





000 pounds or sheep weighing 100 pounds require more feed for maintenance than after they have dropped to 700 and 70 pounds respectively. Livestock in the drouth area have lost weight and in some instances have lost about all they can stand. Therefore producers should be free to mix rations best suited to the class of livestock and to the purpose for which they may be fed.

Under the drouth emergency feed program, feeds high in protein and energy are available to Proteins livestock producers. Proteins, such as cotionseed meal is an es-

sential in using low grade fibrous roughages. Any grass or browse left in a drouth region will be classified as very low in protein. If there is enough browse left the range to provide enough bulk or filler to livestock then they may be maintained for a period of time on cottonseed meal or pellets. How ever under this procedure. producers should be on the lookout for vitamin A and calcium deficiencies; two important items in maintenance and reproduction. Other common roughages that are low in protein, Vitamin A and minerare cottonseed hulls and grass Continued on back page


