A shepherd maid wept at having no gift to lay before the Babe in the gift to lay before the Bace in the manger. Suddenly an angel ap-peared to her. On hearing why the maiden wept, the angel touched the ground where her tears had fallen and immediately the place was white with Christmas roses, which the maid gathered and laid in the

manger. The chrysanthemum is said to have appeared first on Christmas Eve near the manger as a sign to the Wise Men that they had reached the spot where the star had bidden them.






