 oil have increased, the Texas Rail-
 road Commission has reduced Tex-
 as Oil Production allowables. Just
 last week the allowable for March
 was again reduced, he stated. This
 reduction of allowables has placed
 many hardships and burdens upon
 people of this area, and I will
 work to remedy this condition, he
 said.

Still another vital area of legis-
 lation is the revision of the Sales
 Tax law to remove the inequities
 and ambiguities contained therein
 and to remove the unfair tax burden
 and increased bookkeeping costs
 which are caused by the uncer-
 tainties in the law. The ruling which
 forces a store owner making nume-
 rous sales under 25c and on which
 he collects no tax, to pay taxes on
 such sales must be changed, Owen
 stated.

Finally I believe that a real ef-
 fort should be made to establish
 economy in our State Government.
 We need to establish a committee
 which will ferret out duplication,
 extravagant wastes and unnece-
 sary expenditures. In this connection
 I would pay particular attention to
 abuses of the Welfare Program.

A native West Texan, Owen was
 born and reared in Taylor County.
 His parents, Mr and Mrs Marvin H
 Owen now live in Kermit, Texas
 where they own and operate Owen
 Jewelry. He graduated from Abilene
 High School and attended McMurry
 College prior to entering the mili-
 tary service in 1951. At that time he
 volunteered as a private in the U.
 S. Army. During his period of active
 duty service which covered some
 38 months, Owen attended Officer
 Candidate School from which he
 graduated as one of the two distin-
 guished military graduates in his
 class. Owen was appointed a Regu-
 lar Army Officer, but after the Korean
 conflict ceased, and in order to
 complete his education, he resigned
 his Regular Army Commission and
 was appointed a Reserve Officer and
 was released from active duty. He
 currently holds the rank of Captain
 in the Army Reserve.

A graduate of the University of
 Texas School of Law and a licensed
 practicing attorney in the State of
 Texas, Owen is a member of the
 Gaines County Bar Association, of
 which he currently is president, the
 State Bar of Texas, the American
 Bar Association and the American
 Jurisprudence Society.

Owen is married to the former
 Wanda Jean Roman who was born
 in Lynn County. She graduated from
 Knott High School and her parents,
 Mr and Mrs. E. L. Roman, still live
 just outside of Knott where Mr
 Roman is engaged in farming. Mrs.
 Owen graduated from Hardin-Sim-
 mons University and has done grad-
 uate study at the University of Tex-
 as. She is presently employed as a
 teacher in Seminole High School
 and is the girls' volleyball coach.

Both Owen and his wife are
 members of the First Baptist
 Church in Seminole and Owen was
 an instructor at New Mexico Baptist
 College in Hobbs, N M for some 18
 months.
 In announcing his candidacy,
 Owen said, "I feel that my educa-
 tion, business experience and back-
 ground qualify me for the office
 which I seek. I urge the voters of
 this district to study the qualifica-
 tions of all the candidates for this
 office before making a decision for
 the candidate of their choice. The
 State is a multi-million dollar busi-
 ness; to entrust it to the unquali-
 fied or inexperienced is a mistake we

STATE HEALTH DEPT. FILMS ARE AVAILABLE

Austin. — Public school teachers thruout Texas face more teaching problems today than ever before. High on the list of reasons for the situation are the difficulties involved in presenting instruction on whole subjects or portions of subjects which cannot properly be taught using normal classroom methods.

Many of the state's teachers — particularly councilors and health and physical education teachers — have found the solution to this problem at the film library of the Texas State Department of Health in Austin. The library, with its 1600 films which are listed under 600 different titles, is said to be one of the most extensive in the Southwest. It contains films with viewing times ranging from 4 to 57 minutes covering all phases of personal and community health. Most of the films were produced commercially but 20 of them were written and produced for specific Texas application.

All films are aimed at a single purpose: teaching good health practices. In addition to providing Texas school teachers with films for classroom aids, the library makes films available to religious and fraternal organizations and to civic groups.
