Lyntegar Seeks New Members

To the Farmers in the Area Served by the Lyntegar Electric Co-operative:

We have just received a letter from Mr. C. O. Falkenwald, Director of the Examining Division of the Rural Electrification Administration at Washington, which reads as follows:

"Dear Sir: With your help and the support of Congress, tremendous strides have been made in rural electrification during the past few years. The program has been so successfully carried out through co-operative efforts that Congress has just recently provided \$100,000,000 for rural electrification for the fiscal year 1940-41."

"Now is the time to act to round out our existing systems and to complete our area rural electrification program. Very truly yours, C. O. Falkenwald, Director Examining Division."

Section A of this project consists of 330 miles of electric lines which are now in operation. Section B, which is now under construction, consists of 350 miles of line. Beginning this week, as portions of the line are completed they will be energized, and the entire section will be energized by the 1st of July. We are beginning an intensive campaign for new members on our present lines and we are also beginning work on new extensions for Section C of our project. We are required to have three members per mile or a revenue of \$7.35 per mile. If you are interested in working up an extension in your community get in touch with one of the following directors: Frank Harris, Route 1, Ackerly, Texas; James F. Daniels, Meadow; J. F. Maxey, Route 1, Post; Bert Eads, Levelland; C. M. Burton, Lamesa; A. R. Hensley, Route 2, Tahoka; the writer, or someone at the Cooperative office at Tahoka.

It is the desire of this Cooperative, as well as the Rural Electrification Administration of Washington, to serve every farmer that is possible for us to serve, and when we can be of any service to you please feel free to call on us.

HOG ORDINANCE LAW

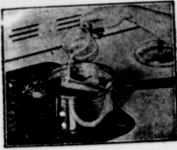
TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN—

Douglas is past president of the Lubbock County Young Democratic Club.

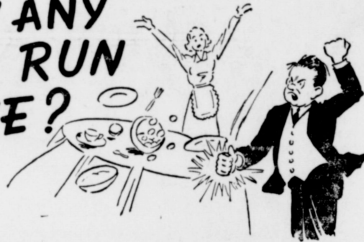

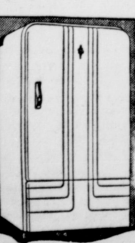

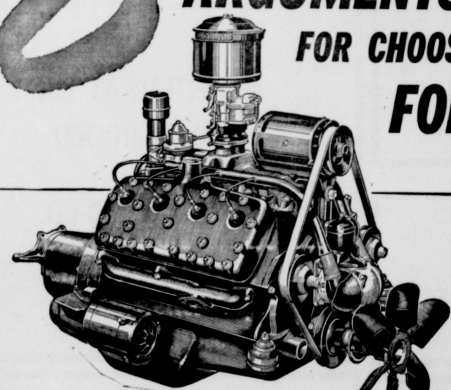
