New School Term To Open Here Monday Morning

One of the largest registrations in the history of O'Donnell schools is expected when the 1940-41 term opens here next Monday morning. Approximately 220 students are due to be registered in High school, so says S. F. Johnson, superintendent.

A short program will mark the opening of the next term Monday morning, with enrollment following until noon.

O'Donnell Has New Teachers
Supt. S. F. Johnson of the O'Donnell schools, an affiliated high school of high rank, will open the year Monday with several new teachers.

Ray DeBusk, O'Donnell boy, graduate of Howard Payne college, will be high school coach; Davis Alderson of Daniel Baker college, assistant coach; Miss Mary Paul Long, Texas Tech, and Miss Billie Keeler, Howard Payne, grade teachers. There will also be a negro teacher for O'Donnell's new negro school.

Other teachers are: Jack Snodgrass, high school principal; Miss Oleta Moore, home ec.; Mrs. Paul Gooch, grade school principal; Mrs. Maurine Cahay, Olin Huff, Miss Alne Nunnally, Elizabeth Morris, Mable Harris and Virgie Hanes, Miss Irene Vermillion, Faye Westmoreland and Carl Revis. Miss Harris received her M. A. degree at Texas Tech Friday night, majoring in English, and writing her thesis on Browning's Dramatic Lyrics. Mrs. Revis received a B. A. degree at the same institution.

Joe Bailey In Litigation
Since the Joe Bailey school district is awaiting the decision of a higher court's action on the contested consolidation with O'Donnell, the first six grades of the school have been contracted to O'Donnell and these children will be transported there for instruction. High school students will transfer to O'Donnell or Draw and most of them are likely to go to O'Donnell.

Wells School Ready
Wells school teaches through the ninth grade and transfers the remainder of its high school students to O'Donnell.

Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton Still and Miss Gray, the latter being a Mrs. are the teachers. Mr. Still received a B. A. degree Friday night from Texas Tech.

Midway Opens Sept. 16
Midway opens September 16, and will teach nine grades—transferring the others to Tahoka.

V. P. Carter, principal, and Misses Lottie Stephens and Ovell Warren will return as teachers of the school.

County Receives Rain Sunday; Fall Very Scattered

Scattered rain fell in Lynn county Sunday night with the heaviest downpour falling north of O'Donnell in a strip extending from the general direction of Joe Bailey community west to Newmore. Reports of 2 1/2- to 3 inches were reported.

Vote In County Fairly Heavy In Primary Saturday

With a shortened ballot to contend with, voters made quick work of their voting last Saturday, and returned one county official to office and ousted two others.

Sheriff B. L. Parker again demonstrated that he has no superior in the county when it comes to carrying the votes by defeating Tom N. Hale for sheriff. Parker was elected to his sixth term as sheriff.

Chester Connolly, who lacked only a scant amount of votes in the first primary for a majority over his two opponents, showed his strength again and won handsily over his opponent, incumbent P. W. Goad.

Ray Weatherly continued his fast race for assessor-collector by defeating another heretofore vote-getter, Aubra Cade.

Only one member remains of the present commission court, Waldo McLaurin of O'Donnell. A new county judge and three new commissioners will take office January 1.

In precinct 2, Lonnie Williams defeated Sam Holland, incumbent, by 88 votes, the figures being 483 for Williams and 395 for Holland.

In precinct 4, Leon Jennings outdistanced Truman Balch by 49 votes; Jennings 321, Balch 272.

In precinct 3, there were only two candidates in the first primary, and the incumbent, Waldo McLaurin, noted out John Anderson by a few votes.

As in the state at large, Olin Culbertson was a favorite also in Lynn county for railroad commissioner, receiving 1951 votes to 1409 for Pierce Brooks.

For some reason, many of the voters evidently left the names of both candidates for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court unscratched. Only 3169 votes were reported in this contest. Lattimore was a favorite in this county, though he lost out in the state. He received 1953 votes against 1216 for Alexander.

District Attorney Race
In the race for district attorney, Rollin McCord carried this county by a vote of considerably more than two to one. His vote was 2331 against 1001 for Burton Hackney.

Complete unofficial returns from the six counties of the district gave McCord a majority of 1466 votes.

Court Is Asking For State Funds

Judge P. W. Goad and the four county commissioners, George Small, Waldo McLaurin, Tom Hale, and Sam Holland, left Wednesday morning for Austin and San Antonio on official business.

They expect to interview the committee which has charge of the distribution of funds appropriated for the purpose of taking care of county and district road bonds assumed by the state. Several factors, it seems, enter into the matter of distributing these funds, such as amount of bonds assumed by a county, the amount of lateral road mileage, the population of the county, etc. The Commissioners are making an effort to get as large a slice of this fund for Lynn county as possible, which will doubtless be small enough at all events.

They also had in mind to look after some prospective PWA projects, sanitary and road.

Another important item of business was to find out what is the prospect of getting work started on the two highways recently designated in this county, one leading from O'Donnell west to Seagraves, about ten or twelve miles of which lies in Lynn county, and the other leading from Tahoka through Wilson to Staton and on north, about twenty miles of which lies in Lynn county.

Many Lynn county people are deeply interested in the building of these highways and the commissioners and county judge are hoping to get something definite done about them.

NYA QUOTA

J. C. Kealam, State Administrator, this week advised Mrs. L. M. Tunnell, County School Superintendent, that Lynn County's quota of

school aid jobs for the 1940-41 school year had been set at 29 for white schools and one for colored schools. The State Administrator said this quota was based on the county's relative youth population and its particular need for NYA

school aid jobs. The local NYA County Placement Committee met Saturday for the purpose of distributing NYA jobs to the schools within the county. Forms have been mailed to schools recommended by the committee and approved for participation in the program. The school aid program will operate throughout the next school year in much the same manner as it did last year, with only a few minor changes in administration and regulations.

Figured on the basis of about 125 scholastics per job, the following NYA positions are available: Grassland 1, Newmore 1, New Home 4, New Lynn 1, Tahoka 6 whites and 1 negro, Draw 2, Wilson 4, O'Donnell 5, T-Bar 1. Other schools could not qualify for NYA aid. The quota of NYA school aid jobs for the entire state was placed at 12,546. This is an increase of approximately on third over last year's quota, and the State NYA Administrator estimated that some 20-thousand students in Texas secondary schools be enabled to continue their education this year through operation of the school aid program.

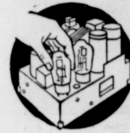
