A Snyder justice-of-the-peace ruled death was self-inflicted by a gunshot wound after Delvin Ludecke, 28, of Rt. 1, O'Donnell, was ound dead shortly after 1 p. m. Thursday on Farm Road 1610.

Cone Merritt of Snyder made the ruling Thursday afternoon following an investigation. Ludecke's body was discovered by his brother, Bill. He was found slumped inside a 1964 pickup and time of death was about 12 hours prior to the time the body was discovered, officials said.

Staying At Lake The pickup was 16 feet inside the Scurry County line, about one mile north of Boyd's Lodge near Lake J. B. Thomas. Ludecke had

been staying at his brother's cabin on the lake for some time. A .22-caliber rifle was found near the body. Merritt ruled that Ludecke had died of a single

New Cotton Variety Tests Are Planned

Dr. G. N. Stroman, developer of 1517 Acala cotton varieties, has joined the farmer-owned Growers Seed Association of Lubbock to carry out an extensive cotton research program for the Plains, Rolling Plains and Southwestern Oklahoma, according to George Babcock, manager.

He will strive to incorporate some of the Acala varieties' good fiber qualities and added length into cotton varieties that can be grown successfully by Plains area farmers.

Dr. Stroman is world renowned for his cotton breeding research. He is a graduate of Texas A&MU. received his doctorate from U. of Wisconsin, is a former professor of agronomy at New Mexico State U., carried out cotton breeding research in Peru, and has since continued his research program at Las Cruces, N. M.

His goal is to produce varieties to produce a fiber with a staple length of 31-32 to 1 1-32 inch adaptable to Plains harvesting methods and having a Presslev strength test of at least 90 000 pounds per square inch and a micronaire range of 3-7 to 4.4.

New Board For **County Library**

Lynn County Library board has been recognized and approved by the Commissioners Court of Lynn County in order that new life may be injected into the project and in order that certain requirements may be met to conform to regulations of Texas State Li-

As a result of the reorganization and official approval by the Court, certain additional benefits may be received from the State

At a recent meeting of people interested in the library, ten directors were proposed and these were approved Monday by the Commissioners Court. They include four old members, Mrs. G. M. Stewart, representing study clubs; Mrs. Gladys M. Stokes, representing business women; Mrs. Madeline Hegi, public schools; and Frank Hill, civic clubs.

New members named to the board include: Stephen Thompson, professional men; W. Garland Thornton, city of Tahoka; George Sealy, New Home; Dan Cook, Wilson; Elvin Ray Moore and Mrs. Guy Bradley, O'Donnell.

The library was started 28 years ago by Phebe K. Warner Club of Tahoka with Mrs. Stewart in charge, and she has been the leading worker for the library ever

When the Rotary Club remodeled the old City Hall into a Boy Scout Hut, space was given for the library. The County and City of Tahoka have helped financially with the project over the years. For a number of years, Mrs. A. J. Kaddatz has been the efficient librarian.

The library now has 10,000 books. Through the summer months 140 to 160 people check out books weekly, and up to 7,000 a year are checked out.

Directors hope to extend the scope of book usage by securing greater interest over the entire

county. Mrs. Rosalyne T. Shamblin, field consultant of Texas State Library, has recently made recommendations which the board hopes to implement in the near future for more extended use of the library, which is free to all Lynn county citizens.

Austin-One and one-half million "passports to paradise"-that is hunting and fishing licenseshave been put in the mail for distribution to Texas sportsmen.

Rural Accident Report Made

The Highway Patrol investigated five rural traffic accidents in Lynn county during the month of July, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for one person injured and an estimated property damage of \$2,650.00.

The rural traffic accident summary in Lynn county for the first seven months of 1965 shows a total of 34 crashes resulting in two persons killed, 15 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$15,943.00.

PRESTIGE PLATES NOW AVAILABLE

Personalized, prestige auto license plates can now be secured on application, accompanied by a \$10.00 fee, through Lynn county tax office and George McCracken, tax assessor and collector.

Mr. McCracken has received forms for the application under a new Texas law to help finance the Texas program for tourism, recreation and State parks. The fee for the special privilege is in addition to normal auto registration charges.

But, once a person has one of these plates approved he may maintain such permanently on an annual renewal basis.

The applicant may submit three choices, each a combination of letters or numbers not to exceed six units. This may be his first name, last name, telephone number, dog's name, or a combination of letters and numerals, so long as such does not conflict with the Texas Highway Department's regular license plate number system or some such name, number or combination already issued to some other person.



The home site of a tribe of Caddo Indians who lived about 1000 A.D. near Alto, in Cherokee County, today supports a forest of small trees. This is the site of Texas Forest Service Indian Mound Nursery, located six miles southwest of Alto, along State Highway 21 when he was the Mothe Pinner. state Highway 21 where it crosses the Neches River.

Only a granite monument atop a 30 feet high, "L" shaped mound testifies to the Indians' having been there. A portion of the mound and surrounding area was excavated in 1940 by the Department of Anthropology of the University of Texas. Although no important artifacts were found, items of pottery, flints and sites of several houses were located. Archaeologists believe the mound was used as a place to worship their sun god. Occasionally, pleces of pottery and flints are unearthed as the area area the mound is cultivated by nursery personnel.

Presence of several constantly flowing springs nearby probably secounts for the Indians' use of the area. Availability of surface wates for irrigation was a major factor in selecting the area as

To the citizens of nearby Alto goes a large amount of credit for their part in purchase of the 173 acres in 1940.

The nursery produces tree seedlings for reforestation in Texas. Initial production in 1940 was about 10 million seedlings. Maximum capacity is about 21 million seedlings which are sold to Texas landowners at cost.

Trees are to be used for reforestation and windbreak planting; none are sold for ornamentals or for landscaping.

Longer Vehicles Due On Roads

The Legislature has seen fit to allow the operation of longer vehicles on Texas highways. These vehicles can be maximum of 65 feet. The present length for a combination of vehicles is 50 feet. The law has been changed as a result of the trucking industry seeking to improve the efficiency and quality of service to the pub-

These combinations commonly known as "double-bottoms," although used extensively, are virtually unknown in many areas of the country. Texas has been one of those areas. However, beginning September 1, 1965, we will begin seeing the "big-rigs" on our roads. Our purpose in this article is

to acquaint the motoring public with the fact that the bigger and longer vehicles will be on our roads. And, though we occasionally see a long truck, mobile home. or some oil field equipment on the highway and we need to drive accordingly-these are not too numerous. The "double-bottoms" will be there day and night, especially on our thru highways.

In the past a vehicle combination of this type would have re quired a permit and would not have been allowed on the road way at night.

Since the picture is changin-Texas motorists will need change some driving habits. Loc for these longer and larger ve hicles at night.

Naturally your question is, co they "fit" into present day trafic? Let's look at the turning movements of these 65 fee' ength "double-bottoms." Accord ing to Traffic Safety, a Nationa' Safety Council publication, the Department of Commerce save that, after tests they ran. the ar feet combinations have less off tracking than the 50 feet, five axle tractor semitrailers.

"For a 90 degree turn, such city street intersection, the feet 'double' has a track width 2" feet narrower than the 50 feet tractor semitrailer."

Turning on the cloverleaf intersections of the Interstate System, the Department of Commerce tests show the "doubles" are 1.2 feet narrower than those of the smaller combinations.




