Occupation License Tax

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'-

That from and after the passage and publication of this ordinance, from every itinerant merchant who shall move into the City of O'Donnell, Texas, and offer for sale "bank rupt stocks" of goods, or advertising "fire sales" or "water and fire damaged stocks for sale" for a limited period of time, there shall be collected by the City of O'Donnell, Texas, Fifty dollars per month for the first month or less than a month; and for each additional month that such sales are continued, in said City of O'Donnell ,said merchant shall pay to said City of O'Donnell an additional sum of \$10.00; such amounts payable monthly in ad-

It is provided, that where such merchant remains in said City of O'Donnell for six months, in addition to the fifty dollars license charge for the first month, they shall pay an additional sum of \$5.00 per month:

## Santa Fe Purchases Promote Prosperity

WHILE the Santa Fe is itself a large employer of labor—its payroll in 1926 totalled \$107,000,000, and its employes number more than 75,000-indirectly as a buyer of materials and supplies it helps to furnish employment to many more. Such purchases last year exceeded \$64,000,000. In addition it bought over \$12,000,000 of new cars and locomotives.

Its largest class of material was fuel, which totalled \$24,360,000. This consisted of about 2,267,000 tons of coal, and 507,800,000 gallons of fuel oil. The use of coal or oil on any division is determined primarily by which is the cheaper fuel in that locality.

The second largest class of purchases was iron and steel products, for which the expenditure was approximately \$19,750,000. This included an expenditure of \$9,500,000 for 152,700 tons of rail, frogs, switches, and fastenings. \$1,500,000 went for wheels, axles, and tires, and \$306,000 for flues and tubes for locomotives. Bridges, turntables, structural steel, forgings, and fabricated, unfabricated, and pressed steel took nearly \$3,000,000. Steel and iron are basic necessities in railroading.

Purchases of forest products totalled \$6,412,000, which included over 3,000,000 cross ties, and large quantities of lumber and timbers. The Santa Fe creosotes its ties and much of its timbers, otherwise greater quantities would be needed each year.

Folders, report blanks, notices, tickets, tariffs, and various items in the stationery line required \$1,225,000, electrical materials \$660,000, lubricating oil and grease, illuminating oils, waste, etc., \$1,180,000, and air brake material

These purchases were necessary to maintain the railroad properly and to give satisfactory service to the public. They were covered by 130,000 invoices and were made from 3,347 individuals and firms. Note the wide spread of this buying.

Thus the Santa Fe and all railroads are an important factor in maintaining the prosperity of our country through the employment arising from these large purchases of supplies, as well as the millions directly disbursed among their own employes for services.

When the railroads are doing well, they buy materials and supplies on a larger scale than when net revenues fall off. Money thus spent mainly pays for the labor of many persons, helping merchants, farmers, everybody your own community included. You therefore are vitally interested.

#### ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'-DONNELL, TEXAS.

An ordinance granting a franchise and certain priveleges to the West Texas Gas Company (a corporation) with its principal office in the City of Amarillo, Potter County, Texas, and establishing rules and regulations for the use of natural gas for light, heat and power, and establishing a maximum limit for price to be charged for such gas.

WHEREAS, WEST TEXAS GAS COMPANY (a corporation) has applied to the Mayor and City Council of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, to grant said company the right to lay and maintain and operate a gas plant for the distribution of natural gas for light, heat and power with-in the City of O'Donnell, Texas, upon the following terms and conditions and reservations, such rights and franchises to be as follows, to-

That the right to furnish, distri-bute and sell natural gas for light, heat and lover, for all such other purposes for which gas may be used within the City of O'Donnell, Texas, for a period of twenty years from the date of the passage and approval of this ordinance is hereby granted to the WEST TEXAS GAS COM-PANY (a corporation) its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the grantee, subject however, to the provisions hereinafter incoroporated in this ordinance and for such additional period or extensions of time as may at the expiration of said term of years, and upon conditions then found to be satisfactory to the officials of the City of O'Donnell, and to this grantee, and provided that this ordinance and franchise is to be in effect and run from and after the day and date of its pas-sage and approval.

conditions claimed and complained of and shall be given by the said City and shall be signed by the City Sec-retary under the seal of the said City, after having been properly authorized by the Mayor and City Council of the said City; provided, however, that the said grantee shall have sixty (60) days after receiving such notice in which to rectify and correct such violations and to sub-stantially comply with the terms and and conditions of this ordinance fully complied with at the end of said sixty (60) days, then and in that event the City shall have the power to forfeit this franchise on purchase the distributing plant of the grantee at its fair appraised value or to allow the grantee to remove same within one year from the date of such forfeiture, provided that before any of said property may be removed, the grantee shall be required to give to the City a good and sufficient bond that the streets and alleys will be placed and

left in as good conditions as found. For each and every breach or violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance by the grantee, it shall be liable to a penalty of Twenty-five Dollars to be recovered in any court of competent jurisdiction by suit, of any person, firm or corporation in-jured or damaged by such breach or violation; and if the breach or vio-lation shall be a continuous one, each day during which such breach or vio-lation continues shall be deemed a separate breach or violation and a separate ground for recovery against the grantee.

SECTION 10

That in further consideration of the priveleges and franchise granted to the WEST TEXAS GAS COM-PANY, it shall adopt and use all and any reasonable safeguards to provide for the protection of persons or pro-perty against injury or damage growing out of the use of gas and that they shall construct and mainthat they shall construct and main-tain in good order all mains, pipes and equipment used in said City for the distributing of gas, and shall al-ways be prepared to furnish said City and its inhabitants a sufficient quantity of gas for all purposes; provided, however, that in case of explosion or accidents of any charof grantee, to the main lines or to the distributing system provided herein, or shortage of gas supply in the fields from which grantee secures the gas and the grantee is not able to furnish on account of such unavoidable conditions gas for all purposes, that preference shall be annonnonnonnonnonnonno given domestic consumers, schools and hospitals in the use of the gas until such time as the supply may prove adequate for all purposes. 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

Pare four ripe pears and cut into quarters, cook in butter until tender Pour ever chocolate sauce prepared with two ounces of sweet chocolate. one tablespoonful of sugar, one and one-fourth cupfuls of milk, placed in a double boiler and cooked with a teaspoonful of arrowroot or cornstarch mixed with one-fourth cupful of cream; cook ten minutes. Melt one and one-half tablespoonfuls of butter, add one-fourth cupful of powdered sugar and cook until it is brown. Combine mixtures and serve.

#### Luncheon Eggs.

Wash and chop one-fourth pound of fresh mushrooms, melt one tablespoon ful of butter in a saucepan and add the mushrooms, stirring until the mois ture is evaporated; add one tablespoonful of flour, blend well, add one half cupful of chicken stock, salt and pepper to season, and cook six min utes. Cut six hard-cooked eggs into halves, remove the yolks and mix with the mushroom sauce. Fift the whit ath this mixture and set into a be ing dish, surround with tomate sauand serve when well heated through. Just before serving place a fillet of sardine on each egg.

#### Baked Mackerel.

Seak the sait mackerel until fresh ened. Place in a baking pan with a few tablespoonfuls of boiling water let it steam and cook until the water has evaporated, then cover with cream and bake until the fish is tender
