WE HAVE BEEN button-bustin' proud of the way Baird's teenagers responded to the challenge of raising money for the 1964 United Fund. Although it was a new experience for most of them, they jumped right into the spirit of it.

A story in this issue gives results of the contest between the four high school classes. But even more important than the contest is the most commendable way these youngsters worked.

Very little of the money they contributed to the United Fund came through outright gifts. Most of it the teenagers worked for, with bake sales, a bottle drive, a car wash and window washing.

Their efforts to raise money for the United Fund were more successful than we had even hoped for. And we hope these youngsters and the United Fund have jointly found the campaign pleasant enough that both will want something similar next year.

We salute the new Miss United Fund and her runners-up. But we aim an even bigger salute toward the many others -- students and faculty advisors -- whose hard work is so evidently responsible for success.

THERE IS NO DOUBT in this corner that the story would have been the same at Albany Friday night whether the Lions had had their missing players or not.

The Bears were completely ready for that game and we are convinced the score would have been the same if those three missing Albany players had been in the lineup.

It had been a long time since Albany had lost a district game, and even longer since Baird had beaten the Lions. But last Friday night was certainly not a fluke victory for Baird -- it was earned the hard way by preparedness and plenty of hustle.

IN THE NOT-TOO-DISTANT future the City of Baird will have alleys all over town cleared out so the city's new packer-type truck can begin trash pickups in the residential area.

Because the new truck is many times more efficient than the old system of trash collection, a study indicates city crews should be able to pick up trash twice a week for everyone who wishes such service.

Obviously, this twice-a-week trash collection will cost more. But it isn't likely to cost more than 50 cents per month per customer more than the present occasional trash pick-up.

And also, some type of restriction would probably be placed on garbage cans to be used. Very likely, the usual 20-gallon or 32-gallon covered can will be specified.

Regular trash collection and use of covered cans could eliminate several health hazards and would probably prevent a recurrence of the major fly problem we have had in Baird this year.

And, in fact, it would be worth another 50 cents a month to us simply to be freed of the chore of burning trash a couple of times a week.

We urge the city council to adopt the best possible trash collection program it can, and to set up charges and requirements as seem practical and sufficient to make it work.

Soil Conservation Service Gets Go-Ahead on Flood Prevention

The green light for a comprehensive flood prevention program in this area -- including construction of a multi-purpose dam to also provide recreational facilities and a water supply for the City of Clyde -- was given last week at a public meeting in Coleman County.

At the meeting 27 landowners in the Upper Pecan Bayou watershed voted unanimously to request the program from the Soil Conservation Service. Overall, the program calls for construction of 33 flood detention structures on Upper Pecan Bayou and its tributaries.

Multi-Purpose Structure
The multi-purpose structure proposed for the Clyde area will include 2,500 acre feet of water for municipal use, 2,500 acre feet for recreational purposes, 5,000 acre feet for flood prevention, and an 895 acre feet sediment reserve.

As proposed, the lake would impound a total of 10,895 acre feet of water.

A permit for rights for the municipal and recreational water has already been requested by the City of Clyde from the Texas Water Commission. Action on the permit is expected fairly soon.

With the overall program approved by landowners involved, next step will be preparation by the Soil Conservation Service of a land rights map of the entire system, to show ownership of land involved in the proposed dam sites.

The map should be completed by December, clearing the way for obtaining land easements. In the case of the structure near Clyde, land purchase will be necessary for municipal and recreational use.

Last March, Clyde voters overwhelmingly approved \$325,000 in revenue bonds and \$75,000 in tax bonds to go toward construction of a lake to become the city's water source.

UF Drive to 66 Per Cent

Collections for the 1964 Baird United Fund total about 66 per cent of the \$4,555 goal, according to a report compiled Wednesday.

A total of \$2,997 had been tabulated by Wednesday, along with some \$250 more collected by the four classes of Baird High School. Drive officials pointed out that additional funds have been collected but have not yet been turned in for tabulation by workers.

Drive Chairman Charles Walker urged workers who still have cards to work them and turn in a report as soon as possible so the campaign can be wound up. Of 556 cards issued when the drive started, 359 remain in the hands of workers.

"We know some of these cards have been worked and donations received," Walker said. "But we need reports from the workers, and we need them to complete their cards as quickly as they can."

Heading the list is the business division of the drive, which by Wednesday had turned in \$1,195 or 98 per cent of the division goal of \$1,250.

Also showing up well is the special division, with \$474 or 95 per cent of its goal of \$500; out-of-town division with \$230 or 77 per cent of its goal; court-house employees division with \$239 or 6 per cent of its goal; ranchers division with \$442 or 74 per cent of its goal; and high-way employees division with \$55.50 or 70 per cent of its goal.

All other divisions reported donations of less than 50 per cent of this year's goal.

Other candidates were Karen Smith, freshman, and Linda Pruitt, junior. The freshmen raised \$38.69 for the United Fund while the juniors collected and donated \$9.75.

Miss Hunt, Miss Smith and Miss Pruitt also were to receive trophies Thursday night.

Miss McIntosh is a member of the Bearette basketball team and annual staff. She was freshman class officer, sophomore favorite, and member of the Library Club, Beta Club, Spanish Club, pep squad and Future Homemakers.

Miss Hunt is a cheerleader, Beta Club member and FHA member.

Davis to Speak In City Monday

Robert Davis of Austin, an assistant Texas attorney general, will speak at a public meeting of the Junior Wednesday Club at 7:30 p. m. Monday. Members of the club have invited the public to the meeting, which will be in the high school auditorium.

Davis, who was speaker for Baird High School commencement exercises last May, will be introduced by Mrs. James Snyder.

DEMOCRATS SWEEP GENERAL ELECTION

Callahan Belongs to LBJ

Callahan Countians went along with the trend Tuesday, giving Democratic candidates an unmistakably one-sided margin of victory from the top of the ballot to the bottom.

Some 3,000 voters -- even

more than had been expected -- ignored uncertain weather conditions, which included morning rainfall amounts up to almost .50 of an inch, to vote in the general election.

All county-wide officials were

reelected without opposition, while one precinct was close because of a concentrated write-in effort.

F. P. Shackelford, the Precinct 3 commissioner nominee, received 162 votes to 125 for incumbent G. A. White, whose total came via the write-in route. Shackelford had defeated White in the Democratic primary earlier this year.

But other than that, Democratic nominees in Callahan County were elected without difficulty.

The county gave President Johnson an almost 3-1 edge over Republican Barry Goldwater. The President received 2,178 votes in this county to 849 for Goldwater. Goldwater carried only one of the 13 county boxes -- Dudley.

Sen. Ralph Yarborough was also the choice in the county, although his was the closest race on the slate. He had 1,983 votes to 1,047 for George Bush.

Gov. John Connally was an overwhelming Callahan choice with 2,364 votes to 616 for his Republican opponent. And Congressman Omar Burleson, who easily won re-election across the district, was the selection of 2,469 in Callahan to 645 for Republican Phil Bridges.

All three proposed Constitutional amendments received 2-1 backing or better in the county, just as they did across the state. The school fund amendment was favored 1,286 to 584; the conservation amendment was an 1,180 to 620 choice; and the medical care amendment was the biggest winner in the county with a 1,498 to 481 margin.

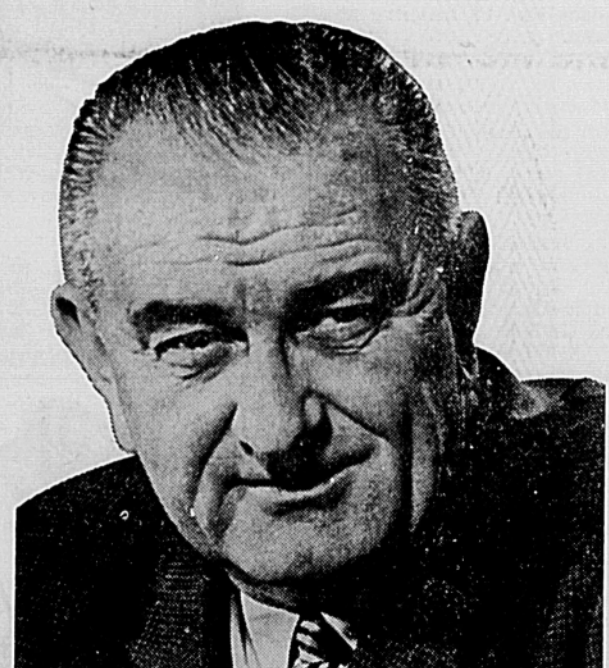
For constable in Callahan County Precinct 8, R. B. Cunningham was re-elected without opposition, while for that office in Precinct 5 Seth Holden and Gale Stallings received one write-in vote each, and in Precinct 1 Todd Newton received five write-ins and Glenn Curtis had three.

Without opposition in the county or the district were State Rep. Wayne Gibbens, District Judge J. R. Black and District Attorney Bradley Miles.

Elected in the county without opposition were Sheriff Homer Price, Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell, County Attorney James Paul Shanks, and Precinct 1 Commissioner Rosco Shelnett.

On the state and national level, every candidate who polled a majority in Callahan County was a similar choice in most other areas and won victories by wide margins.

goals and four free tosses. Yvonne Shelnett added 15 points to the Baird cause and Sally Green had nine. Peggy Gordon also saw offensive action for Baird.

Evelyn Smalley was high for Baird's B team with four points while Diane Petty bagging three and Carolyn Kimbrough getting two points. Lueders outscored the Baird B in every period behind the 18-point shooting of Genny Taylor.

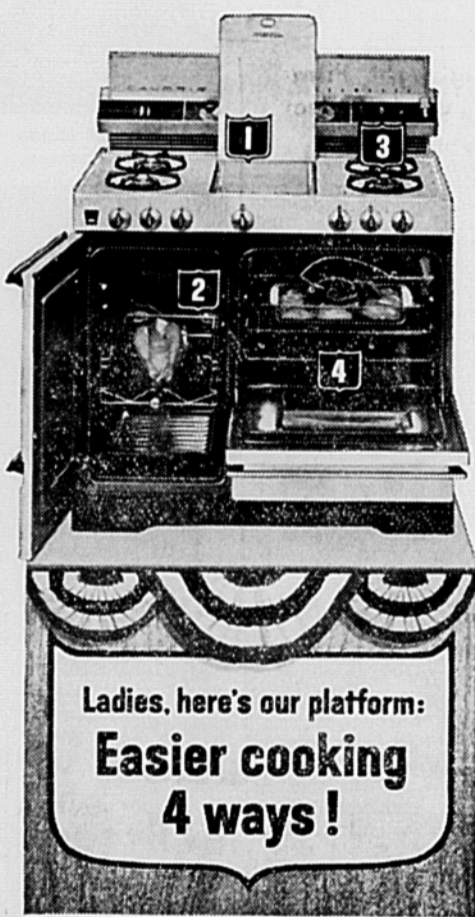

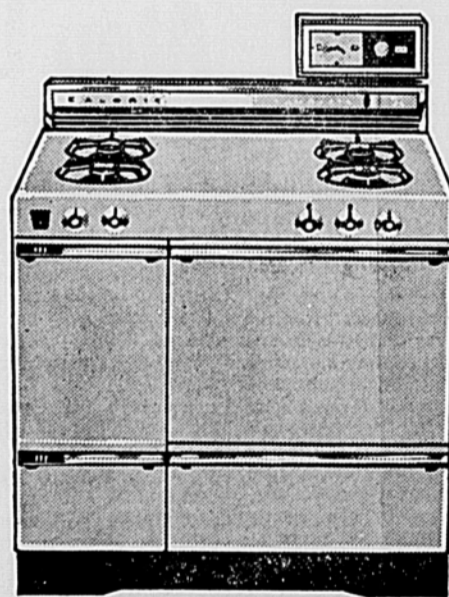

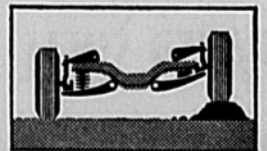

option of going along with the proposed structure as outlined, or of choosing alternate routes of paying the entire cost of the lake alone, or of requesting assistance from other federal agencies.

Should Clyde decide not to participate in the program as a co-sponsor, the Upper Pecan Bayou program would still be carried out by the SCS, but a smaller flood prevention structure would be constructed in place of the larger one now considered.

The new structures will be in addition to 12 already completed and one more to be built on Turkey Creek in Callahan and

Brown counties. Turkey Creek is also a Pecan Bayou tributary.

Upper Pecan Bayou structures will be in Brown, Coleman and Callahan counties. Eastland and Taylor counties are also involved through watershed.

The entire program will cost an estimated \$4,930,000 and will provide 71,785 acre-feet of storage.

Crop, Range Land

An estimated 31 per cent of the land in the Upper Bayou is cropland, 66 per cent rangeland, 3 per cent in roads, highways and other right-of-ways.

Average annual area flooded without detention structures, 34,592 acres; average area flooded with project, 16,265 acres;

per cent reduction 53; average annual damage, without project, \$406,173; average annual damage with project, \$152,905.

Per cent of reduction is 63, which is about three per cent below minimum requirements, but still \$2 benefit for each \$1 spent.

Among officials at the landowner meeting last week in Coleman County on the program were E. J. Hughes of Brownwood, area SCS conservationist; Paul Kenner of Brownwood, SCS planning party leader; L. H. Barnes of the state SCS office in Temple; J. B. McCord of Coleman, chairman of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation district board of supervisors.

Weldon Edwards of Clyde is a supervisor of the CCSCD.

Sponsors of the program are Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District, Central Colorado SCD, Upper Leon SCD, and commissioners courts from Brown, Callahan, Coleman and Taylor counties.

The City of Clyde is a co-sponsor for the single structure involving the city's proposed water supply structure.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS RESTORE MOST OF DEPUTY SALARY BUDGET

Callahan County commissioners, who slashed the sheriff's department budget for deputy salaries in half some weeks ago, have restored most of the cut.

In a called meeting last Thursday, commissioners unanimously approved allocation of funds for three deputy sheriffs -- one each at Baird, Cross Plains and Clyde.

All other economy moves ordered by the court in mid-October went into effect Nov. 1.

Original Cut

The original cut in salary budget was from the former \$13,240 per year for deputies to \$6,000 per year. Thursday commissioners raised the latter figure to \$9,000 per year, providing a satisfactory arrangement could be made with the City of Clyde for sharing the salary of a man living there.

In the past, the county and the City of Clyde have jointly paid for a law enforcement of-

ficer living in Clyde. The arrangement is expected to continue.

Under the arrangement, commissioners approved payment of \$150 per month for a deputy in Clyde, and \$300 each per month for deputies in Cross Plains and Baird.

The Clyde deputy will not receive mileage allowance.

Under the former arrangement of a \$6,000 allocation for deputies, residents of Clyde and Cross Plains had feared that one or both might lose their deputy sheriff.

Commissioners also urged at last week's meeting that Sheriff Homer Price attempt to cut down other expenses in his department.

Mileage Cut

Their request, as shown in minutes of the meeting, reads, "The court having had the sheriff present has reminded him that under no circumstan-

ces do we wish nor have we tried to influence his decision concerning who he hires; nor have we tried to influence him in firing or transferring any deputy he now has or may have in the future, but did strongly recommend that the mileage now being paid be trimmed considerably, since the mileage and expenses is now running more than the salary in some circumstances, to be effective Dec. 1, 1964."

In setting the deputy salary allowance at \$9,000 per year, commissioners stipulated that the amount could be made \$10,800 per year if a satisfactory arrangement for sharing cost of an officer in Clyde could not be made. The higher amount would allow for three deputies, all at a monthly salary of \$300.

Present for the called meeting were Judge Byron Richardson and Commissioners Rosco Shelnutt, Glen Swor, G. A. White and Duke Mitchell.

Road Improvement Project Due County

A 3.4-mile improvement project has been announced for Callahan County by J. C. Roberts of Abilene, district engineer for the Texas Highway Dept.

The project will include reconstruction of grading, structures and surfacing from the intersection of FM 880 and Interstate 20 east to the Eastland County line.

Estimated cost of the work is \$87,000.

The Callahan County project is part of a state-wide program which will improve 3,305 miles of Farm and Ranch to Market roads in the state during 1965. Estimated cost will be \$18,000,200 for the state.

Newton Resigns As Chief Deputy

Deputy Sheriff Tod Newton has resigned the position to be effective Dec. 1. No replacement has been named for him, Sheriff Homer Price said this week.

N. L. Long, deputy who has been living in Cross Plains, is expected to move to Baird to fill Newton's vacancy. Long will live in the Callahan County jail and also serve as jailer.

Newton, who is chief deputy, received five write-in votes for constable of Precinct 1 in Tuesday's general election. There were no names on the ballot for that office.

Hootenanny Is Saturday Night

A varied program is assured for the hootenanny program this Saturday night, sponsored by the Clyde Bulldog Booster Club. The program will begin at 8 p. m. in the Clyde High auditorium.

Mr. Westfall, a resident of Clyde the past five years, died Saturday in St. Ann Hospital in Abilene. He was a disabled veteran of World War I.

A native of Mason County, he was born Feb. 27, 1888 and married Allene Napier May 16, 1921 in Sweetwater. He was a cowboy, farmer and later a teacher before going into the army in 1918.

It was during the battle of St. Mihiel in France that he was wounded on Sept. 14, 1918 while fighting with the 359th Infantry Regiment of the 90th Divi-

sion. He was discharged from Walter Reed Hospital in Washington in 1920.

A longtime Cisco resident, he was a charter member of American Legion and World War I veterans organizations at Baird. He attended West Texas State at Canyon, and taught in Idaho and Nevada before moving to Cisco in 1934.

Survivors include his wife; one son, S. M. of Lubbock; three daughters, Mrs. Rachel Round-savall of Little Rock, Ark., Mrs. Georgianna Embrey of Palm Springs, Calif., and Mrs. Dorothy Plumlee of Abilene; a brother, C. C. of Andrews; a sister, Mrs. Henry Harlen of Wil-low City, and 11 grandchildren.

Getting over their opening fumble, the Bears pieced together a 60-yard campaign in the second quarter, with Eddie Childers getting the first of his three touchdowns on a seven-yard sweep.

Crow's kick was wide but the Bears held their 13-6 edge until halftime.

Windham Scores

Brusing Richard Windham blasted another big hole in the Albany cause when he roared 55 yards for a touchdown the first time Baird got the ball in the second half.

Crow's kick was good for a 20-6 lead to put the pressure squarely on Albany.

The Lions, trying to come back, drove to the Baird 25 late in the third quarter before the Bears held for downs. And from there, Baird drove 75 yards with Childers getting the final two.

Big gainer in that series was a perfect 47-yard pass and run play from Tommy Barton to Kelton Jones.

After Baird's fourth touchdown, which came early in the fourth, the Lions finally seemed to wilt. Two Albany fumbles and an intercepted pass by Bruce Bell kept the Lions from even threatening to narrow the gap.

Last Touchdown

Stanley McGowen's fumble recovery deep in Albany territory set up Baird's final touchdown, which came on a 32-yard pass play from Barton to Childers.

Baird had 14 first downs to eight for Albany, and 335 yards of total offense to 193 for Albany.

Although the offense got most of the glory for the win, it was the Bear defensive line and linebackers who provided the key for victory. The defensive unit kept the explosive Albany attack tied up most of the evening and was the main reason for the Lion collapse in the fourth quarter.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — This city once again became the seat of the executive branch of the federal government as President Johnson moved back to his home grounds for an expected prolonged post-election stay.

The President preferred to vote in person at his old box in Johnson City, rather than cast an absentee ballot.

An elaborate communications network was prepared for the election day party here. Hundreds of national press, radio and television representatives accompanied Johnson to Texas Monday night.

Major developments are anticipated at the vacation White House during days immediately following counting of the votes.

The president, while resting up from the campaign, undoubtedly will be formulating his plans for the future and staying abreast of national and international developments at this important period.

He is scheduled to entertain at least one distinguished visitor at the LBJ Ranch. Mexico's President-elect Gustavo Diaz Ordaz will visit him November 12-13, according to early reports.

Most observers predict the President will remain at least until mid-November, possibly longer.

COURTS SPEAK — Court of Criminal Appeals criticized state courts of inquiry but declined to declare unconstitutional the law authorizing such procedures.

Issue came before the court in the appeal of Pasadena Attorney N. A. Smith who claimed his constitutional rights were violated in a court of inquiry into Pasadena city finances. Judges ordered Smith freed of contempt of court charges arising from his refusal to testify at a court of inquiry held on June 2.

Court of Criminal Appeals also ordered a new trial for Arthur Geter on marijuana charges in Harris County, citing a new U. S. Supreme Court decision that legal representation in trials is a constitutional right. Geter began serving a life term in 1952.

Supreme Court refused to review a dispute between City of Athens and Gulf State's Telephone Company over phone rates. It thus left standing the lower courts' decision that the East Texas city's 1961 and 1962 rate ordinances do not permit the company a fair return on its investment. City asked the higher court to review the case.

In another case the Supreme Court agreed that Connecticut General Life Insurance Company is entitled to collect \$408,661 in overpayment of occupational taxes for 1952-57 and for 1959.

It left standing the lower court findings that United Press International libeled Bruce B. Mohs, a Madison, Wis., pilot in a story concerning a seaplane landing. Court of Civil Appeals has questioned the accuracy of most of the story. Mohs was awarded some \$7,500 in damages.

Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools cannot negotiate a new water supply contract with the City of Big Spring, according to a ruling by 53rd District Judge Herman Jones. City attempted to have the Austin court set aside a 1937 contract under which it agreed to furnish water to the Big Spring State Hospital at a cost of 10 cents per 1,000 gallons. Estimated cost of furnishing this service now is set at 32 cents per 1,000 gallons. It is expected that the city will appeal Jones' decision.

BUSINESS CLIMBS — Texas building permits rose to a near-record level of \$155,000,000 in September.

It was the 43rd month of the current Texas business expansion -- second largest peacetime cyclical upswing since December 1854. Longest period was March 1933-May 1937.

Business index as measured by University of Texas Bureau of Business Research was 12 per cent above September, 1963 -- 9 per cent below all-time high of 152 per cent last July. Researchers registered an optimistic outlook for the remaining months of 1964.

APPOINTMENTS — Gov. John Connally has selected Richard M. Price of Abilene as 104th

District Attorney. He succeeds Tom Todd who resigned the post effective November 1. Price was the only general election candidate for the office. District includes Fisher, Jones and Taylor counties.

Connally reappointed Bay City Mayor Richard C. Gusman to the Battleship Texas Commission and selected Lofton O. Wells of Houston and Mrs. Mack J. (Viola) Webb of El Campo as new members of the Commission.

Appointees yet to be made total 72, on 29 state agencies, including the Sabine River Authority, Texas Water Commission, Neches River Conservation District, State Seed and Plant Board, Red River Authority, Water Development Board, Texas Liquor Control Board, and 22 other administering bodies.

CLEANUP — Water Pollution Control Board announces its intention to adopt and enforce stringent new regulations on all sewage treatment plants in Bexar County.

Board decided that there is no point in trying to clean up the Houston Ship Channel. It will be designated for navigation and industrial use, not for recreation.

ESTES JUDGMENT ENTERED — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr reports that the 108th District Court in Potter County rendered a \$547,500 summary judgment against onetime West Texas financier Billie Sol Estes, winding up the state's suit against

Estes and Commercial Solvents Corp.

State claimed Estes and the firm combined to unlawfully injure and drive out competition in anhydrous ammonia fertilizer in the high plains area by selling below cost and through other schemes violating the anti-trust act.

Commercial Solvents earlier paid \$150,000 under an agreed judgment. But it admitted no liability.

Estes is appealing the Federal Circuit's 15-year fraud and conspiracy sentence to the U. S. Supreme Court.

HIGHWAY PROJECTS — A delegation from Tarrant, Wise, Parker, Johnson, Hood and Denton counties called on the State Highway Commission seeking a \$72,100,000 highway development program in the Fort Worth metropolitan area.

Emphasis was placed on construction of a 56-mile link between Fort Worth and Ennis on U. S. Highway 287 to facilitate truck traffic from Houston to Fort Worth.

Highway Commission's approval this week of a \$40,000,000 highway construction project within the city limits of El Paso demonstrates results that can come from close cooperation between residents of a community and a state agency.

Eighteen months ago, the mayor and the county judge from El Paso conferred with the Commissioners on traffic problems resultant from that city's

status as the third fastest-growing city in the U. S. in the decade ending in 1960.

Highway Department told them it could do nothing unless the people of El Paso got busy. They did -- and passed a \$15,000,000 road construction bond program in October.

When city officials came back to ask the Highway Commission for help, it came in a hurry, since \$7,500,000 worth of local right-of-way funds were ready.

AG OPINIONS — Attorney General Carr has ruled that state law does not authorize a discount for the taxpayer for early payment of state and ad valorem taxes, even though county ad valorem taxes have a discount feature.
