WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Cold War Flames Into Hot War On Korea Front; U.N. Condemns Invasion by Communist Forces

KOREA: A Hot War

The cold war, which has caused one crisis after another in recent months, had flamed into a hot war on one front. Soviet sponsored armies of North Korea invaded South Korea, established by the United Nations with the blessing and aid of the United States.

First reports of the attack were confused. It was known, however, that the invaders advanced as much as 12 miles into South Korea by using ground forces totaling as many as 40,000 men, plus 90 tanks. An additional 10,000 men were believed ready to reinforce the invaders.

Some reports indicated the invaders had penetrated within 12 miles of Seoul, capital of South Korea, while others said the northerners had been checked almost immediately. There were reports also of amphibious landing on the east coast of South Korea.

The main attack was directed along the Uijongbu valley, for centuries the path of invaders. Maj. Gen. Choi Byung Kud, chief of staff of the South Korea army, reported. Sihm Sung Mo, acting Premier and defense minister, said he had evidence that of northern tanks captured in the first attack, half of the crews were Russian. Minister Kim Yong Ju was in Tokyo when the attack was launched.

Meanwhile, the United States began the evacuation of 800 Americans from the Seoul area. They were leaving Korea by sea with U.S. air protection. The evacuation plan was completed only a week before the sneak attack.

According to American military men who have been directing the training of the South Korea army, the defenders have 95,000 men to battle the invaders. They will be handicapped, however, by the lack of an air force and tanks.

North Korea is reported to have 106 military planes, including 70 Russian Yaks and 25 Stormoviks.

FARM SUPPORTS:

Senate Approves

After a hot floor debate, the senate completed congressional action and sent to President Truman a bill to give the Commodity Credit Corporation an additional \$2,000,000,000 to finance its federal farm-price-support programs. The President was expected to sign the measure.

The debate developed over a provision in the bill which would shut the door on imported foreign farm crops if they threatened to upset the domestic farm-support program.

The provision was included in the bill and requires Secretary of Agriculture Brannan to demand an investigation of the tariff commission whenever he believes foreign imports are interfering with domestic farm programs.

The additional \$2,000,000,000 would increase the C.C.C. total borrowing authority to \$6,750,000,000. Most of the money now available to the agency is tied up in price-support loans and purchase agreements.

The measure barely got through the senate, 36 to 35 after Vice-President Barkley exercised his constitutional vote to break a 35-35 tie.

Critics of the measure said it would wreck the reciprocal-trade program, sometimes called the keystone of the nation's foreign policy.

Frank Erickson, called America's greatest bookmaker and king of a nationwide gambling business, has been sentenced to two years in jail and fined \$30,000.

UNITED NATIONS:

North Korea Guilty

The United Nations, in an emergency session shortly after the sneak attack by Communist dominated North Korea on South Korea, branded the north the aggressor and ordered an immediate cease-fire throughout Korea.

The Soviet Union was conspicuous by the absence of its delegates from the emergency session.

Acting swiftly and bluntly, the U.N. termed the assault an "unprovoked attack" and a "clear threat to international peace and security."

The resolution called for immediate cease-fire and implicated that the U.N. would move to take stronger measures if North Korea flouted the council.

Meanwhile, reaction in the United States was immediate and to the point. President Truman cut short a visit to Missouri and returned to Washington. A conference was called between top diplomatic and defense chiefs.

The problem they faced was a critical one. The situation demanded a clear and strong reaction since too much was at stake in terms of American prestige in the Far East.

As a result, a "critical amount" of arms aid was said to have been started to Korea immediately. It was also reported General MacArthur had been authorized to draw on stocks of equipment available in Japan rather than let Korea wait for shipments to be put together in the United States.

Many American observers saw the attack on South Korea as a Soviet test of U.S. reaction toward aggression. They did not believe, however, that the Communists are ready for any military aggression on a broad international scale.

It was recalled by many that World War II started with acts of aggression against minor powers and not from declarations of war. With this view in mind, the question arose whether the North Korea attack is an early test of physical and moral strength of the democratic nations.

The present situation calls for firmness, political observers agree.

PLANE CRASH:

Worst in History

The worst commercial airline tragedy in the nation's history took place in Lake Michigan of St. Joseph, Mich., when a Northwest Airlines plane plunged into the lake during a severe thunderstorm with 55 passengers and three crew members aboard.

Two days after the giant craft disappeared, parts of the plane, a section of an airplane log book, and parts of two bodies were dragged from the lake.

The plane, filled to capacity, vanished on a flight from New York to Seattle by way of Minneapolis.

St. Joseph is about 110 miles southeast of Milwaukee on the eastern shore of Lake Michigan.

Teachers

The nationwide shortage of teachers and classrooms is going to get worse unless something "drastic" is done. Willard E. Givens, executive secretary of the National Education association reports.

In his annual report, Givens estimated school population in the next decade will increase almost 7,500,000, from 26,635,000 to 34,091,000. He said 750,000 more teachers will be needed.

Why Families?

Lesson for July 16, 1950

THE ENGLISH language has a word not found in the original languages of the Bible; it is not in Latin, German or French for that matter. It is the word "home."

But homes were not invented in England or America; the ancient peoples of the world had homes even if they had no special word for them. The story of Ruth is a home-story, a family tale. It comes from the times of the Judges, which were very rugged times indeed.

To read the Book of Judges you would think that everything was plots and wars and murder. There isn't a peaceful story in the book. And then comes the story of Ruth, to remind us that even in those terrible times there were happy people, people who minded their business and worked hard and stayed home and loved one another. The bright spots in today's vast seas of misery are just what they were in Ruth's time.

Working Together

"A HOME is a place to go when everything else has shut up" is not a true proverb. For if that is all it is, it is not a home. It is only a boarding house and not a very attractive one at that.

It is the people who live in it who make it. But just throwing people together within four walls, even if the people are closely related, will not make a home. When you read the story of Ruth you see one thing standing out: they are all working people.

To this day, there are fewer divorces in the country than in the cities, and one big reason for that is that country families have to work together, while city families often have little in common. In the country everybody turns to and does something about the house, everybody helps everybody else; while in the cities where so much is done by machines and houses are very small, there isn't much a family can do together. Still, it is worth while for any family to try to work out something that they can all do together.

Unity in Variety

IT is striking that in the Bible the warmest expression of devotion shown by one person to another, is expressed by one woman to her mother-in-law, by Ruth to Naomi. Ruth was of a different race and generation and nation. Yet she takes Naomi's family for her own.

That illustrates another beautiful feature of living in a family. You learn to live with all kinds of people. Even in so small a group, no two are alike. And the thing that holds a family together almost better than anything else is not similar tastes in breakfast foods, or identical educations, or equality of age or temperament: it is common ideals, it is agreement about the important things in life.

What do you, for example, think is the greatest thing in the world? Do your family agree with you? If they do (or you with them) then you have a basis for a happy family life.

Unity in Worship

HIGH ideals, held by all in common, are almost the best family cement; but better and best is religion. When you read the story of Ruth you are struck not only by their high ideals but by their natural, heart-felt, everyday religious faith. It comes out in the remarks of Boaz. It was one of the things that no doubt had attracted Ruth to the family in the first place. The climax of her famous promise to her mother-in-law is "thy God shall be my God."

It is at best confusing, and at worst tragic, when families are divided in their religious faith. Some one has said that when the father belongs to one denomination and the wife to another, the children are likely to become Nothingarians.

The old family pew, happily out of style in many places, is more than a quaint custom. It is a fine symbol of family life at its best. Where are the most of the broken homes? Among the families where father and mother send the children to Sunday school while they themselves lie around at home reading the paper, or among the families where all go to the house of God together? A home without real religion is a home without its surest foundation.

WOMAN'S WORLD

Efficient Technique Important in Sewing Garments

By Erta Haley

"I HAVE A FLAIR for styling clothes, but my sewing technique is really very poor. The clothes just don't seem to stand up well after a little wear," says a neighbor who really enjoys making her own wardrobe.

What should she and others like her do? They can't go out to attend sewing classes, neither should they be advised to give up something they like so well. Can technique be learned after sewing haphazardly for some time?

Yes, sewing techniques can be improved with just a few tips in the right direction, and a bit of patience to do the proper things. The rewards are clothes that you'll be proud to wear, and also clothes that will withstand laundering, hard wear and cleaning.

Actually it's fun to do things according to methods that consistently give good results. Your pleasure is not just in a seam well sewed, but a garment that a good

tailor would admire. That, we'll all admit, is a goal toward which it's worth working.

No one can do a good job of home sewing without having the equipment as well as the space. Few have a sewing room, and so they must at least have a space that can be converted quickly to sewing needs. This means a large table that's firm, of correct height, and level. If necessary, use a dining room table with composition pads.

Have your sewing machine as well as all the other aids for cutting, basting and finishing close at hand. These may be placed in a large box that can be conveniently carried about.

An ironing board and iron with a pressing cloth should be part of basic equipment, too. Bring them out when you do sewing.

Straighten Fabrics Before Cutting

Have you ever had a garment look slightly lopsided after cutting and sewing it? No, it didn't slip while you were doing the cutting or sewing, probably, but it just wasn't straight to start with.

Make certain the grain of the fabric is true before you place the pattern on it for cutting. This is done by clipping the selvage and catching one crosswise thread and pulling it out gently. Cut carefully on this line.

Sometimes after tearing fabric, it may be necessary to stretch it to get the material back in line.

Profile Interest



Interest is given to the face with a profile bonnet such as this, made of natural milan straw with a deep, rolling brim faced in siren red straw. A cluster of bright straw accents the side-swept line of the crown. The fruits are repeated in a wrist band, used as an accessory to the hat.

Grasp opposite ends at points some distance apart; stretch and saw it diagonally until the fabric is in line.

Repeat the above process along the length of the material. If this does not straighten the fabric, dampen it and stretch again.

Dampening a piece of material for straightening is done by wetting a piece of muslin and placing over the fabric until enough moisture has been absorbed to make it pliable.

Cottons and linens may be sprinkled as though for ironing, then rolled until the dampness has spread through evenly. Shake out length-wise over a door to let them dry.

Only Pre-Shrunk Fabrics Should be Used

Imagine spending several hours to several days on a dress, only to find that after the first laundering it has shrunk to a size that does not fit!

Unless the material is labeled sanforized, it may very well shrink. Some materials which are not so labeled or guaranteed may not shrink, but you don't know unless you've actually tried out the fabric. It's simple enough to clip off a piece, launder, dry and press it.



and pressing yield better garments.

Check with original measurements which were taken right after cutting the piece of goods. In this way you'll know how it behaves with laundering.

For materials which do shrink, do the shrinking before making the garment. Straighten the fabric first. Wring out a piece of muslin or an old sheet in warm water and lay on a flat surface. Place the new material over this, being careful to avoid wrinkles in either the muslin or new material. Make a newspaper roll, covering it with muslin. Roll fabric with damp cloth over this and let stand for 12 hours.

After it has been rolled the required length of time, unroll the material and hang over a door to dry. Hang fabric as straight as possible and avoid wrinkling.

After drying, the material may be pressed carefully, if it requires this treatment.

Pressing During Sewing Yields Good Looks

Pressing during the sewing of a garment will yield better finished results and actually makes the whole sewing operation an easier one. It will give you a pretty good idea, too, of how the garment will look when it's finished.

Pressing does not mean ironing the garment. Hold the iron so it slides lightly over the fabric rather than pressing down into the material in long sweeps as you do when ironing.

All seams, darts and tucks should be pressed after you finish them, with the heat of the iron set for

the correct temperature for the fabric.

Synthetic materials require the least heat, and you might insulate what little heat you do use by placing a dry pressing cloth over the material before the iron glides over it. Do not dampen the material in any way, as it may cause the material to behave strangely by wrinkling or puckering.

Woolens require slightly more heat than synthetics, but they burn easily. A commercial pressing cloth or a heavy piece of material slightly dampened is recommended.

If the outer seams are likely to show the mark of the seam, place a piece of paper under each side before pressing.

Materials which have a raised design or embroidery of any kind should be pressed face down into a heavy turkish (terry cloth) towel to prevent flattening.

Metallic materials require little iron heat. Velvet or deep napped fabrics should be steamed rather than pressed. Place a damp cloth against a standing iron, and when steam rises, move the material through the steam, moving fingers carefully so as not to leave marks on it.

Observe Sewing Directions For Best Results

Pattern marks and other directions have been carefully tested to give the best results. Those who ignore notches in the patterns, seam allowances and other such markings regret them in the long run, for all have a reason for being there.

Marble Flows Like Molasses

Machine Duplicates Pressure in Earth

LOS ANGELES — Solid marble flows like molasses in a machine which duplicates — on a pygmy scale — pressure 22 miles under the earth's surface.

A University of California at Los Angeles geophysicist is proving that there is no such thing as "solid rock." His tool is an eight foot high hydraulic press which exerts a pressure of 150,000 pounds per square inch.

Dr. David Griggs hopes the device will provide data on the earth's crust at depths six times greater than drills have penetrated. He's after information that will explain earthquakes, the formation of mountain ranges, the flow of oil through underground rock and, perhaps, how to locate veins of precious metals.

He and his assistants in the UCLA geophysics laboratory are experimenting now with cylindrical bits of marble, roughly the size of a one inch piece of chalk.

The marble cores fit into a cylinder into which two pistons, which exert the pressure, are inserted.

Under pressure the marble actually "creeps" or "flows." Its crystalline structure is broken down. The machine is so powerful it can squeeze sand into hard quartzite rock.

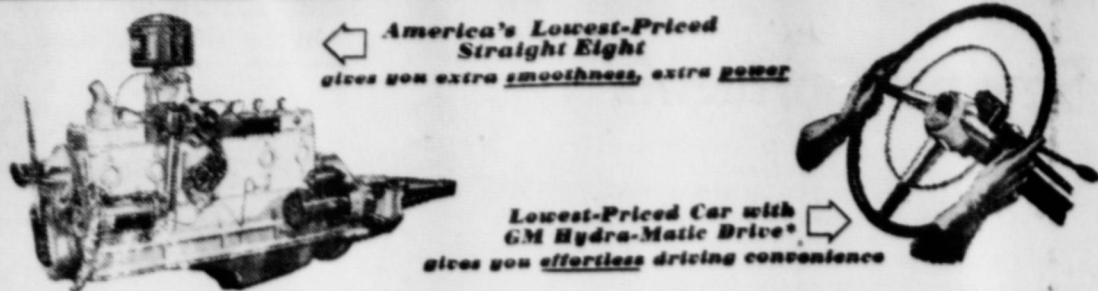

Humans Susceptible To 80 Animal Diseases

Animal diseases are a constant threat to the health of human beings, two public health physicians declare in the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association.

In one report, Dr. F. S. Leeder of the Michigan department of health, said human beings are susceptible to at least 80 diseases of animals. Many of these diseases are prevalent in the United States, he reported. The danger that foreign maladies may be imported by high speed air travel is also very real, he said.

Most animal diseases to which man is susceptible are spread primarily by livestock and wild game with which human beings come in contact. Work of veterinarians in helping to stamp out or control such diseases is thus an important factor in bettering human health.

In another journal article, Dr. W. P. Dearing, deputy surgeon general of the U. S. Public Health Service, points to the value of having veterinarians work closely with health departments to protect the public against such dangerous maladies as rabies.

Corn Borer Serious Threat to Midwest
Loss Last Year in Six States Totals Millions

Last year in six states of the corn belt the European corn borer caused a loss of some 300 million dollars. In 23 other states, damage ranged from slight to quite severe.

The corn borer appeared in this country in 1917 along the Atlantic seaboard. It has spread steadily until today it has reached states as

far west as Kansas and Nebraska and the Dakotas, and south to the Tennessee-Alabama line.

Not only is the pest covering more ground each year. It is, in many places working more destructively. In Iowa, for example, the borer cost each corn farmer last year an average of 750 dollars.

There is nothing to indicate that the destruction has reached a peak. In fact, unless adequate controls are adopted, the corn belt may find the worse to come.

Chemical control must from now on be considered part of the regular production of the crop.

Poultry Experts Advise Weeding Out Cockerels

All cockerels, except those to be kept for breeders, should be removed from the pullet flock by the time they are 12 weeks of age, poultry experts report.

If the cockerels are marketed at 12 weeks of age they will command a better price than if they are kept longer. If kept longer their meat becomes coarse and stringy. The rate of gain per pound of feed decreases with age and size of birds.

Chicken Sauté (Serves 6)

1 frying chicken, cut in pieces
3 tablespoons butter or substitute
1/4 cup flour

Combine ham, pork, bread crumbs, milk, mustard, worcestershire sauce, onion and pickle relish; mix lightly but thoroughly. Lightly grease a 9x5x3-inch loaf pan; line with waxed paper and grease lightly. Pack mixture firmly into pan. Combine butter and sugar and spread over top of loaf. Insert whole cloves on top of meat mixture. Bake in a moderately hot (375°) oven for one hour or until done. Pour off excess drippings that form during baking. Serve hot or cold.

"Easy Cake" (Makes 2 8-inch layers)

1 3/4 cups sifted cake flour

2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 EGGS

Cream together 1/2 cup flour and lard. Add the remaining flour, sugar, baking powder, salt and 1/2 cup milk. Stir and beat vigorously until smooth and fluffy. Add remaining milk and beat thoroughly. Add eggs, one at a time, beating thoroughly after each addition. Pour into two greased 8-inch cake pans and bake in a moderate (350°) oven for 20 to 25 minutes. Frost when cool.

"Orange Sherbet" (Makes 3 pints)

1/2 cup sugar
1 1/2 cups unstrained orange juice
1 cup evaporated milk, thoroughly chilled
2 tablespoons lemon juice
Add sugar to orange juice and stir until dissolved. Chill. Whip milk until very stiff. Fold in lemon juice, then orange-sugar mixture. Pour into cold freezing trays and freeze until firm.

2 medium tomatoes, diced
2 tablespoons chopped parsley and chives

Heat butter in heavy skillet. Mix flour, salt, pepper and thyme in paper sack. Shake pieces of chicken in this seasoned flour mixture.

Brown chicken in skillet, add onions and mushrooms. Cover and simmer for three minutes. Mix lemon and apple juice, sugar and salt and pour over chicken. Cover and simmer for five minutes. Add tomatoes. Cook slowly for an hour, or until chicken is fork tender. Sprinkle, before serving, with parsley and chives.

Black and White

Lesson for July 2, 1950

A GROCER in Minneapolis received a letter from a former customer who had left the city owing a large grocery bill. "I have been converted in a revival here," the letter said, "and I want to make everything right in my life that has been wrong." Enclosed there was a certified check for the old bill. The grocer wired back: "Who was the evangelist who converted you? We need him in Minneapolis."

Conversion is God's operation on the heart. No one can actually see the heart, but if the operation is successful, the symptoms of disease will disappear and the symptoms of health can be seen by any one. The patient is a new man.

Jacob Elack

PERHAPS the most notable case of conversion in the Bible, aside from the Apostle Paul, is the man named Jacob. His life is a study in black and white; up to a certain point hardly anything good could be said of him, but after that point he can hardly be accused of anything bad.

All his younger days he was principally noted for giving trouble to other people and "doing them out of" something he wanted for himself. First he tricked his older brother into selling him the family birthright, for the ridiculous price of a bowl of soup (pottage).

You would not think any one would sell his birthright; but Jacob caught Esau when he was dog-hungry. . . . Then we see him out-smarting his brother again by birthright; Jacob was by that time a shameless liar and thief. It became so hot for him at home that he had to leave town.

We have a glimpse of him on his journey, dreaming about a ladder to heaven. Evidently his conscience did not trouble him. Indeed, he proceeds to bargain even with God; if God will prosper him, he says, he will see that God gets ten per cent. God did indeed prosper him; but he grew no better for it.

The rest of his life, for the next twenty years, is one piece of trickery after another, and his uncle Laban taking turns trying to out-smart each other, with Jacob usually coming out ahead.

Jacob White

THINGS came to a climax on the night when Jacob, fearing death at Esau's hands, arranged his family to go ahead of him, keeping himself in the safest place in the rear. . . . and there at last he came face to face with God.

The story of his all-night struggle at the brook Jabbok is a strange one; but one thing is certain. After that night even his name was changed, for the man himself was a new man.

He is patient in trouble, no longer resentful. He is not only a good man himself, he does his best to help others. He conducts what can only be called a family revival; he persuades one and all to give up the idols they had been worshipping and turn to the one true God. He offers sacrifices, like his fathers before him.

He goes down into Egypt at last, a humble man, no longer the conceited young crook he had been when he went to Padan-Aram. He depends now on God and not on himself.

The God of Jacob

A FAMILIAR Psalm carries this refrain: "The God of Jacob is our refuge." Why the God of Jacob, not Abraham nor Isaac? Well, if it were only the God of Abraham, "most of us might as well give up. For Abraham was a great genius, a man such as appears scarcely once in a century. Or if he were the God of Isaac only, we would be led to think of him as caring especially for the weak-minded, the lame and the lazy. But Jacob—just a plain man full of meanness? Yes; the same God who changed him can change the meanness of us.

The real test of religion is not what support it can give to noble souls, or what comfort it gives to the weak. The real test of religion is: Can God turn black into white? Can God take an ordinary, conceited, slippery customer and make a good man of him? The God of Jacob can do this; and he is the God most of us need.

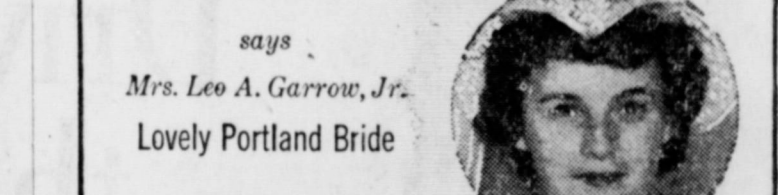

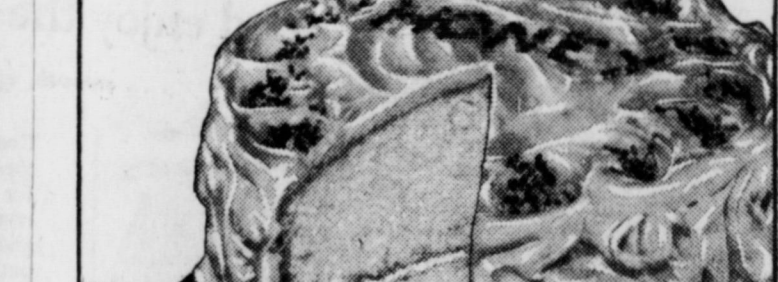

Hoe Safer Than Spray For Gardens, Report

The U. S. department of agriculture advises against using a chemical weed killer in the home garden to avoid more damage than gain to the vegetable crop.

In a recent bulletin, the department reported spraying with chemical weed killers is effective and a work-saver if done with care to avoid injury to vegetables.

In the home garden, rows are close and several of the favorite garden crops—tomatoes and beans, for example—are highly sensitive to weed killing chemicals.

In a family-sized garden the job of using a hoe or cultivator would probably take less time than to spray with a weed killer since the chemical must be precisely measured and mixed and the equipment thoroughly cleaned afterwards, the department pointed out.

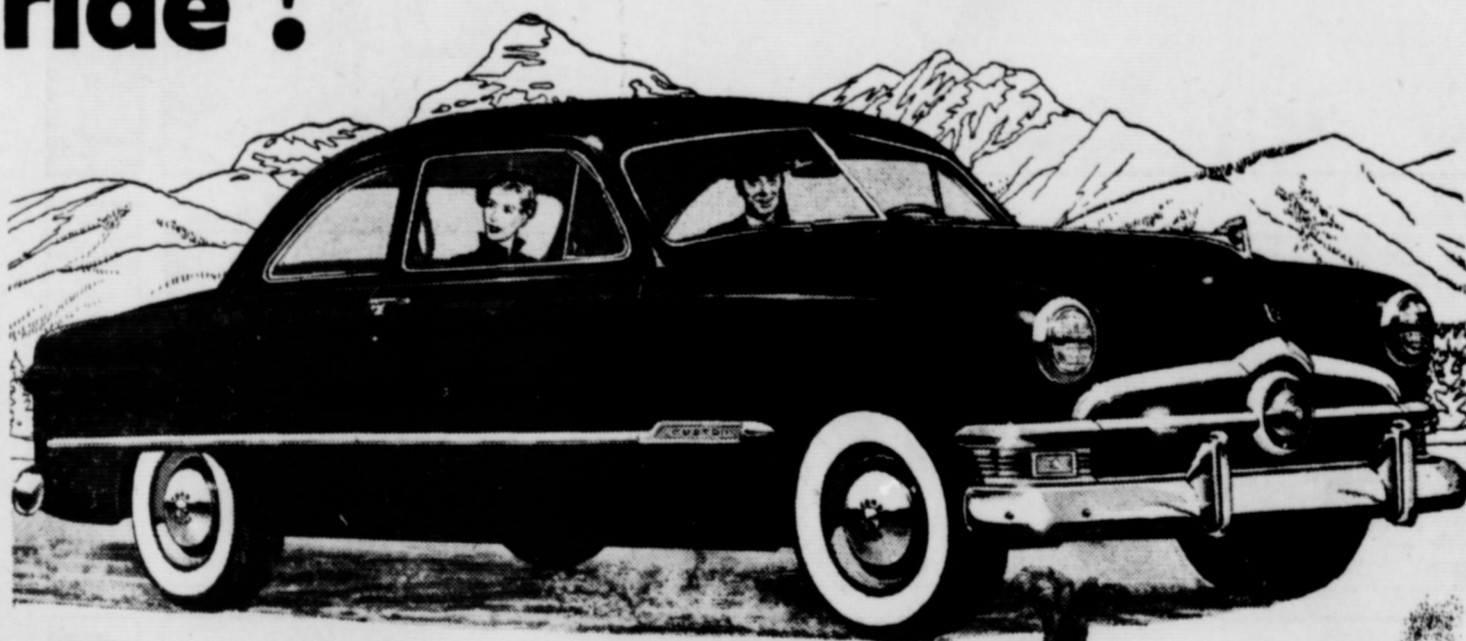

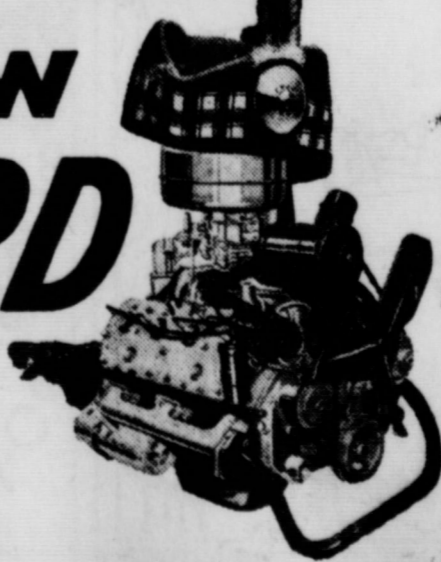

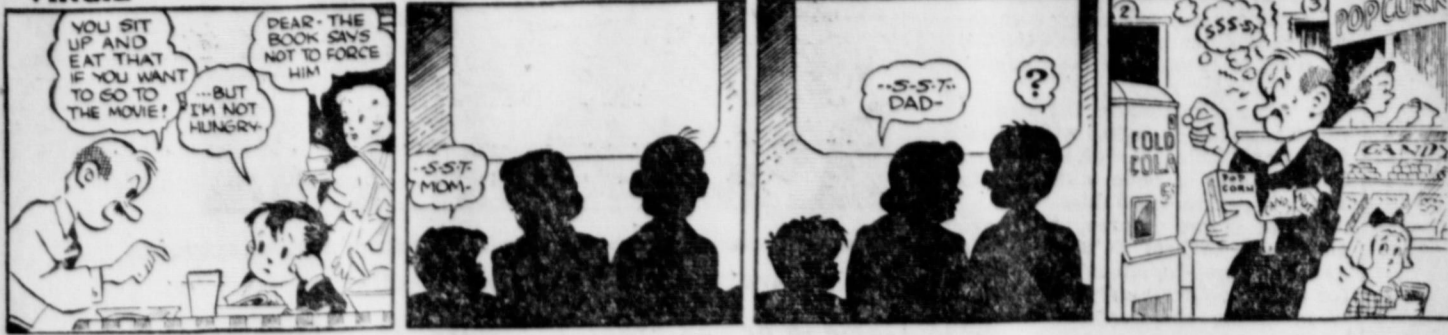

Useful 'Pest' Found By Nutrition Expert

ATLANTIC CITY — Better understanding of human and animal nutrition may be found through study of the mealworm, a many-jointed, brown insect larva discovered in granaries and corn cribs.

This pest may in turn join the rat in being an aid to study of nutrition.

Prof. G. S. Fraenkel, University of Illinois, told the Institute of Nutrition here that mealworms have already led him to discover a new growth vitamin, designated "B.T."

Mealworms are only about an inch long and eat far less than rats. A half pound of food a month takes care of 10,000 worms. This gives the advantage of large numbers of experimental subjects and the need of only small amounts of expensive and highly purified food chemicals.

Mealworms are close relatives of weevils which infest flour at times. But they are large enough to dissect, weigh and observe.

Homemade Mix Gives Versatility to Baking (See Recipe Below)

Make Your Own Mix

HOMEMAkers WHO want to have an easy job of baking cakes, cookies, hot breads as well as a large variety of goodies in their own kitchen can accomplish this with the greatest of ease. The answer lies in making your own mix of carefully measured shortening, flour, baking powder and salt. This saves measuring all the ingredients required at the time of mixing cakes, cookies and breads, thus cutting out many steps and saving time, dishes and work.

All ingredients in the mix are fresh, since the homemaker adds them herself, and baking success is easily assured. The mix given here has been rigidly tested, and in every case, the final dish was judged to be as good as could be made from starting with an original recipe of the product.

Make-Your-Own Mix (Makes About 13 Cups)

2 cups shortening
9 cups sifted all-purpose flour
¾ cup (4 tablespoons) double acting baking powder
1 tablespoon salt

Combine sifted flour, baking powder and salt. Stir well. Stir into large bowl, large pan or on heavy paper. Add shortening. Use finger tips or pastry blender to distribute shortening throughout the dry ingredients until mixture resembles coarse cornmeal. Store the mix in a close canister on the pantry shelf. It's ready to use for any of the following recipes.

One caution should be observed, in the use of the mix. Do not pack it into cups when measuring for use.

Tender-Quick Pastry (Makes 2 8-inch crusts)

2 cups make-your-own mix (do not pack)
¾ cup butter or substitute
¾ cup hot water (scant)

Heat butter in water until melted. Sprinkle over mix, blending with spatula or fork. Turn dough onto waxed paper. Shape into ball and cover with paper. Chill in refrigerator for at least 30 minutes before using. Roll out for pastry as needed.

***Cream Puffs (Makes 5 large puffs)**

1 cup make-your-own mix
¾ cup boiling water
2 eggs

Add mix to boiling water in saucepan. Stir over low heat about one minute until dough is smooth, follows the spoon and forms a ball. Remove from heat immediately. Add eggs one at a time, stirring and beating. Beat vigorously. Drop by spoonfuls on baking sheet, and bake at 350° to 400° for 15 minutes. Let stand in a warm oven (with door open) about 10 minutes to dry out.

Apricot Bread (Makes 1 9"x5" loaf)

3 cups make-your-mix
½ cup sugar
1 cup chopped, dried apricots
¾ cup milk
1 egg, beaten

If apricots are dry, soak in hot water a few minutes, then dry thoroughly and chop. Blend mix,

Cauliflower steamed to tenderness, then dipped in egg and bread crumbs and deep-fat fried will send you after second and third helpings for a company dinner.

Spinach can go to a company dinner or luncheon if it's dressed up in this way: mix cooked, chopped spinach with cheese sauce and place in a casserole. Top with fried bread crumbs and grated cheese and heat thoroughly.

sugar and apricots. Add combined egg and milk. Beat until well blended. Turn into a loaf pan (9 x 5 x 2½ inches) after rubbing bottom of pan with shortening. Bake in a moderate (350°) oven for one hour.

Chocolate Cake (Makes 8x8x2 inch cake)

2 cups make-your-own mix
¾ cup sugar
¼ teaspoon soda
¼ cup sour milk
½ teaspoon vanilla
1½ ounces unsweetened chocolate, melted and cooled
1 egg, well beaten

Blend mix, soda and sugar. Add milk and vanilla; beat well. Stir in chocolate. Add egg and blend. Pour batter into cake pan, the bottom of which has been rubbed with shortening. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 35 minutes. Turn out on rack when cool. Frost as desired, or serve with whipped cream or sprinkled with confectioners' sugar.

Baked Fudge Pudding (Serves 9)

1½ cups make-your-own mix
½ cup sugar
2 tablespoons cocoa
¾ cup chopped nuts
½ cup milk
1 teaspoon vanilla

Combine mix, sugar, cocoa and nuts. Stir in milk and vanilla. Blend thoroughly. Spread in a pan 8x8x2 inches, the bottom of which has been rubbed with shortening. Combine the following ingredients for topping and pour over fudge batter: ¼ cup cocoa, ¼ cup brown sugar and ½ cup hot water. Bake in a moderate (350°) oven for 40 minutes.

Two excellent dishes for summertime eating used in the menu are a Hot Ham Mousse which uses leftover ham, and a Cole Slaw which has the piquant flavor of bacon.

***Hot Ham Mousse (Serves 4)**

2 cups ground cooked ham
2 tablespoons butter or substitute
¼ cup thin cream
6 tablespoons milk
1 egg yolk
2 tablespoons flour
1½ teaspoons lemon juice
½ teaspoon grated onion
2 egg whites

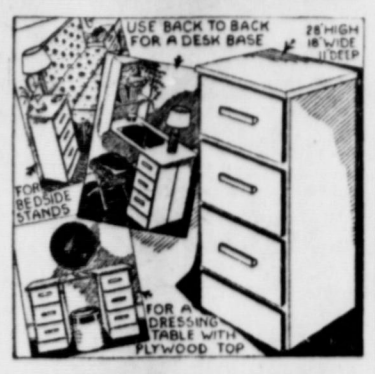
Melt butter, blend in flour and mix well. Stir in cream and milk and cook until thickened; add egg yolk, lemon juice and onion. Stir in ham; fold in stiffly-beaten egg whites. Turn into one-quart mold which has been buttered generously. Bake in a slow (325°) oven for 50 to 55 minutes. Serve with mushroom, parsley cream sauce.

Small thin gingersnaps prepared as follows make a hit with oldsters or youngsters: mix together orange marmalade and cream cheese and spread this paste as filling for two gingersnaps.

Mix Roquefort cheese with heavy cream and add to French dressing for a peppy salad dressing with greens. It's excellent for that special steak dinner.

For late evening snacks, try spreading toast with chutney and pouring Welsh rarebit over it.

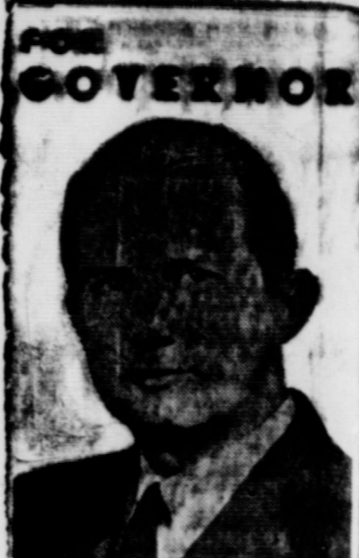
