Mother Charged In Death of Own **Baby Monday**

Murder charges alleging that she had killed her own three months oli child were filed against Mrs. Joe Porter of the New Home community Monday before Justice Jim Dye, prec. 1.

Preliminary hearing was waived and the case was bound over to await action of the Grand Jury which convenes February 3, so officers say. Bail was set at \$3,000.

No statements were made for publication by officers regarding their findings except that Mrs. Porter is alleged to have said that she had not hurt the baby in any way.

Mrs. Porter, so the same sources declared, ran from her home Saturday morning to where her husband was working in a field and told him that the baby was ill. He, in turn, rushed it to a hospital in Lubbock, and attending physicians said that the baby had been poisoned with Lysol. Authorities were later notified and charges filed.

Census Figures For Major Cities

Final population for all cities in the United States having 100,000 inhabitants or more were released by the Bureau of the Census a few days ago. There are 92 such cities in the United States.

Of these 92, only four are situated in Texas, these being Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, and Fort Worth. Fifteen others are situated in the South, and three, Baltimore, St. Louis, and Louisville, are situated on the borderland between the North and the South.

There are still just five cities in the United States with over one million population, the same five that had more than a million in 1930. These are: New York with a population of 7,454,995 in 1940 against 6,930,446 in 1930; Chicago, 3,396,808 in 1940, 3,376,438 in 1930; Philidelphia,, 1,931,334 in 1940 against 1,950,961 in 1930; Detroit, 1,-623,452 in 1940 against 1,568,662 in 1930; Los Angeles, 1,504,277 in 1940 against 1,238,048 in 1930.

It will be seen from the above figures that Philidelphia actually lost more than 19,000 in population in the decade while Chicago gained only a measley 20,000. New York made a gain of more than a half million or more than 7 1-2 per cent. Los Angeles made the largest percentage gain, 21 1-2 percent. Detroit's gain was only 3 1-2 percent.



Whooping cough is usually transmitted by direct contact with the secretion of the mouth or with articles freshly soiled with the secretion. Only a short exposure is required to contract the infection. The communicable stage extends from seven days to three weeks after exposure until development of the characteristic whoop.

Among precautionary measures to be considered by parents as protecing cough are the following:




