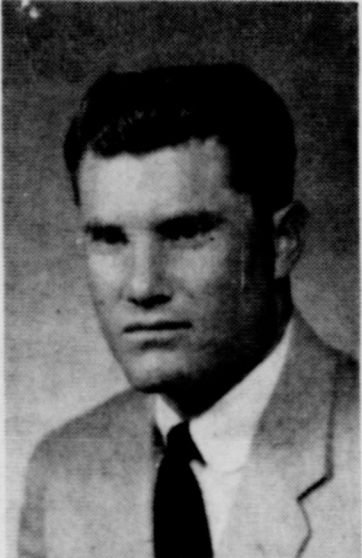

Records Needed By All

"People who work for themselves on a farm or in a business, trade or profession should keep complete and accurate records of all their business transactions," John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office, pointed out. Maintaining complete and accurate records is good business from many standpoints and these records are particularly valuable when income tax time rolls around.

For these businessmen, Federal tax returns are not only used to report the amount of their income for income tax purposes but are also used to report the self employment income for social security credits. This means that the eligibility to social security benefits for these individuals and the amount of their monthly benefits are dependent on the accuracy of their tax returns and the accuracy of the basic records on which these returns have been prepared.

Mr. Hutton commented that in many cases his office is required to verify the income reported on the self employment tax returns. The lack of good records has in some instances caused considerable delays in awarding claims for benefits and in several cases has resulted in actual loss of benefits. So do not gamble on losing what you may be entitled to — keep an accurate and complete record of all your business transactions.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in O'Donnell on Nov. 19 at 2 p. m. at the Elementary School and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.

V. A. Quiz

Q — Is there a deadline date for starting school under the War Orphans Educational program?

A — There is no deadline date. You may begin school at any time, no longer as you are between 18 and 23 years of age. Under certain circumstances it is possible to begin before 18 and continue after 23.

Q — I have an idea for a mail order business which I could conduct from my place of residence. Can I get a GI home loan to buy a house in which I would plan also to conduct my own business?

A — Yes, provided the house will be used primarily for residential purposes and will not contain more than one business.

Q — I need to write the VA on a question about my GI insurance but can't find my insurance number.

What kind of information will help VA in identifying me and my policy?
A — Give the VA your full name, your branch of service, date of separation from service, your serial number, and the date and place of your birth. This information should enable VA to identify your policy.

Q — I am a disabled Korea veteran who never held a GI insurance policy. Now that the VA has declared my disability service connected I understand I can apply for a GI insurance policy. How soon do I have to apply?

A — You must make application within one year from the date VA found your disability service connected.

POLIO CASES DOWN SHARPLY

Before the advent of the Salk vaccine, Texans prayed for a release from the ravages of paralytic polio for themselves and for their children. The picture has changed a great deal since then. With the announcement that Dr. Jonas Salk had developed an effective vaccine for the prevention of polio, parents swarmed to their doctors and clinics to have their children protected. Since then the incidence of paralytic polio has fallen many fold and an apathetic state of mind has fallen on many Texans concerning the need for protecting themselves. Many school children have received their shots, resulting in a favorable vaccination picture among school age children. As a result this year and last year has seen the preschool age children with the highest attack rate of paralytic polio.

Who should be vaccinated. Every one can benefit from polio vaccine inoculations since the disease strikes all ages. However the present susceptible groups — from infants to age 49. You are not adequately protected unless you have all three shots properly spaced. The second shot is given two to six weeks after the first and the third 7 to 12 months after the second. It is important to have that third shot.

WIDESPREAD ATTACK OF
DISEASE IS EXPECTED

While there is no indication at
this time of widespread attacks of
disease this winter, there un-
doubtedly will be some cases of
illness as colder weather ap-
proaches. Vaccination against it is a
best measure for certain groups
of individuals.
Principal targets for vaccination
would be groups wishing to guard
against absenteeism in their pro-
fessions and occupations and those
whom the disease might be an ad-
vantage.

There are now ample supplies of
influenza vaccine of the type con-
taining immunizing materials against
the important strains of influen-
za, including the Asian strain.
Last year this time Texas was
hit for an expected epidemic of
influenza, so called because it had
been diagnosed in Hong Kong.
The first cases were reported in
Texas in that Oriental city and
within five months later Texas had
been thoroughly seeded with the
virus.
There is no expectation of a sim-
ilar outbreak this fall.

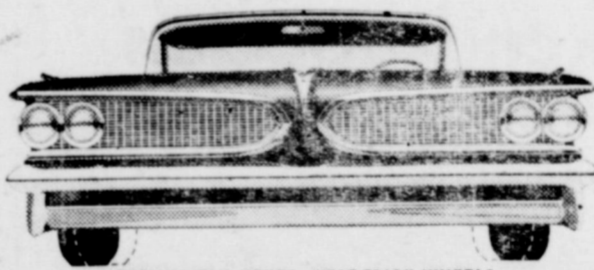

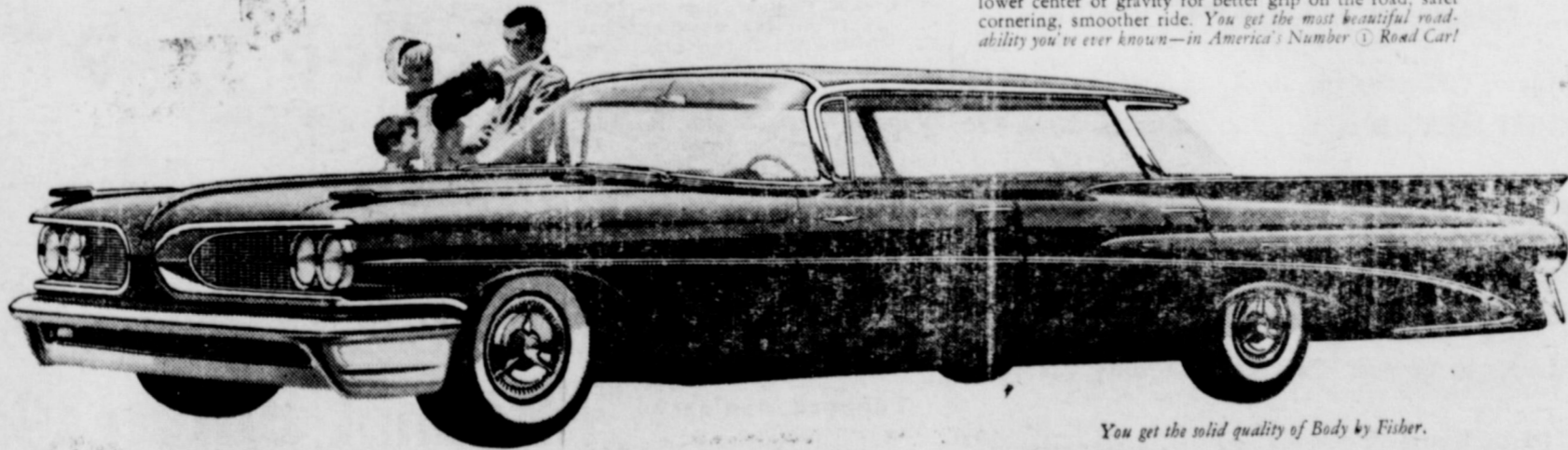
