Fly Control Program Is Urged

Early spring is the best time for a community to start a fly control program, declared Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. That is before the fly population has a chance to multiply. It is estimated that one pair of flies, under favorable conditions, could have countless ancestors before winter.

Every time you kill a fly early in the season, and destroy breeding places, you stop whole colonies of flies before they can start. The most effective way of preventing swarms of flies is to destroy or make inaccessible to flies the organic material which attract flies by their odors, and which are essential to them as food and breeding places.

Individual householders should make it their responsibility to clean up their own back yards. Garbage cans should have a tight fitting lid and they should be leak-proof. Inadequate facilities for storage of garbage and refuse usually result in widespread fly breeding.

Large containers produce odor that attract a large number of flies. Good window screens will do a lot to keep flies out of buildings, thereby protecting food from contamination by flyborne disease organisms.

There is no substitute for good sanitation in fly control. Every spot in town must be cleaned of garbage and trash. If a few dirty places are left swarms of flies will breed. A neglected stable on the edge of town will furnish a plague of flies for the entire neighborhood.

After garbage and trash have been removed, insecticides will help to reduce the fly population in local spots. It is temporary protection, however, and should be regarded only as supplemental or emergency means of control. Insecticide will be effective only if sanitary conditions are maintained throughout the summer.

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q- My daughter and I are receiving VA compensation payments because of the death of my husband, a world war I veteran. My daughter is past 18 years of age, but she is attending a school approved by VA. Will the compensation payments go on during her summer vacation? She intends to continue school in the fall.

A- Yes. The payments may continue throughout the summer, so long as your daughter resumes her studies after the vacation period has ended.

Q- My wife and I are both World War II veterans. Is it possible for us to combine our GI loan benefits to buy a house?

A- Yes. However the total amount that VA will guarantee is 60 percent of the loan. Also, the maximum guaranty may not exceed \$15,000 which represents the combined maximum guarantees you and your wife would be entitled to, individually.

Q- I am a paralyzed veteran, eligible for a \$10,000 VA grant for the construction of a "wheelchair home". Do I have to buy plans and specifications for the house?

A- No. These may be furnished without cost to veterans eligible for the VA grant, but they must meet the approval of VA.

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Clean Up To Fight Polio
 A long-range battle plan against infantile paralysis was outlined Wednesday by the State Health Department of Health.
 State Health Officer Geo. W. Cox recommended these eight points of action in combating the disease.
 1. Spot spray insects breeding places after they have cleaned up and destroyed spraying indiscriminately might kill a few insects on the wing, but it won't do the job. It might kill valuable plants and create a false sense of security.
 2. Get rid of animal shelters in



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urban areas. They cannot be kept clean and consequently create a health hazard as fly breeders.
 3. Get rid of dump piles, tin cans, old tires, and accumulated debris which breed flies and mosquitoes and provide harborage for rats.
 4. Provide a properly operation sewerage system and get rid of all surface toilets. Dr. Cox believes surface toilets constitute one of the major health hazards facing Texas.
 5. Provide a source of pure water.
 6. Protect food supplies in wholesale houses, retail shops, and in private homes.
 7. Make regular inspections of all premises to see that no possibility exists for fly breeding. If you have flies, someone is maintaining a breeding spot.
 8. Garbage should be placed in tight garbage cans until time of disposal. Tubs, boxes, lidless garbage cans, etc., are of no value.
 He urged each home owner to This will help protect you and your neighbor.

Veterans Questions And Answers

Q- If I take on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill, will my monthly GI allowance be for the same amount, throughout my training course?
 A- No. Under the law, your allowance will be reduced at four-month intervals, as your training progresses.
 Q- Both my wife and I are world War II veterans. I used my GI loan entitlement to buy a house. Now we want to sell, and buy a larger house. Could my wife use her entitlement for a GI loan for the second house?
 A- Yes. Both you and your wife are individually entitled would not prevent your wife from using hers.
 Q- I have just been awarded a disability compensation rating by the VA, but I think I should be entitled to a higher rating. I plan to appeal. Is there any time limit on filing my appeal?
 A- Yes. You must appeal to VA's Board of Veterans Appeals within one year from date V A mailed you the notice of your original rating.
 Q- I have a permanent plan of Nat

ional Service Life Insurance policy is it possible to exchange it for a term insurance policy for the same amount?
 A- No. Permanent plan policies may not be exchanged for term policies under V A regulations.

Secretary of State Howard Carney has announced that he will reappoint all persons who now hold Notary Public Commissions and that all such persons must qualify by filing an oath and bond with the County Clerk of their residence between June 1 and June 10th of this year. The law specifically requires County Clerks to approve Notary bonds and individuals should not send money or requests for commissions direct to the Secretary of State. All Notary matters can only be received by the Secretary of State after the County Clerk acts thereon.
