When they study the Bible, they soon learn that their philosophy of marriage has caused them to transgress the scriptural limits of the will of God. They can never be sure that their course of action is right, and their minds will always be filled with doubt, fear, and unhappi-

Parents! Let's not add to the delinquency of our children by fail-ing to instruct them in the way of the Lord. "Train up a child in the way he should go, and even when he is old he will not depart from it " (Proverbs 22:6) The church can help you to come to an understanding of the Word of God, which is the only authoritative set of rules for living that the world has known.
