CITY COUNCIL PASSES ORDINANCE REGULATING THE SALE OF JAKE

People coming here from Tahoka say that O'Donnell is dubbed "Jake City" in our county seat town. If such allegation is true we are going to those prestige in living up to the name for the City Council has set its disapproval on vendors of this jubilating beverage by making a law placing certain restrictions on its disposal to those who are want to have a gay and gladsome feeling. FIRE TRUCK MET AT POST BY CITIZENS AND ESCORTED HOME

A party of about fifty accompanied by the band, went over to Post Tuesday afternoon to meet the new fire truck and escort it home. A parade with the truck leading, followed by the band was pulled off in Post and that little city turned out a large delegation to witness the display. The party was welcomed by the mayor at Post, who made a neat little speech complimenting the citizens of O'Donnell on their progressiveness. The return trip was made by the way of Tahoka where another parade and concert was given.

When the party returned to O'Donnell a grand parade was made around the business section of town and the truck was welcomed by everyone.

The new machine is an American La France and is of the best type for fighting a fire in its incipency, being equipped with two large chemical tanks and four small ones, extension ladders, fire axes etc. It is mounted on a high speed Graham truck and can pickup to 50 miles an hour in one block. The words "O'Donnell Fire Department" is painted on the hood of the engine.

The machine will be kept temporarily in one of the garages where a night man is on duty to operate the truck should a fire alarm be sent in. The City Council plans to construct a building near the city hall to take care of the machine and house other fire fighting paraphernalia.

An electrical siren has ben ordered and will be placed over the fire department. It is said that this siren can be heard for adistance of from five to ten miles.

Schools For Better Service

The service promotion department of the Chevrolet Motor Company, in its work of establishing throughout the nation a uniform standard of service for Chevrolet owners, is doubling the number of Chevrolet service instruction schools.

Before the first of the year it is expected that 20 of these schools will be in operation. Through their painstaking instruction of mechanics, foreman and proprietors of Chevrolet service stations the schools are assuring to every Chevrolet owner the highest degree of continued driving satisfaction.

J. P. Litte, manager of parts and service for the Chevrolet Motor company, has joined and co-ordinated the field force of his service promotion division, with the service schools. Formerly the two were operated independently. Now 75 men are engaged in the joint work of school instruction and service promotion.

Separate courses of one week each are given at the service schools for Chevrolet mechanics, service foremen and service station owners. The mechanics work under skilled instructors in model shops. The course for service foremen is slightly more comprehensive, while that for service station owners goes into such details as shop layout, service department administration, maintenance of parts stocks, the flat rate system, account keeping, etc.

"The service schools and the service promotion work hand in hand," said Mr. Little. "A dealer, having seen a model Chevrolet shop in operation at the school, usually is already 'sold' when a service promotion representative later visits him and suggests that he rearrange his service department in accordance with one of the several Chevrolet model plants and install the latest specially designed Chevrolet precision tools. He knows that the move will reduce his costs and increase his business.

"If a dealer wants a model service department, the service promotion representative directs the work without charge and remains until it is installed and in satisfactory operation. So many dealers have entered requests for the model service stations that the department is several weeks behind in the work of installation."

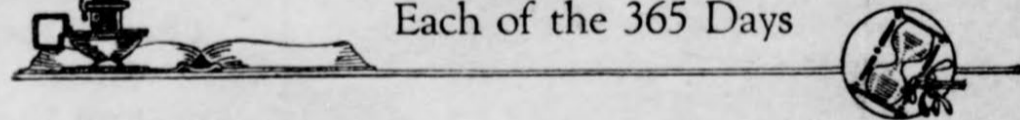

At least they always complete the work they undertake and make their reports on time.

Iwilda lives and attends school at Pride, but when she found that there was not enough interest at Pride to O'Donnell Club and went to work. Here is a report of what she has accomplished this year.

She had a Spring garden in which she raised 14 varieties of vegetables, 7 varieties. Estimated value of her and a Fall garden in which she raised year's garden \$50.00.

But Iwilda's productive product was poultry. She raised 100 purebred chickens, selling 20 of them for \$12.00, keeping 80 at home. Valuing these 80 at \$1.00 each would be \$80.00. The sale of 12 dozen eggs brought \$2.00. Iwilda also raised 100 turkeys and sold 82 of them for \$124.00. She culled her flock of 45 hens discarding 20 of them, the market value of these being \$15.00. Thus her showing in poultry this year is \$234.00.

During the canning season Iwilda found time to put up for home use 20 pts. fruit, 12 glasses jelly, 16 qts. preserves, 26 qts. pickles and relishes. The total value of her Food Preservation Work being \$39.40.

In her clothing work Iwilda made her Club cap, cup towel, hot dish holder and sewing bag. She also made 2 dresses, 2 pieces underwear, 1 hat and 2 made over garments.

To make her bed room more attractive Iwilda made pretty sheets, pillow cases and window curtains. The total value of her Clothing work being \$24.90.

Every Club Girl knows that home cannot be an inviting and cheerful place to come to if the yards are neglected. So Iwilda kept the yards clean, painted vines about the house and bright colored flowers in the garden. This is one feature of Club work that is never estimated in dollars and cents. But it is a phase of

work that every true Club girl tries to excel in. To make home a comfortable, self sustaining and soul satisfying place is something worth working for and this report shows that Iwilda Allen, of Pride, Texas, has been doing her part.

We have plans, and are already beginning to organize at least 16 more troops, reaching approximately 500 boys this year.
