### PULLED PEPPERMINT CANDY

At every crossroads store in the South as in most other sections of the country, big striped peppermint sticks are still displayed prominently on candy counters. Always a favorite, a homemade variety of peppermint that the whole family will like is:

Pulled Peppermint Candy  
2½ cups sugar  
1 cup water  
2 tablespoons corn syrup  
2 tablespoons margarine  
peppermint flavoring  
green coloring

Put the sugar, water, corn syrup and cottonseed oil margarine in a saucepan over moderate heat and stir until dissolved. Cover and cook to long thread stage (248-254° F.).

Four into pans which have been greased with cottonseed oil margarine, and let cool only until it can be handled; then pull, adding peppermint flavoring and a little green coloring, if desired. While still soft pull in strips the size of little finger, and cut into desired lengths, dropping on waxed paper. Let stand until hard. The longer this candy stands, the creamier the sticks will become. It can be stored in air-tight tin boxes. Yields about 1½ pounds.

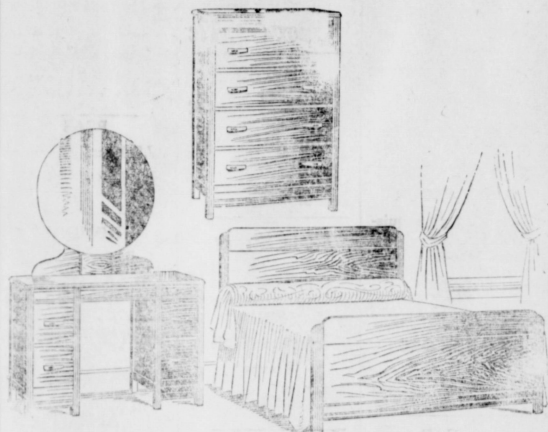

**ROAD IMPROVEMENTS**

LUBBOCK, November 27. —Construction and improvement of 1,406 miles of roads in the 24 counties contained in the Lubbock WPA district was listed as a major accomplishment of the Federal agency in a report released today by A. O. Jones, district manager.

"During the past five years local and state agencies have cooperated admirably in West Texas to provide work for thousands of jobless persons on projects of permanent public value," Jones declared. "We are proud of the character of work which has been performed in this section by WPA workers since this program was started in July, 1935."

Jones pointed out that 1,393 miles of the roads which have been built and improved by WPA workers in this area were over farm-to-market trade routes. Included in the road program was the construction of 31 new bridges and 883 new culverts and the improvement of 214 existing structures.

Throughout the West Texas area WPA workers have built and reconstructed 42 public buildings, including 13 schools, 17 gymnasiums and recreational buildings, and two office and administrative buildings.

On school campuses in this district eight new stadiums and seven athletic fields have been constructed and one existing stadium and two athletic fields have been improved. Other recreational facilities created include six swimming pools, 19 tennis courts and two golf courses.

Airway markers were installed in 23 localities to facilitate air transportation.

Under the heading of public utilities Jones listed the construction and improvement of three storage dams, three water storage tanks, and one new treatment plant. Water mains were extended and improved over a total of 20 miles and 393 water consumer connections were installed. More than ten miles of storm and sanitary sewer lines were installed and 392 sewer service connections were made.

In the public health improvement program 4,232 sanitary service privies were built and 3,840 acres of lowlands were drained to aid in mosquito control.

Major physical accomplishments were listed for Lynn County as follows:
