



Proponents of one of the Constitut ional Amendments to be voted in the General Election Nov. 6th claim that its passage will save the taxpayers money. The proposed amend ment would allow Commissioners Courts to reallocate the amounts levied for their four regular oper-ating funds: General Fund, Jury Fund, Permanent Important Fund and Road and Bridge Fund — an annual basis, Now the Permanent Improvement amounts that can be levied for these funds are fixed by the Constitution and cannot be changed except in reallocation every six years or oftener

The porposed amendment guarantees that the total tax rate could not be raised, for it sets the same maximum as now provide cents on the \$100 valuation. provided, 80

No private business could long operate well if it had to guess six years in advance on its fiscal oper-Adoption of this amendment would free the counties to operate on a more efficient, business-like

The people, by adopting this amendment, therefore, can save in two ways: First, their Commissioners Courts will be given the opportunity to operate their fiscal affairs in a modern way which will make for economy, and Second, they will save the cost of expensive reallocation elections every few years, -0-

This reminder from the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council -f you think farm tractors are not killers, take a look around state. Three farm workers died in accidents involving farm tractors during one week in September.

Broiler placements continue at or near record levels. By mid-Septem-ber about 75 million broiler chicks had been placed on Texas farms this year as against 61 million for the same period in 1955 - an increase of 23 percent. For the 22 major producing states place-ments for the period were up 20 percent. Texas poultry marketing experts believe that before a price recovery can be made, production will have to be pulled more nearly in line with demands.

BERKELEY, Calif.—What would the ideal chemical to kill cancer ells and at the same time leave ormal tissues of the body un-

A new approach to this difficult uestion will be undertaken by a am of scientists in the University California School of Medicine, n Francisco, with the aid of a 10,000 grant from the Damon

At the present time the trial and rror method usually guides the arch for cancer-fighting chemials. Chemicals are made in the boratory, then tried on cancerous nice. If they have some effect on encer, they are then tried on man patients.

There are at present two chief lasses of cancer-fighting chemi-

In each case the chemicals that ibit cancer growth so far tried ave not been able to make a harp enough distinction between ancer cells and normal cells.

The scientists will study the basic hemical reactions that take place etween the chemicals and both cancer and normal tissue. Their goal is to learn enough

bout the reactions to be able to rite specifications for chemicals that would carry out the desired inhibiting reactions with cancer cells but not with normal cells.


