MAHON ASKS LOAN BASIS FOR LIGHT SPOT COTTON

Lubbock — Rep. George Mahon has wired Secretary Benson urging him to immediately set in motion plans which will guarantee a loan basis on light spot cotton for the 1957 crop year.

This action followed a meeting in Lubbock of representative farmers from about 30 West Texas counties on November 28th. At the meeting a resolution was unanimously approved calling upon the Department of Agriculture to include specific loan on light spot cotton in the government loan program.

Attending the meeting presentatives of the Plains Cotton Growers Assn., Farm Bureau and Farmers Union. Other industry and producer groups were also represented

In his message to Secretary Ben son. Mr. Mahon pointed out that the nation's cotton growers were losing millions of dollars annually by reason of the refusal of the Department to grant a special loan on light spot cotton Mahon pointed out that over a period of years he had joined with other West Texans in seeking a special loan on light spot cotton. This year such a loan was endorsed by the House Committee on Agriculture in a report made to Congress and a Congressional hearing was held in Green-ville, Texas in October at which time the Department of Agriculture was condemned for its failure to provide for a special loan on light spot cotton for the 1956 crop.





God's Cure For Sin

It has never been within man's ability to atone (make amends) for his own sin. We cannot by doing a multitude of good deeds make

for his own sin. We cannot by doing a multitude of good deeds make for our transgression of God's law. Since separation from God is the result of sin, this simply means that God won't listen to our pleas until atonement has been made for our sins. (cf Isaiah 59:2)

That Christ died for us is taught in many places. (cf Romans 5;7-9:1 John 1:7.) Now, since Jesus died to atone for our sins, does that mean that all men will be saved by his sacrifice? Indeed it does not. Christ died to make it "possible" for men to have their sins forgiven through him, but no one is "compelled" to come to him for salvation. This is expressed in the statement, "And being made perfect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that fect, he became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that OBEY him." Hebrews 5:9.) To the man who does not obey Christ,

Since we must obey Jesus there is something "we" must "do" to accept him and having accepted him, we must continue to obey him. We read, "There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are "in" Christ Jesus," (Romans 8:1.) If we can learn how we get into Christ where there is no condemnation, we will also learn how we may accept the sacrifice Jesus offered on our behalf on the cross. Thus in Romans 6:3 we read, "Know ye not, that so many of us as were BAPTIZED INTO JESUS CHRIST were baptized into his death?" Baptism, therefore, is the means of our getting into Christ where there is no condemnation and where there is forgiveness of sin. We should note, however, that baptism is not acceptable in God's sight unless it is preceded and accompanied by belief (John 3:16) and repentance (Acts 2:38.) But baptism is the means of getting into Christ which is the only place where we may avail ourselves of his sacrifice for our sins.




