## Weevil Spraying Program Ends

Lubbock - Officials with the United States Department of Agriculture's Plant Pest Control division here have announced the completion of the second year of massive spraying in the High Plains Boll Weevil Control Pro-

PPC Supervisor D. H. Russell reports that about 1,513,000 aggregate acres were sprayed this year.

This is slightly more than officials had estimated at the start of the program Sept. 7. However heavy rains in September hampered the effectiveness of one application and a late fall forced extra

The final application was completed Nov. 17. It was the seventh application and covered slightly more than 63,000 acres.

Extension Entomologist Don Rummel says that in most areas the program appears to have been highly effective. Field reports

show adult weevil populations are significantly smaller than last year, he said.

Immature weevils can be found in fields, Rummel said, but these late forms will not develop to the point where they can survive the

Trash surveys this winter will give a good indication of the number of weevils which entered hibernation sites, he said. Yet the total effectiveness of the program will not be known until next spring when weevils emerge.

## **New Cotton Law** Lists Provisions

Following is a brief summary of some of the provisions as they apply to cotton under the new law passed by Congress:

- 1. The cotton program is a four year program-1966 through 1969.
- 2. National Domestic Allotment can be no less than 65% of the regular allotment. The domestic farm allotment is 65% of the effective farm allotment for 1966.

3. National average support price for 1966 crop is 21 cents based on middling 1" cotton at average location. National average support price for subsequent years is 90% of estimated average world price.

4. Projected yields assigned to the farm are based on the previous three year production history (for 1966, this would include 1963, 1964 and 1965 production years).
