with proper spirit. You might try jellied consommé or icy cold cream vichyssoise.

## Right With God

Lesson for July 24, 1949

"GET RIGHT with God" is an expression which has been sometimes used by people. It is not a coarse or cheap idea. It is the most important thing you can do. Think what it means to be wrong with God! That means to be out of harmony with his will, going "across the grain of reality" as the old Greeks used to say. To be wrong with God means to be a rebel against reality, to have the power of the universe working against you, and so to be headed for sure destruction. Wrong with God, you cannot win. Right with God, you cannot lose. To be right with God means to be in line with the purpose that runs through all things; it means in the simple language of the Bible, to live as a child of God.

Mule or Man? THERE are two ways in which a man can come into line, so to speak, with God. One is by being whipped into it, and the other is by a free act of will. The poet of the 32nd Psalm begs his readers not to be like mules or colts (Ps. 32:9). These animals can be broken and controlled by their masters. But they do not understand what is going on, and if left to themselves they would never serve.

They have to be caught, harassed and driven. But God does not want to treat human beings like that. Getting right with God is not a business of getting into harness, being beaten into walking on the right road.

That is not God's way. He pleads with us through his inspired poet: Be not as mules—be men!

### Facing Up to Yourself

THE short good Bible word for being wrong with God is Sin. The very first step toward being right with God is to see yourself as you are. No one ever went to a doctor till he at least suspected he was sick. No one ever went to school of his own accord who thought he knew everything. And no one will come to God who thinks he is as good as he needs to be. When life goes hard with us, when everything about our life seems twisted and rotten, we make all sorts of excuses for ourselves, we lay the blame on our parents or our friends or the social and economic system in which we live (doubtless all these have a share in creating our troubles), but we hate to look at ourselves in the mirror of truth.

This comes first: recognizing our own wrongness, not just weakness but wrongness. When we reach the point where we can say with the Psalmist, "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me," then we are on the right road.

### "Hide Thy Face"

THERE are two things we never hear about in the Bible. One is that God never forgave anyone who did not repent, and the other is that he refused to forgive any one who did repent. But repentance is not merely regretting that a wrong was done; still less regretting being caught; Repentance, the kind the Bible describes (as in these Psalms for example), means a complete change of attitude, it means coming over on God's side and seeing sin the way he sees it, seeing life the way he sees it.

God's forgiveness is not of the grudging, remembering, reminding kind. But condoning and forgiving are still a world apart. Condoning means saving in effect. It is all right, it makes no difference, you can go on sinning for all I care.

Some human "forgiveness" may be like that, but not God's. His forgiveness is based on real repentance, and the aim of it is to save the sinner from his sin.

### Plenteous in Mercy

THE Psalmists saw clearly what kind of God we have. He is not like the holder of a mortgage waiting till the first time some payment is deferred gives him a chance to pounce down and evict his tenant. We are not criminals against whom God is a prosecuting attorney, trying to pile up evidence against us. "If thou shouldst mark iniquities, who shall stand?" We are children, lost and wandering children, rebellious and disobedient children, but still children; and God holds open the door of mercy.

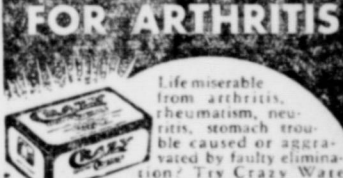
