

CHANGES MADE IN S. S. LAW TO BENEFIT MANY

The 1960 amendments to the social security law reduce by about one-third the length of time a person has to work under social security to become insured for the payment of benefits to himse f and

Some 400,000 people are now eligible for cash benefits because of this change in the law, including many wives, widows, dependent husbands and widowers already at or beyond the retirement age, and minor children of deceased workers. First payments to newly eligible persons will be for the month of October, 1960.

Under the new rule, persons eaching retirement age (65 for reaching retirement age (65 for men, 62 for women) this year need only about 3 years of work under social security instead of the 4 1-2 to 5 years required by the old law If you reach retirement age any time next year, you will need to have worked under social security for only 3 1-4 years instead of the 5 to 5 1-4 years required before the change in the law. There is, how-ever a minimum requirement of a year and half of work under social security without which no benefits

can become payable.

There are a number of people in Lynn. Borden and Dawson counties who will now be able to get monthpayments as a result of this

The change in law also provides monthly benefits are now rayable to all children under age 18 whose fathers are deceased, provid ing he was insured, regardless of whether or not the minor child is living with and chiefly supported by a stepfather. Under the old law pendency on the step father pre vented payment on the natural father's earning record.

Naturalized Citizen -That's Our Santa

Santa Claus as Americans know him is a naturalized American citi-zen, and as such is America's contribution to the Christmas legend. That's the opinion of Dr. Gustav O. Arlt of the department of Germanic languages on the Los Angeles campus of the University of California.

"The Norwegians who settled early in America brought the first version of the modern Santa Claus, who in Europe had been known as St. Nicholas, but never adequately personally described," said Dr.

"When the American Clement Moore described the jolly, rotund gentleman in minute detail in his poem "Twas The Night Before Christmas," he assumed the proportion of living legend and thus became an integral part of Christian legend and folklore," the professor stated.

Archaeologists' Findings **Bear Out Bible Stories**

Archaeologists' findings ofttimes serve to further establish the authenticity of the story of Jesus. Only recently a group discovered the name of Jesus, carved before 70 A.D. and perhaps by an eyewitness to the crucifixion, among inscriptions on 11 early Christian burial urns found in a cave on the Jerusalem-Bethlehem road.

The urns may provide the "oldest archaeological record of Christianity" and an historical confirmation of the trial and crucifixion of Christ, the archaeologists said.

A sect of Hebrews, who followed Jesus, denounced Pontius Pilate and mourned the crucifixion of their leader, was believed to have left the writings on the urns in the

The Hebrew and Aramic inscriptions contained common names like Mirian, Simeon, and Matti. The Greek inscriptions and symbols beside them contained references to Christianity and, it seems probable,

"Don'ts" On Tree Decorations -0-

Don't get alarmed if the kids eat a few icicles off the Christmas tree this year. It is true that they might contain 10 percent lead but in their metalic form they are practically insoluable and therefore

poorly absorbed.

But if little Johnny inhales or swallows the fluid from a bubbling Christmas tree light it could be disastrous. The fluid is made of methylene chloride and is lethal in ertain dosages.

This word comes from the National Clearinghouse for Poison Control Centers, the final authority on matters of this sort. Clearinghouse of-ficials say, and Texas health authorities agree, that there are more than the usual hazards to life and health around the American home

at Christmas. Many items, designed for gaiety, can put a damper on the festivities of the season by killing or sickening the unwary. Holly, for example is widely used in Christmas decorations. Its berries are toxic when eaten, the clearinghouse reports. Mistletoe berries are also said to be dangerous.

Fireplace colors are made of metallic salts. When thrown into a fire they create multi - colored flames. Children have been made serious-ly ill after eating the salts.

It isn't the snow but the gas propellant which makes snow spraydangerous. The snow is made of harmless plastic and fatty acids, but pressurizing gases can be toxic if inhaled in sufficient quan-Fortunately the gas evaportity. ates after the snow is sprayed, so

there is no residual effect.
Those smoke pellets for toy
trains, while not recommended for
a steady diet, are probably not dangerous either, since it is unlikely a youngster could eat enough to poison him.



Your Poinsettia Will Bloom Next Christmas

THE POINSETTIA has long been a popular Christmas plant out probably few people have given much thought to the fact that it does come into bloom each year only at this season.

The poinsettia is one of a group of plants known as short day plants because it will bloom only in the season of the year with short day length periods, preferably 10 hours or less. That is why it is always in bloom during the Christmas season and not during the summer. It could be prevented from blooming now by lengthening the daylight period to 15 hours by means of artificial lights.

Flower growers have learned how to bring garden chrysanthemums into bloom any month of the year by using shading cloth to shorten the days and artificial lights to lengthen the days. The chrysanthemum is also a short day plant.

How can one keep a poinsettia plant until next season? After its usefulness is over, place it in the basement or some dry place where it will not freeze. Do not water it, or at least very little, and let the soil dry up. Next May bring the plant out, cut the stem back about two-thirds, wash the old soil off the roots and re-pot in new soil.

Bay and Rosemary Christmas Tradition

been represented among our Christmas plants from time immemorial. An ancient writer says: "Rosemarie and Baies that are most faire were stuck about the houses and the churches at the lime of Christmas."

According to tradition it was the bay tree, with its lance-like leaves and purple berries, that sheltered the holy family during a thunderstorm. Accordingly it was believed that lightning will never strike a bay tree.

The association of the rosemary plant with Christmas also goes back to the early childhood of our Lord, namely to the flight into Egypt to escape the wrath and jealousy of King Herod. Its branches are said to have held the little garments of the Christ-Child that were placed upon them by the Virgin Mother. Originally, its flowers were supposed to have been white, but the plant changed the color of its blossoms to lavendar serve as Mary's cloak.

Make sure the cotton planting seed which you store on the farm doesn't become infested with insects which can severly damage the seed between now and planting time next spring. Extension Entomologist C. F. Garner and Fred Elliott, cotton specialist, suggest the local county agent be contacted for information on seed treatment.



Yule Tree Business Figured in Millions

CHRISTMAS TREES are a multimillion dollar business. Throughout the nation, some 18 million trees are supplied to the holiday demand. Prices range from \$1 to \$5, and that adds up to real money.

A Christmas tree, in the lake states, is usually a balsam or a spruce. The same is true in New England and the Appalachian section. Elsewhere in the country, virtually all kinds of evergreens are used.

The lodgepole pine and Douglas fir are frequently used in Colorado. On the Pacific coast, it is principally Douglas fir.

In Matyland, Virginia and Washington, D. C., a scrub pine takes a trimming.

In other localities, white pine,

southern pine, hemlock, red and white cedar and redwood are used. The business of harvesting this annual crop begins in the fall, when cutters go into the woods after trees. It continues as truckers bring huge loads to metropoli-

tan markets.

Many land owners manage their swamps to make them yield a crop of trees year after year. Thinning operations are another source of

Yule trees.

Farmers have discovered that they can get a cash crop from eroded acres by harvesting Christmas trees 10 or 15 years after they are planted.

Its beautiful flaming ster is one of the favorite flowers of the Christmas season, and its use as an indoor decoration is universal.

Legends of Holly

Many beliefs are connected with the Christmas holly:

Legends relate that the crown of thorns was plaited from the holly, the white berries turning red like drops of blood aft-

er the crucifixion.

Christmas Trees Can Be Put to Many Uses After New Year's

There are a number of things you can do with your Christmas tree after New Year's besides burning it.

If it is a fir, for instance, it can be anchored in the back yard—perhaps in a corner of the garden—and used as a bird feeder the remainder of the winter. Pieces of suet and little feed bags may be tied to the branches. A container of water should be placed beneath the tree and kept filled so the birds will have a drink every day.

Or, cut off the branches and place them, curved ends up, over flower beds when the ground is exposed. An evergreen mulch helps prevent the soil from heaving dur-



ing alternate freezes and thaws. Long branches may be built into little lean-tos to protect tender shrubs from sun scald.

The needles of a Christmas tree ean be sprinkled beneath acidloving plants such as laurel, andromeds, rhododendron and blueberries.

If the needles on the tree are still firm, use the branches in an eutdoor windowbox. Moisten the soil in the box. Then push the cut ends of the branches down to the bottom and tamp the soil firm around them. This will generally give you greenery all winter.

If you must burn your Christmas tree, don't toss it into a fire-place. Cut off the branches and

burn them safely one by one.

And remember, a Christmas
tree tossed into the street can become a fire hazard if playful children pick it up and make a bonare of it in a vacant lot.



When you see the Christmas seal do you ever wonder how it started? It was born in Denmark, home of the fairy tales of Hans Christian Anderson.

Einar Holboell, a Copenhagen postal clerk, was sorting mail one snowy afternoon before Christmas, 1903, when he thought of the idea of a penny stamp to swell a fund for children's hospitals. Authorized by King Christian,

the first Christian seals were sold in Copenhagen in 1904.

Holboell's scheme outgrew his wildest imaginings, for before his death in 1927, he lived to see it spread to 45 countries.

The seals found their way to America on letters and packages and first attracted the attention of Jacob Riis who wrote an article about them Few people, however, were interested in the idea.

Then, in the autumn of 1907. Emily Bissell, a public health worker, concerned about the fate of a small sanatorium, recalled th article and sat down to sketch America's first Christmas seal, a wreath of holly encircling the words "Merry Christmas."

With 50,000 stamps printed and nowhere to sell them, Miss Bissell at last enlisted the aid of a columnist on a Philadelphia newspaper. The idea caught and within a few weeks \$3,000 was collected.

The first nation-wide sale was held the following year and was backed by newspapers all over the country, religious and civic groups, and sponsored by the American Red Cross and the National Tubercuio

EVERY AVERAGE American home will have a Christmas tree this year. Traditional and symbolic as the trees are, they present a great fire hazard, and should be carefully watched.

Remember that when you bring a tree into the house it is going to dry up. A freshly-cut tree will not take fire any easier than the evergreen trees growing outside, but the hazard increases by the hour. For this reason, it is not wise to put up the tree too early before Christmas day or to leave it too long after the 25th. Trees of all kind will become highly inflam-mable at the end of a week.

Families, clubs, churches or or-ganizations that wish to keep their trees up longer than a week should take special safeguards to keep it reasonably safe.

The tree can be kept fresh by setting it up in a pan of water. Cut off the base of the tree at an angle at least one inch above the original cut and keep it standing in water during the entire period it remains in the house. It may be necessary to add water from time to time to keep the water level above the out.

Place the tree well away from stoves, radiators, and other sources of heat. When you smoke, stay away from the tree. Also be sure that the tree is secured in such a way that it cannot fall. Do not put it near a doorway where it might block an avenue of escape, should a fire occur.

Why You Hang Holly at Yuletide

CREDIT THE PAGAN Druids for inspiring one of the nice Christmas customs - decorating with helly. The traditional holly for the helidays is widely believed to have had its origin in the Druid practice of bringing holly sprigs indoors. The Druids woodland spirits lived in the holly.

Indoors, holly gave the spirits a nice warm place in winter. Be-sides, the lush green holly and the contrast of its red berries provided beauty that could be revered by men when the sacred oaks were shorn of their foliage.

The early Christian church frowned on such pagan customs and tried to stamp them out. In due time, however, it was felt that some of the customs could be adapted to the new Christmas conception.

Some beautiful legends associate the holly with Christ. In fact, it is often called the Christ thorn. One legend depicts the leaf spines as the crown of thorns; the red berries as the sins of the world and the blood of Christ. Another credits holly with first springing up from the footsteps of Christ. The plant is said to remain green all winter as a reward for once hiding Christ from his pursuers.

The impact of the holly on the Christmas celebration is evidenced in the traditional holiday colors, green and red. The Druids weren't the only people of old who thought the holly was something special. Pliny, the great Roman historian, insisted holly blossoms caused water to freeze. Also, that holly thrown at any wild beast would make it lie down tamely next to



Contracts Are Important

At this time of year, many landlords and tenants are thinking a-bout farm rental arrangements for While some operate from year to year on the basis of ver-bal agreements regulated largely by local custom, written leases are better and may save disagreement and hard feelings between the part-

Farming is a business and should be conducted in a businesslike man-ner for best success. Rental con-tracts involve a full year's work by the tenant and possibly thousands of dollars for both parties. A few dollars spent on a properly drawn lease is good business economy. A farm lease is not a simple pap-

er. Printed lease forms often turn out to be traps if not understood, or if not properly executed. A farmer-tenant contract is intricant and of such importance to both parties concerned that amateur draftman-

ship is risky
Fixing of cash rent or designating the length of term are relatively simple. Yet, even in these matters, ambiguity or incomplete-ness can cause bitter disputes and expensive lawsuits.

A loosely drawn property des-cription may have consequences entirely unintended by either land lord or tenant. Where rent is to be based on acreage, an accurate des-cription is doubly important. In additor, there are legal rules

to substitute for some ominisions in written leases. For example, a holdover by the tenant may auto-matically renew the contract if the lease is silent on the subject. It is as important to know the results of omissions as to know the courts

interpretation of the language used.

There are many matters which should be covered by a properly drawn lease. For instance, if a tenant is to farm on a share basis, care should be taken to define what expenses are to be paid by the parties as well as what shares are to be taken out. A lease should cov-er such things as who is to make repairs, what land is to be cropped wheather the tenant can cut timber wheather loss of a building by fire or other cause frees the tenant, or wheather the landlord mush ac-

cept a sub-tenant.
One great cause of difficulty with leases is blind faith on the part of the persons involved that all differences of opinion can be worked out. Poor memories as to

worked out. Poor memories as to verbal agreements can cause dis-putes between persons even though they are both honest and generous. Many of the possibilities that should be covered by a properly drawn lease will not occur to inex-personed persons. The renting of perienced persons. The renting of land deserves a written contract. and it is a contract too important to be entrusted to anyone other

Last year, there were 16 different recordings of the song for sale, ranging from boogie-woogle by Sugar Chile Robinson to Bing Crosby, and cowboy singers.

Tree Decoration Has Ancient Source In Arabian Legend

When you fasten the ornaments to your Christmas tree this year you will be commemorating a centuriesold Arabian legend that relates how plants blossomed and flowered and trees miracluously bore ripened fruit on the eve of the first Christ-

In fact, the Christmas tree itself stems from the story o. a Scandina-vian "sacred" tree and Martin Luther, a German, is said to have brought the first one indoors and decorated it for the Yule season in the early 16th century.

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

Copyright Law Is Important

America has led the way in pro-tecting the fruit of man's mind. Our literature, drama, scolarship, and vast media of public information prosper because of our copy-

right law.

Are you an author? An artist?
A playwright? Or are you thinking of going into such work? If so, find our about copyright law. It protects you—against copying, but not against independent reproduction of a similar work.

A copyright enables you to sue him i nfederal courts for damages and collect — if someone copies

and collect — if someone copies your work or any substantial part of it without permission.

The most important single thing about copyrights is this: Do not publish anything until you find out what kind of a copyright notice you need. If you publish without proper notice, you lose all rights in the work.

As long as your book is not published, you own the script. The common law protects your rights in it the same as in any other property. For an unpublished book you need no added legal safeguard. You cannot register its copyright. But you may copyright such work as a play, lecture, sermon, or artwork, though it has not been published.

A book's copyright may be registered in the author's name or any one he selects, such as the publisher, who can better guard the copy-

one he selects, such as the publisher, who can better guard the copyright or grant proper consent to quote the book, under a contract between himself and his publisher. Here are some other kinds of work you can copyright: Poems, newspapers, maps, photographs, dramatic and musical compositions. A copyright is good for 28 years. You may renew it once so as to keep it in effect fo ra total of 56 years.

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

One of many stories told of his goodness concerns a poor and honest man and his three good and beautiful daughters. The father was unhappy for poverty prevented his giving the customary dowries to his daughters, and for this reason they could never have suitable husbands.

One night a bag of coins was tossed in at the man's window. The next night the act was repeated. But on the third night the father watched, and the anonymous giver was detected. The jolly bishop stood with the third bag of coins in his hands. The father was very proud and would not accept the money. The good bishop begged the poor man to accept the gifts and use them for his daughters' dowries, requesting that his name never be revealed.

At last, the father accepted the money for his daughters, but he could not keep the name of the generous bishop secret — so the legend of the goodness of St. Nicholas was further spread and strengthened.

Oyster Farming Is Big Business

Take a look at the calendar. Ther's an "R" in every month between now and April, and you know what that's suppost to mean. Its the oyster season again. More millions of the succulent shellfish are destined for harvest in the next six months from the many ree a in in-

destined for harvest in the next six months from the many ree s in inland bay waters of Texas.

A stupendous total of 45 million individual Texas - grown oysters were sold on the retial market last year. More than 90 percent of them passed through plants on which the Texas State Department of Health had put its stamp of approval covering plant sanitation.

Last year's harvest was put up in 154,000 one-gailon cans, with about

154,000 one-gailon cans, with about 300 medium sized oysters per can. A very high percentage of them were consumed right here at home. Since oysters are often eaten raw,

it stands to reason they would be capable of carrying disease. In the past they did, of course, but today to nowhere near the extent they wouldif it were not for a little-known program of plant certification and water pollution investigations conducted by the Texas State Department of Health.

The certification program was started back in 1937. It is voluntary in that there is no law compelling plant operators to seek certification. But in order to sell their oysters cities which have local shellfish ordinances, plants must be certified. dinances, plants must be certified by the state health agency. Most major Texas cities have such ordin

Health Program Cited or Children

Pioneering a program of medical care which has vitally helped four and a quarter million handicapped children in the past 23 years has earned the Crippled Children's Program of the federal Children's Bureau a 1960 Albert Lasker Award

The awards are made annually for "breakthroughs in medical research and advances in public health programs directly benefiting millions of human beings throughout theworld" by the American Public Health Associaton.

This year's presentations were made by the Association and the Albert and Mary Lasker Foundation in New York last October.

The Crippled Children's Program, mainly administered by individual states, emphasizes high quality care and is widely approved by physicians, hospitals and local communities throughout Texas and the United

Each year the demand for these services has increased, with the rate per 10,000 children served doubling in 22 years.

In Texas the total cases per year sas risen an average of 14.3 percent per year from 4.532 cases in 1956 until 1959 with a record total of



The majority of our Christmas trees come from New England, New York and Pennsylvania, the north Middlewest, and the Northeast Pacific regions. In recent years, New Jersey has anrually marketed around 100,000 trees for local use.

Most of the trees for Christmas sales are cut early in the fall and the trees are kept green with plenty of water until shipped to distribution centers.

Some mass producers, however, cut trees early in the new year, and treat them with preservatives and coloring solutions for storage in chilled warehouses.

A game called "snapdragon" was very popular at Christmas time in England more than 200 years ago. To a limited extent it is still played in some parts of England, as well as in America.



Contracts Are Important

At this time of year, many land-lords and tenants are thinking a-bout farm rental arrangements for 1860. While some operate from year to year on the basis of verbal agreements regulated largely by local custom, written leases are better and may save disagreement and hard feelings between the particle.

Farming is a business and should be conducted in a businesslike manner for best success. Rental contracts involve a full year's work by the tenant and possibly thousands of dollars for both parties. A few dollars spent on a properly drawn lease is good business economy.

A farm lease is not a simple face.

A farm lease is not a simple paper. Printed lease forms often turn out to be trais if not understood, or if not properly executed. A farm-er-tenant contract is intricant and of such importance to both parties concerned that amateur draftman-ship is risky

Fixing of cash rent or designat-ing the length of term are rela-tively simple. Yet, even in these matters, ambiguity or incomplete-ness can cause bitter disputes and

expensive lawsuits.

A loosely drawn property description may have consequences entirely unintended by either landlord or tenant. Where rent is to be based on acreage, an accurate des-cription is doubly important.

In addition, there are legal rules to substitute for some ommissions in written leases. For example, a holdover by the tenant may auto-matically renew the contract if the lease is silent on the subject. It is as important to know the results of omissions as to know the courts'

of omissions as to know the courts' interpretation of the language used. There are many matters which should be covered by a properly drawn lease. For instance, if a tenant is to farm on a share basis, care should be taken to define what expenses are to be paid by the parties as well as what shares are to be taken out. A lease should cover such things as who is to make repairs, what land is to be cropped wheather the tenant can cut timber, wheather loss of a building by fire wheather loss of a building by fire or other cause frees the tenant, or wheather the landlord mush ac-

or wheather the tandford much accept a sub-tenant.

One great cause of difficulty with leases is blind faith on the part of the persons involved that all differences of opinion can be worked out. Poor memories as to verbal agreements can cause districts between persons aren though

verbal agreements can cause disputes between persons even though they are both honest and generous.

Many of the possibilities that should be covered by a properly drawn lease will not occur to inexperienced persons. The renting of land deserves a written contract, and it is a contract too important to be entrusted to anyone other than an expert.



"Greetings by Mail" Originated in 1846, Now a Modern Custom

Look at the paintings on the Christmas cards you send and receive — you'll find famous names and some of the best contemporary art. Here is how it all began.

On a December day in 1846, a middleclass Englishman, Henry Cole, sat at the library desk of his London home addressing to his friends what were probably the first Christmas cards ever printed. The cards depicted a Victorian family assembled at the festive board and the traditional Christmas customs of giving to the poor. They also bore the now-classic greeting: "A Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year to you."

Cole, in a historic move, two months before had commissioned John Calcott Horsley, a Royal



Academy artist, to paint the illustration for the card and had struck off a thousand lithographed copies. He dispatched them that December. This was such a markedly successful stroke of good will that plain Henry Cole subsequently became Sir Henry Cole.

Horsley's art was a far cry from today's Christmas card paintings, but he started a cycle which a hundred years later was to bring fine art into high favor on Christmas cards.

An American shopping for cards may select, for instance, a painting called "Snow Under the Arch" by another Royal Academy member—Winston Churchill, Britain's wartime prime minister and famed amateur artist. Or he might choose Peter Hurd's "One Night in Winter" or "Grandma" Moses' "The White Church" or "The Nativity" by Alexander Ross.

Abbreviation, Xmas Of Greek Origin

There has been much unfavorable comment on the abbreviated form for Christmas that is commonly used. Many think it inappropriate and undignified to use the shortened form, Xmas.

The explanation of its origin is that the initial letter of the Greek name for Christ is X and the coin cidence of its cruiciform shape led to an early adoption of this letter as the figure and symbol of Christ. X is frequently found on walls of the catacombs. When the early Christians wished to make a representation of the Trinity, they would place either a cross or an X beside the names of the Father and the Holy Ghost. From this came the shortened form Xmas, instead of Christ-





Nevertheless, he explained the \$3,600 minimum teacher pay proposed by the commission is \$400 short of the \$4,000 minimum which has been recommended and approved by TSTA, the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, and other organizations interested in education.

The \$4,000 minimum was presented to the Legislature in 1959 and is fully supported by recommendations which the 2 5 4 county Hale-Aikin committees made more

Hale-Aikin committees made more than two years ago.

"If the full \$4,000 is approved by the Lesislature, it will do no more than place Texas at the average paid teachers in other states," Bowles emphasized, "since Texas is now more than \$700 below this average. A \$400 increase represents a haif-step at a time when a full step is essential."

Bowles pointed out that the commission did recommend approximately the same maximum teacher salaries that have been included in the TSTA-supported program, although it would require longer to reach the maximums.

Big cities and other rapidly growing areas were left out of the commission's recommendations also, Bowles noted. He found no recommended for providing State aid to such districts on the current year's school attendance, rather than the present system based on the preseding year's attendance.

The TSTA president said that TS-TA will present its full program to the 57th Legislature with the knowledge that it already has the en-dorsement of thousands of Texas

"Recognizing the real emergency which confronts our schools, we solicit the understanding and support of this program by every Texan who is concerned with providing better educational opportunities for Texas children to meet the demands of our rapidly changing times," he declared.

The T S T A program calls for among other things: A beginning annual salary of \$4,014, for a bachelor degree teacher (present \$3.204); an increase of \$380 per school bus operation.

However, Bowles said the commission actually recommended a decrease in the allotment of funds for maintenance and operation of schools in districts with fewer than 75 teachers and the increase for maintenance and operation.

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AIM AT MORE MONEY FOR STATE'S TEACHERS

Officials of the Texas State Teachers Association expressed deep disappointment and concern regarding recommendations by the

islature.

"The total State expenditure for improvement of education recommended by the commission is \$57.

5 million for the biennium compared with \$160 required to finance the full TSTA - Hale - Aikin program." Bowles noted.

"This would mean only\$28.7 million per year which is only one-third of the amount requested and is little more than \$10 per student," Bowles pointed out, "This will not provide material improvements in the public school system of Texas.

"If our scools nere in comparable position with other states of able position with other states of the nation, these recommendations would, for the most part, be excellent," Bowles continued, "But they now fall for short of removing the lag which has built up in our program during the last five years."
