

LITTLE FLU HERE TO DATE

Earlier predictions of Austin — Earlier predictions of a wide spread Asian flu epidemic this fall and winter appear to be materializing. Reports of cases coming in from all quarters indic-ate that Texas has been well seeded with the virus. Only five brief months have passed since late April when the disease was first recognized in Hong Kong. This speed of spread is typical of the illness.

So far, Asian flu, which is really new strain of virus type known to lab technicians, has been comparatively mild. This very fact has caused many people to ask why so much noise is being made about There are several gool answers. First, even mild flu can be dis-


