Lots of people admire that bridge, although the one opposite Reynosa is just as good in so far as trans-border passage is concerned. The main difference is that Reynosa is not quite as scenic as Matamoros and when some folks from the other side of the Rio Grande arrive on the other side they soon begin seeing things. Yet you are right in calling attention to the grapefruit gardens of your dominion. They are there, and their aspect is altogether lovely.

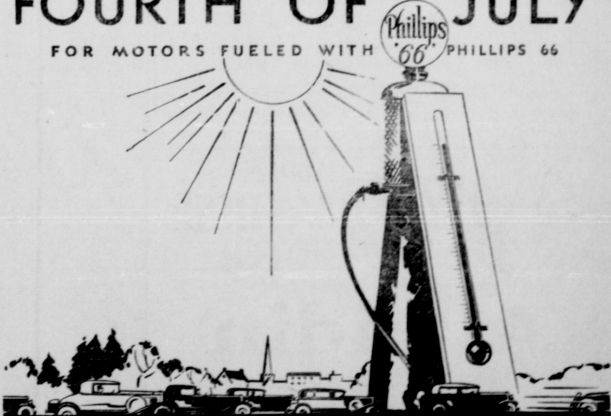

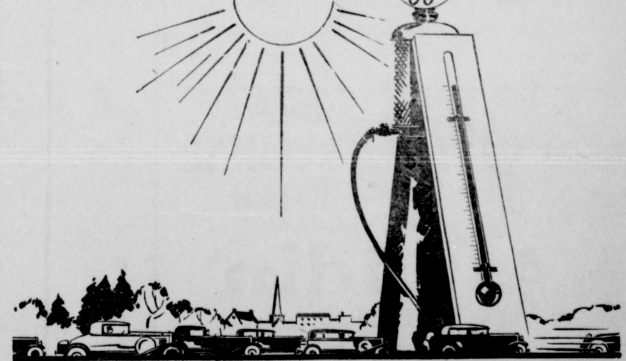

TEXAS HAS PLENTY OF STAR LIGHTING EQUIPMENT

There are 135 "skyscrapers" in Texas, according to a survey recently made by the Texas Public Service Information Bureau. Twenty Texas cities have buildings of ten stories or higher completed or under construction. Houston has the tallest—the 37-story Gulf. San Antonio's 35-story Smith-Young tower is the second tallest. Dallas with thirty-four has the greatest number.

Distribution of the "skyscrapers" by cities follows: Abilene 3, Amarillo 4, Austin 2, Beaumont 6, Corpus Christi 2, Dallas 34, El Paso 3, Fort Worth 15, Galveston 5, Houston 25, Laredo 1, Lubbock 2, Mineral Wells 1, San Angelo 2, San Antonio 17, Temple 2, Texarkana 1, Waco 5, Wichita Falls 3.

ANOTHER WAY TO HELP FARMERS MAKE MONEY

Special from Dallas News. Manipulators, not speculators, have driven the price of cotton far below its intrinsic value, and agriculture, J. E. McDonald of Waxahachie, said Thursday, in pointing out that "the time has arrived for a more practical and sound method of pricing and marketing cotton."

Cotton prices must be fixed according to supply, its intrinsic and relative value, and not "in sympathy with New York stock manipulators, debacles," said Mr. McDonald. The price, he reasoned, should be fixed in advance of the harvest season, based on supply, and must be flexible to conform with the varying prospective yield.

"Flexibility should be incorporated in a price schedule," he said, "as for 15,000,000-bale-crop, 21c f. o. b. ports; 15,000,000-bale crop, 20c; 16,000,000-bale-crop, 19c; 16,500,000-bale crop, 18c; 17,000,000-bale crop, 17c, and so forth. The latest Government report must be used in calculating supply," he argued.

"Such a price fixation would be actually based on supply and demand, would prevent violent fluctuations occasioned by the market maraudings of a clique of unscrupulous manipulators," the representative asserted. "The debacle in the stock market

its demoralizing effect on industry and labor and unwarranted depression on prices of commodities is a disgrace.

"Five weeks ago the spinning industry was enjoying excellent business. Sales, according to report, were 138.3 against production. Yesterday this same authority says sales have dropped to 68.5 per cent of production. Both to grower and spinner are demanding a more stabilized price for cotton. Unwarranted fluctuations in price demoralize the business of both."

After citing the importance of cotton, Mr. McDonald declared that if growers, spinners and persons affiliated with them are prosperous, this prosperity must radiate out and benefit every essential industry and labor in the United States.

DEMAND FOR TEACHERS IN TEXAS IS ON INCREASE

Austin, Nov. 21.—Demand for teachers in Texas schools during the past nine months has increased approximately 4 per cent over the demand for the same nine months of 1928, judging by figures compiled by Miss Miriam Dozier, secretary of the teacher's appointment committee of the University of Texas. From February through October 1928 Miss Dozier received calls for 1,297 teachers, while during the same period of time this year, a total of 1,351 vacancies were reported to her. The total from February, 1928, to January, 1929 was 1,387 and with the figures for three months to come in, Miss Dozier expects the final figures for this year to show a great increase over the total for last year.

CLAY PRODUCTION GOES INTO BIG FIGURES

Austin, Nov. 21.—Production of the 66 plants in Texas manufacturing clay products during 1928 a vol-

ume amounting to \$6,500,000, according to statistics compiled by the bureau of economic geology at the University of Texas. Brick products produced included common brick, face brick, vermiculite brick of various kinds, buffed brick, stone ware and pottery. Of these common brick and face brick led in quantity of production, their combined value being \$3,726,632.

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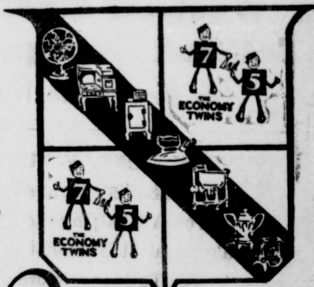
