SENATE RATIFIES THE SUFFRAGE RESOLUTION

SEVEN SENATORS WERE ABSENT WHEN THE FINAL VOTE WAS TAKEN

Austin, Texas .- The national equal suffrage amendment was ratified by the senate when it finally passed the house joint resolution by a viva voce vote. The final vote was taken so quietly that the few spectators hardly realized what had occurred Seven senators were absent when the vote was taken. They were Senators McNealus, Johnston, Woods, Parr, Carlock, Clark and Strickland

While it is not necessary for the governor to sign the resolution, it will be sent to him for his approval.

Suffrage leaders who had been in rejoicing over the victory and the es pecially elated that Texas is the first southern state to ratify.

President Wilson was invited to visit Austin and address the legislature on his tour of the country in the interest of the league of nations by the adoption of a resolution by Sena-tors Smith, Cousins and Caldwell.

A bill requiring oil and gas com mies to make production reports to the railroad commission and increasthe salaries of the commission ers to \$6,000 a year was introduced.

Austin, Texas.-Governor Hobby has ent a number of additional subjects to the special session of state-wide Among the matters dered was that proposing a bill levy-ing a state ad valorem school tax of ·35c on each \$100 of assessed valuation for 1919 and annually thereafter and authorizing the state board of education to use sufficient funds therefrom for the purchase and distribution of free textbooks as authorized under the free textbook amendment to the constitution. The present state school tax rate is 20c.

An amendment to the state deposi-tory law was submitted which would enlarge the method of remitting to state depositories so as to include cash, registered letter, postoffice money order, express order, or by check or draft on any bank, provided that the liability of the remitter shall not cease until the state actually gets the money. At this time drafts and checks can not be accepted under the

The governor submitted the subject of a bill vetoed at the regular sess The act offered provides for the sale development and patenting of mineral deposits, places, veins, lodes or any rock or aqueous solutions carryin; etallic or nonmetallic substances of value excepting oil, natural gas, coal and lignite that may be in any of the land of the public free school fund university fund, the several asylum-funds, that may have been heretofore sold or disposed or which may hereafter be sold with the reservation of ninerals therein and all of said lands as were purchased with a relinquishment of the minerals therein, and all lands of which the mineral rights chall have reverted to the state of Texas, and the said ineral substances that may be in any fresh water lake, salt water lake, in beds and channels which belong to the state

Another matter submitted by the governor, would impose a state tax of \$2 on every dog in Texas.

Austin, Texas.-Repeated attempts by the suffrage opponents to postpone action on the equal suffrage amendment were defeated in the senate.

Senator J. H. Woods offered an mendment to postpone action until the amendment had been submitted to the people, either at a special elec tion or on Nov. 4. Senator Paul D. Page raised a point of order that the government had not submited legisla tion providing for elections and that the senate could not take up the

The chair sustained the point of

The senate by a vote of 14 to 13 sustained the chair in the ruling that the Suiter et al. substitute for the suffrage ratification resolution was out of order. This is regarded as a test vote to show the senate will ratify the national amendment,

House economists failed to make my material dent in the eleemosy-ary appropriation bill, after numer-us amendments had been offered and

The eleemosynary bill, as finally passed, carries a total appropriation of \$5,717,154.80 for the two years

Among the most important holdings authorized are the following: State orphans' home, \$41,000; epileptic colony, \$68,000 ony, \$68,000, tate juvenile training school, \$95,000, girls' training school, \$57,500; state tuberculosis sanitarium \$77,000; state lunatic asylum at Aus tin, \$184,250; southwestern insane asylum \$55,000; north Texas hospital for the insane, \$10,000; state colony for the feeble minded, \$120,000.

Austin, Texas.-The house voted to ratify the federal woman's suffrage amendment, 96 to 20, after three hours of discussion. The fight against ratifi-cation was made mainly on the ground the preservation of the principle of state's rights.

After a three hour hearing the senate committee, on constitutional amendments made a favorable report on the joint resolution for ratification of the national equal suffrage amend-

· A joint resolution to request the peratic executive committee to s mit to the democratic party at the ratification of the national equal suftion is ordered before that date, was introduced in the senate by Senator Suiter.

Senator Page said the legislature had no right to ask the democratic executive committee to order an election and that such a proceeding would require a petition of 10 per cent of the voters.

After a short discussion the resolution was referred to the committee on constitutional amendments.

The senate adopted a resolution ofcounty to submit the subject of prohibiting the teaching of German in the public schools of Texas.

Two resolutions touching on the situation have been introduced in the senate. One, which was offered by Senator Strickland and re erred to the committee on federal relations, provides that "The United States government recognize that, as a state of war exists in northern Mexit co between two independent and distinct factions and that the citizens of the United States be permitted to sell supplies to the Carranza government and its adherents and also the govern ment recently proclaimed by General Angeles as provisional president. It is further resolved that Gov. Hobby of Texas be heartily commended for hav-ing refused permission to any armed band of Mexicans of whatever faction to pass across territory of Texas to suppress revolutionary movements or

Senator Daley offered a resolution ommending the government at Washington to protect Americans in Mexico and "especially are army officers commended for their efforts to protect life and property along the border." The resolution was adopted, but later the vote was reconsidered and the resolution referred to the committee on fed

The house adopted a resolution indorsing Czecho-Slovak day for the state of Texas, which has been fixed for June 28 by proclamation of the governor.

Governor Hobby submitted to the legislature an itemized list for deficiencies in appropriations authorized by the governor for the fiscal year 1919,

the total being \$124.000.

The house without amendment engrossed the judiciary appropriation bill carrying an appropriation of \$1,469.287 for the first year and \$1,427,612

for the second year.

Mr. Thomas, chairman of the appropriations committee, sent up a bill making increases in the salaries for superintendents and employes of all

Cut in Fire Risk Rate.

Austin, Texas.-The state fire insurance commission has adopted a far-reaching order. It extends the privilege of reduction in insurance rates to all incorporated towns in the state regardless of their key rate. The new order is effective July 1. At this time the good fire record credits are available only to towns having key rates of 80c or less. Those having key rates over 80c, and incorporated, will be eligible to get the reduction

University Must Sell Penn Field.

Austin, Texas.-In closing out its ontract with the war department, under which the university of Texas e tablished and conducted three large military schools, that institution now finds itself called upon to sell to the highest bidder what is known as Penn field, where it expended nearly \$600, 000 in erecting buildings that were occupied by a government radio

WORLD WAR ENDED; PEACE TREATY SIGNED

IMPRESSIVE CEREMONY AT AC-CEPTANCE OF TREATY—ENDS GREATEST CONFLICT.

WILSON AFFIXES SIGNATURE

Peace Delegates Sign Death Warrant at Versailles .

Versailles .- Germany and the allied and associated powers signed the peace terms here Saturday in the same imperial palace where the Ger-mans humbled the French so igno-

miniously forty-eight years ago.
This formally ended the world war which lasted just thirty-seven days less than five years.

Saturday was the fifth anniversary of the murder of Archduke Francis Ferdinand at Sarajevo.

The ceremony of signing the peace terms was brief. Premier Clemen-ceau called the session to order in the hall of mirrors of the chateau of Versailles at 3:10 o'clock.

The signing began when Dr. Hermann Mueller and Johannes Bell, the German signatories, affixed their names. Herr Mueller signed at 3:12 o'clock and Herr Bell at 3:13 o'clock.

President Wilson, first of the allied delegates signed a minute later. At 3:45 o'clock the momentous session was concluded.

All the diplomats and members of their parties wore conventional civil-

There were present grizzled French veterans of the Franco-Prussian war. They replaced the Prussian guards-men of the ceremony of 1871 and the Frenchmen watched the ceremony with grim satisfaction. The condi-tions exacted then were exactly re versed. On this occasion the disciples of Bismark sat in the seats of the lowly while the white marble statue of Minerva, goddess of war looked on

Three incidents were emphasized by the smoothness with which the ceremony was conducted. of these was the failure of the Chin-

ese delegation to sign.

The second was the protest submitted by General Jan Christian
Smnts, who declared the peace un satisfactory

The third, unknown to the general public, came from the Germans. When the program for the ceremony was shown to the German delegation Herr von Haimhausen of the German delegation, went to Colonel Henry, liasion officer, and protested. He

"We cannot admit that the German delegates should enter the hall by a different door than the entente delegates; nor that military honors should be withheld. Had we known there would be such arrangements before the delegates would not have

After a conference with the French foreign ministry is was decided as a compromise to render military honors as the Germans left. Otherwise the program was not changed.

Versailles, France.—The German ed. The mightiest military power the world has ever known has been shat tered and humbled almost to the point of impotency.

Within the magnificient, palace bol of the divine rights of kings, and which in the present century was rededicated to that conception by the war lords of Prussia, the democracies of the earth have foregathered and pronounced the verdict.

During the two hundred and fiftyodd years, which have intervened since the erection of the famous palace of Versailles civilization has traversed a long and uncertain route, but the scene itself, which has figured so conspicuously in history and cut of France, is little changed in outward

Germany Would Strike Poland.

Warsaw.-Germany is planning to Warsaw.—Germany is planning to give to Poland a blow at the earliest possible date. Germany means to hit Poland so hard that its new strength will be knocked out and all chances of its rivaling Prussia in importance will end. It means to entice Poland into attacking first so it can have a seeming clear record before the allied powers and to that end is trying its best to provoke the Polish troops in and around Posen to attack.

AN APPEAL TO THE PEOPLE OF AMERICA

PRESIDENT WILSON ASKS THAT LEAGUE COVENANT BE AC-CEPTED WITHOUT CHANGE.

Washington.-President Wilson, in address to the American people on the occasion of the signing of the eace treaty, made a plea for the acceptance of the treaty and the cove-nant of the league of nations without change or reservation. His message, given out here by Secretary Tumulty, said:

"My Fellow Countrymen: The treaty of peace has been signed. If it is ratified and acted upon in full and sincere execution of its terms, it will furnish the charter for a new order of affairs in the world. It is a severe treaty in the duties and penal-ties it imposed upon Germany, but it is severe only because great wrong done by Germany are to be righted and repaired; it imposes nothing that Germany can not do; and she can re-gain her rightful standing in the world by the prompt and honorable fulfillment of its terms.

"And it is much more than a treaty of peace with Germany. It liberates great peoples who have never before been able to find the way to liberty. It ends, once for all, an old and intolerable order under which small groups of seifish men could use the peoples of great em-pires to serve their ambition for power and dominion. It associates the free governments of the world in a permanent league in which they are pledged to use their limited power to maintain peace by maintaining sanc-tions. It does away with the right of conquest and rejects the policy of annexation and substitutes a new order under which backward nations -populations which have not yet to political consciousness and peoples who are ready for indepen-dence, but not yet quite prepared to dispense with protection and guidance -shall no more be subjected to the domination and exploitation of a stronger nation, but shall be put under the friendly direction and af-forded the helpful direction of governments which undertake to be re-sponsible to the opinion of mankind in the execution of their task by ac cepting the direction of the league of nations. It recognizes the inalien able rights of nationality; the rights of minorities and the sancity of religious belief and practice. It lays the pasis for conventions which shall free the commercial intercourse of the world from unjust and vexatious restrictions and for every sort of in-ternational co-operation that will serve to cleanse the life of the world and facilitate its common action in beneficent service of every kind. It furnishes guarantees such as were never given or even contemplated for the fair treatment of all who labor

at the daily tasks of the world. "It is for this reason that I have spoken of it as a great charter for a new order of affairs. There is ground here for deep satisfaction, universal reassurance, and confident hope.

Bernastle, Germany, March 11th An enviable record as one of the best judges of mule flesh in the entire A. E. F. as well as one of the most popular officers in the 90th Division is held by Captain George T. Lamar, formerly of San Antonio, Texa, now communding officer of Co. G., 135 Ammunition Train, new stationed at Bernastle, beside the historic Moselle river.

Captain Lamar is proud to make the claim that practically all the mule drivers to the 90th Division have been under his instruction at one time or another in their training course. He has developed methods of h tching and driving four mules over mountain roads into an art. Captain Lamar's associates believe that his accomplishments in training mule skinners are especially worthy of commendation, since the men he has trained have been hardened plainemen, whom it is hard to make believe that there is anything new to be learned concerning mule flesh.

Captain Lamar is one of the few officers in the army whose hobby is mules. He claims that he loves a mule for its own sake and is seldom contented except when he is dealing with his fayorite animals.

Veterinarians of long experience have stood in awe while Captain Lamar expounded facts dever heard before about this well known beast of burden.

Captain Lawar gained much of his knowledge of mule flesh as a driver on the West Texas plains and in the mountains of Montana. 


