A new water repellency treatment for cotton, developed by USDA chemists, produces an unusual finish that keeps water out but lets air thru. Instead of coating the fabric and thus sealing off the tiny open spaces in the weave, as some water proof finished do, the chemicals in the new finish penetrate the fibers and make them so highly water repellent that the fabric sheds rain. Although the treatment is not yet being used commercially, it looks promising because it is not costly and can be used with the same equipment used in applying other textile finishes. It can also be applied along with flame resistant and crease resistant treatments.
