Ferocious Hammerlock Gets Decision

Crowd of 200 Pays \$45 To See The Very Exciting Exhibition

Tiger Gaston won first fall in 29 minutes and 30 seconds. Hammerlock John won second fall in 6 minutes.

After the customary rest period Gaston was unable to return to the ring for the third and last fall and the match was awarded to Hammerlock John by referee Clyde Ash.

Last Friday night in the main event of the wrestling exhibition Hammerlock John of Borger, and Tiger Gaston of this city furnished as thrilling entertainment as any fan could ask for when our local idol, Tiger Gaston went out like a match in a storm six minutes after the second fall began, and was unable to scramble to his feet and enter the ring for the third and last fall, therefore forfeiting the match to Hammerlock John.

that victory was within easy grasp for him. After much punishment being administered to both participants in 29 minutes and 30 seconds Gaston pinned Hammerlock to the floor and was awarded the fall. The fans almost went into hysterics when their noble warrior had made his victim look as useless as a shooting gallery in the gangsters denizens of Chicago.

Both men answered the bell for the second fall, and slashed toward each other like ferocious Brahma bulls. Hammerlock became abnoxious, to the fans by joy riding on Gaston's spare ribs, while the young Gaston was in a helpless condition. But Gaston was no tenderfoot, and never whined, although the Borger Paderewski became unrelenting in terrific butting, and kicking toward the solar plexus, he seemed to turn lose some new trick every second, and they were becoming unbearable for our Tiger. Gaston's downfall was when he was trying to pull Hammerlock away from the ropes, and before Gaston realized what had happened Hammerlock snapped backwards like a rubber band being released and fell full weight on the Tiger, then scissored his head in a paralyzing position. Clyde Ash saw the situation and quickly pulled the hairy gorilla from Borger, who really leaped around so active like it made one think he was direct from the cocoa nut trees of darkest Africa. Gaston staggered to his feet, prac-

tically unconscious, and assisted by the fans was taken to the dressing room. He was unable to return at the end of his rest period, and the match was awarded to Hammerlock John. Gaston tried in vain to stagger to his feet and get back in the ring for the third and last fall, and when his weary limbs did not respond to his mighty courage, tears tumbled from his eyes like a rush of water set free from a tap. He sent word that if Hammerlock would allow him five minutes to recuperate, he would be able to return to the ring and finish the match. This argument was relayed to Hammerlock, who promptly refused to forfeit anything. The fans raised considerable fuss because the grinning Hammerlock refused to consider Gaston's plea for five more minutes.

After the match was awarded to Hammerlock he walked to the center of the ring and challenged any man, anywhere, any weight, and was quickly offered a match by Clyde Tipton, a huge tough looking cow boy who lives north of O'Donnell ten or twelve miles, weighs over 200 pounds, and has the reputation of never losing a match, it is reported. They decided to wrestle Friday night, February 7, here in O'Donnell, for whatever glory or money they can get out of it on a sixty forty basis.

**KING COTTON WILL EXTERM-
 INATE SOIL SAYS R. W. GARRY**

R. W. Garry, a successful farmer
 of O'Donnell firmly believes that
 thousands of acres of what was at
 one time fertile soil, is doomed if the
 farmers continue to plant cotton on
 it.

"Farming is different from what
 it was at one time" said Mr. Gary,
 and he continued, "Anyone could
 raise a good crop when all the land
 was new, and before so many crops
 of every kind were being planted. It
 is far different now, with worn out
 land, insects of every description, and
 low prices."

Mr. Garry says cotton takes lots
 of moisture from the land, as well as
 other minerals which are necessary to
 insure good growth and normal fruit.

He says it is very easy to tell land
 that has been cotton planted to death,
 as it will not raise anything to nor-
 mal height, and sheds cotton to such
 an extent that it is not profitable even
 if the seasons were good and the

price high.
 He said "I planted half my crop
 in feed this year, and only 65 acres
 in cotton and made 14 bales, but not
 a good feed crop, however I have
 sold lots of feed. I farm with machi-
 nery and think it is an inexpensive
 way to farm, especially if the opera-
 tor has enough mechanical sense to
 keep up the work on it, and not have
 to run to a garage every time some
 little thing goes wrong."

Mr. Garry believes if any farmer
 will study the game, rotate crops,
 raise lots of hogs and chickens, and
 good milk cows, he will have no need
 to worry about finances or bad crop
 years.

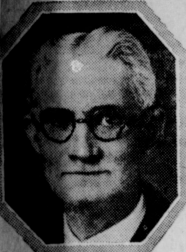

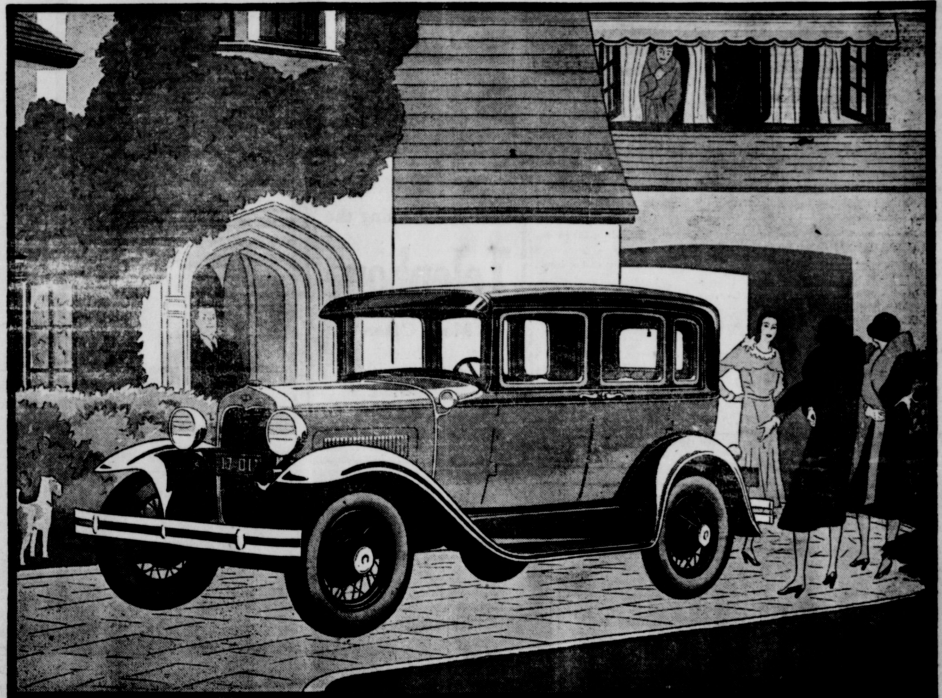

We wish to thank the O'Donnell Index, the Lynn County News, and the Wilson Pointer for getting our schedule out last week and for the prominence given it, although they received the material late.

We wish to thank too, Mr. B. F. Scott, Miss Mabel Draper, and Misses Willie and Eunice Little for so faithfully helping to prepare the schedule hurriedly as was necessary, and we hope the plan will prove as satisfactory as can be expected for a time so limited.

We tried to group schools most convenient to each other, and also according to their size. These groups had to be kept small because of the limited time in which to play, and because we wished to give each team two games with each opponent; one on its own court, and the other on that of the opponent.

Some teams must play two games per week, but only one of these will be played away from home, so if all arrangements are made in a business like way, not more than one-fourth day of school should be used.

We hope that a "good referee"

(and those two words pay a very high compliment to the character and ability of any person) may be obtained; one who is satisfactory to all concerned, and if possible, one who is in no way connected with either school and that everything will then be left to him that all will accept his decisions in a sportsmanlike manner. His task is difficult enough, and thankless enough, even if all do this. Remember that games must be refereed and that at least half of us must lose in these preliminaries, and the remainder of us at the finale.

We urge that all abide by the "Inter-scholastic League" rules to the letter, that preference be given to good pupils at all times, and that all refuse to play ineligible at any time. Let's avoid contention, "razzing," protests, and possible forfeiture of games won unfairly.

Let each player, each pupil, and each patron do his part for the reputation of his school and of his community, and all will be well.

Let's play for pleasure and for the rest of the game.

Road Meeting Held In Andrews Friday

Seeking a satisfactory highway system from Andrews, the county site of Andrews county, to surrounding cities a group of members of the county commissioners court and chambers of commerce of Dawson, Martin, Howard, Midland and Andrews counties met in Andrews Friday for the sole purpose of mapping out and designating highways which will serve the purpose of all neighboring towns and cities near Andrews. Hohn, W. E. Bartlett, C. M. Burton, county commissioners and Wm. A. Wilson, secretary of the Lamesa chamber of commerce.
