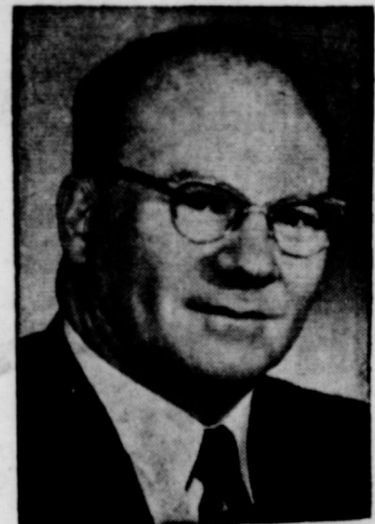

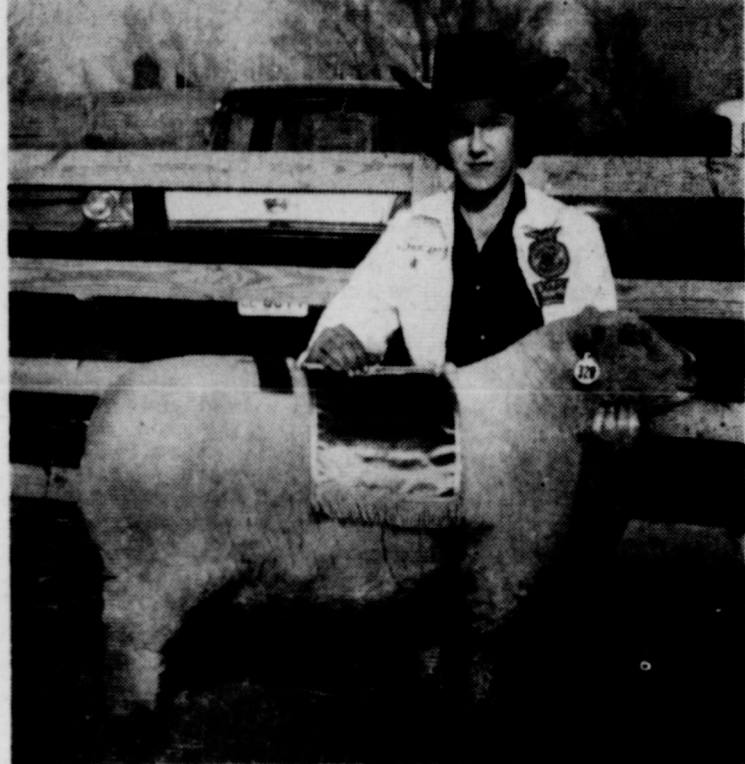

Girls heretofore have not been eligible to compete in the show. Jo Ann is no stranger to the lamb show ring having fed sheep for the past two years. She has shown champions here and at Lamesa and Tahoka this year.

Jo Ann, O'Donnell 4-H club member, received what is believed to have been a record lamb price of \$2.55 per pound for her reserve champion Southdown on a successful bid by Dunlap of Lubbock. She received a total of \$391.77 for the lamb. Show officials couldn't remember a higher per pound lamb price ever being paid to anyone in the history of the stock show.

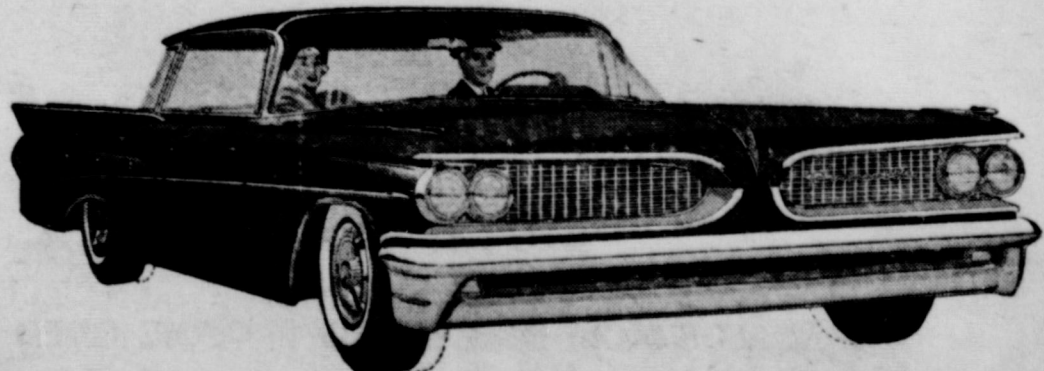

Free Speech Issue In Court Proceeding

LINCOLN, Ill.—Free speech was the issue here in a contempt of court case in which nearly 600 persons faced possible fines and jail sentences.

The defendants, many of them members of a reform group known as the "Good Government Council of Logan County," were cited for contempt for petitioning Circuit Judge Frank M. Bevan to replace a state's attorney in a case involving the prosecutor's friend.

Judge Bevan said the petition contained "odious, defamatory language concerning an official of this court." State's Attorney Edwin C. Mills.

Members of the Good Government Council contended Judge Bevan could not hold them in contempt and said if the prosecutor felt he was defamed by the petition he could sue them in a civil court.

The case arose when, as a result of action taken by the Good Government Council, Justice of the Peace Vincent Jones was charged with illegal diversion of funds collected in overweight trucking fines. Mr. Jones was charged with perjury, embezzlement and malfeasance.

The council followed up the case with a petition asking that Mr. Jones, be replaced by a special or assistant prosecutor.

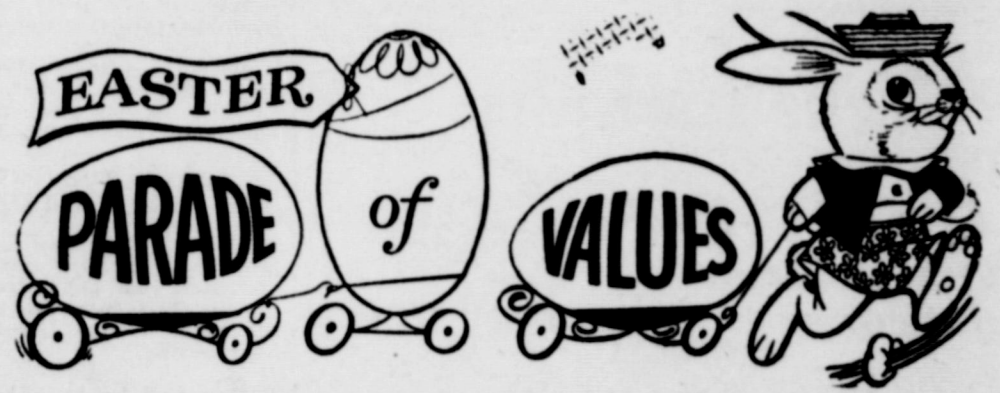
