Charles Gifford, ranch manager of the newly organized SOUTH PLAINS BOYS RANCH at Tahoka spoke at the O'Donnell Lions Club last Wednesday at noon.

The Boys Ranch got underway shortly after Christmas and is located one mile east and one mile south of Tahoka city limits. A large two-story house, given to the project, has been moved to the ranch, also donated.

Plans are being made for the Ranch to care for as many as 15 boys currently in the Ranch has its headquarters in a house in Tahoka until the ranch house has been made suitable for being occupied. Eight boys are in the project -- 2 from Lamesa, 3 from Lubbock, 1 from Pecos, and one from Kermit. A breakdown on ages shows one of the eight youths is 9 years old, two are 14, three are 15 and one is 15. The budget of the Ranch figures a monthly cost of \$60 per boy (Gatesville figures \$1500 a year per boy) and parents or other kin may pay if able otherwise the counties involved pay in ratio to cases. The State of Texas does NOT help as the State supports PENAL institutions. Ask your legislative and senate candidates how they feel on welfare aid to boy ranches of the state.

The boys attend the Tahoka school, go to church in Tahoka and will produce much of their food on the ranch. The Ranch does not admit Negroes. The Index failed to learn if there are any colored boy ranches in Texas. If not there should be.

The Ranch is not only for boys in trouble but youths who, for various reasons, are in the project by a parent (next of kin) due to death, illness, etc. The kids are never criminals but children like yours and mine who need help.

Mr. Gifford is a fine looking, red-dish haired man in his early 30's, big as a football tackle and a smile as wide open as our Plains. He has an evangelistic quality in his personality when he talks about boys--especially "his boys". He came to Tahoka after being ranch manager of Odessa Boys Ranch and had over 70 youths on the ranch. Of that total he "lost" only two to Gatesville.

Critical Ages Given Mr. Gifford said the critical age of a boy is from 14 to 18 years. He has found a common theme in problems of youths (both boys and girls) is triggered by broken homes and other problems of the home. Mr. Gifford visited the index office especially to thank Mrs. J. A. Johnson and others from here who have contributed material items as well as money. Mr. Gifford said that O'Donnell has responded in a wonderful manner.

The Ranch will move to its new home about April 1st or so, and open house is set for sometime this spring. Mr. Gifford invites visitors at any time.

Charles is married and has two daughters under school age. His wife does the cooking and "mothers" the boys. For the past few months Mr. Gifford has worked without formal pay to get the project a going concern.

In short when a boy has a problem there are only two places he can go -- Gatesville -- or to a boys ranch.

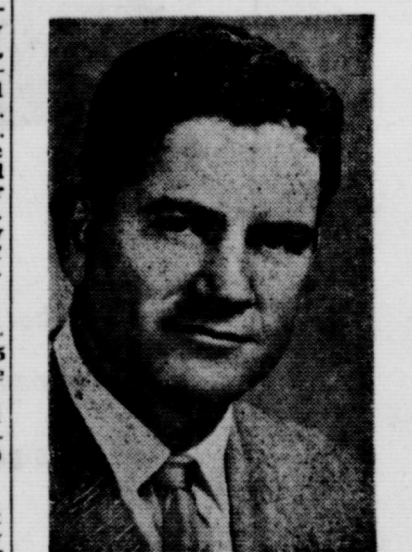
Wesley Roberts Seeks Senate Seat

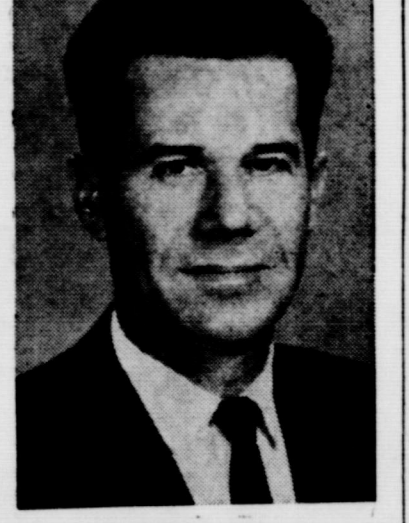

INFANTS ARE VICTIMS OF DYSENTERY

Dysentery, while not a major killer among Texas, still claims many lives each year. Sadly most deaths occur among infants under one year of age. Last year there was a ten percent increase of shigellosis -- the technical name for bacillary dysentery. At the end of the year, the 1961 total stood at 3,915 cases compared to 3,420 cases at end of 1960.

The total deaths from dysentery have not been compiled for 1961 however in 1960 there were 73 deaths from the disease with 53 percent among infants. Dysentery is transmitted by eating contaminated foods, or drinking contaminated water or milk and by hand to mouth transfer of contaminated material, by flies, by objects soiled with feces of a patient or a carrier. This is one of the reasons foodhandlers should wash their hands thoroughly before any food preparation. Also foods which are moist or eaten raw require special attention in washing and preparation. Fly control and control of fly breeding are important steps in fighting this disease. Control of existing flies can be done by screening, fly traps and by contact poisons and space sprays. Fly breeding can be controlled with adequate garbage collection and disposal.

INTERNAL REVENUE GIVES RULING ON STUDENTS

Even though your child earned \$600 or more last year, you as a parent may be able to claim him as a dependent on that 1961 federal income tax return.

This good news came today from John J. Sloan, Administrative Officer, Internal Revenue Service, Lubbock.

"If you have supplied more than half of his support, you may claim an exemption for him regardless of the amount he earned, providing he hadn't reached his 19th birthday by January 1, 1962.

"When the child is 19 or over, you still may claim an exemption for him if he was a full time student during some part of each of five calendar months in 1961, and if you furnish his chief support. A full time student is one who is enrolled for the number of hours which is considered to be full time attendance." Frequently taxpayers can save time by telephoning Internal Revenue for answers to their tax problems.

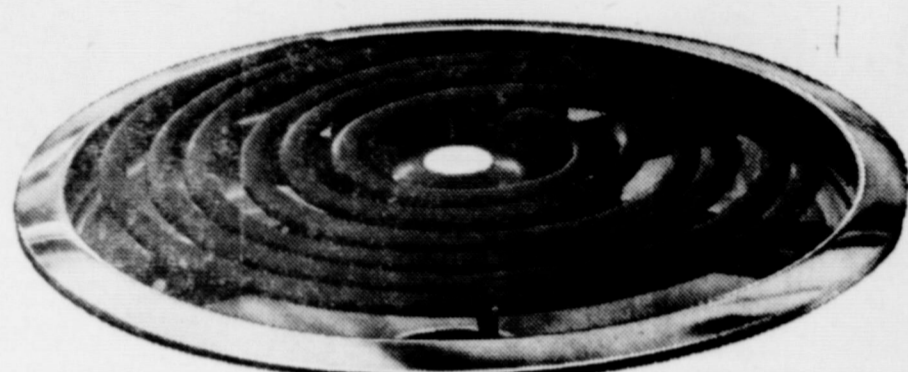

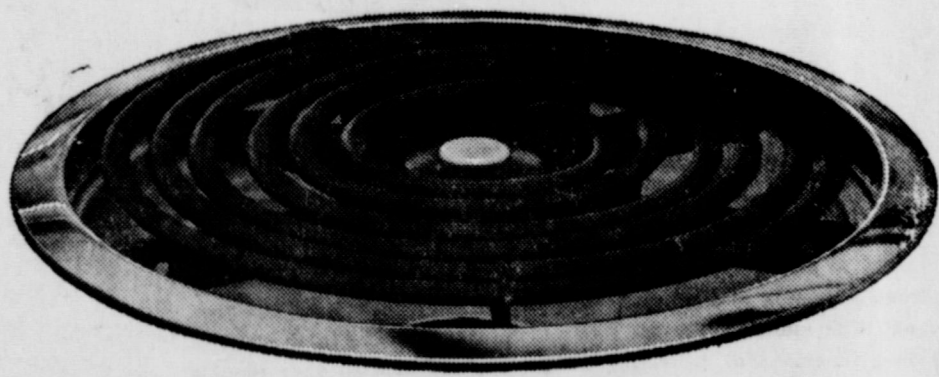

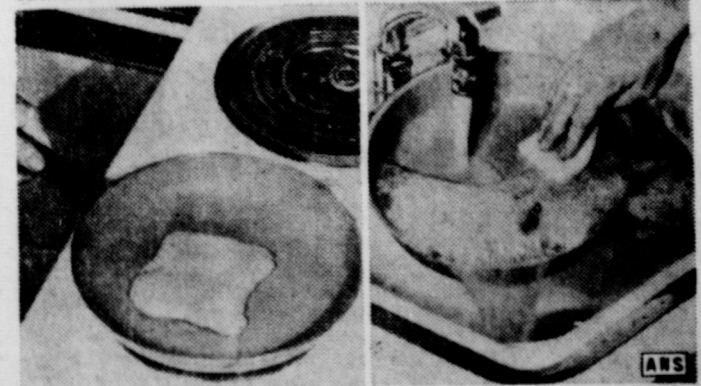

STRAWBERRY ALMOND JAM
 Almond extract
 Sliced blanched almonds
 4½ cups prepared fruit (about 2 qts. ripe strawberries)
 7 cups (3 lbs.) granulated sugar
 1 box Sure-Jell fruit pectin



Place ½ teaspoon almond extract and 1 tablespoon sliced almonds in bottom of each scalded glass (or in just one or several of the glasses, if desired.)

Crush completely, one layer at a time, about 2 quarts fully ripe strawberries. Measure 4½ cups into a very large (8qts.) saucepan.

Measure sugar and set aside. Add powdered fruit pectin to fruit in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and stir until mixture comes to a hard boil. At once stir in sugar. Bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and skim off foam with metal spoon. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Stir to mix with almond extract. Cover jam at once with ½ inch hot paraffin. Makes about 11 medium glasses.

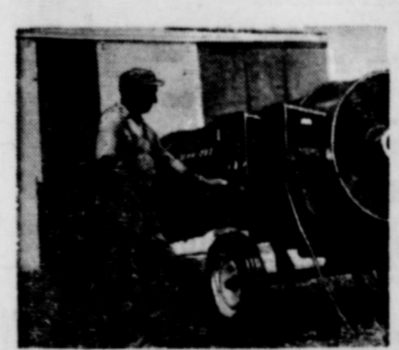
