The owl is symbolic of wisdom and knowledge; the plow is the symbol of labor and tillage of the soil; the rising sun is emblematic of progress and the new day that will dawn when all farmers are trained and have learned to cooperate; the cross section of an ear of corn represents common agricultural interests since corn is native to America and grown in every State; and the eagle is indicative of the national scope of the organization. The emblem is protected by copyrights.

Bill Burton, gave a report on the franchise stating that O'Donnell is assured of a participating franchise.

Goal of \$3,000 — Mr. Vestal then told the group that all we need now is to put up the fences, backstops, dugouts, score keepers booth, lights and the scoreboard. This means that a drive will have to be made to secure approximately \$3,000 to put our park up to the Little League standards. There will be a kick-off breakfast at 9:00 a. m. at Jackson's cafe for all volunteer workers who will make the solicitations in O'Donnell and all surrounding communities. The committee which administers the funds is composed of —

Clayton, Jr., Homer Hardberger, R. T. Brewer of Draw, Mrs. Bill Gardenhire of Wells, Mrs. Arylis Askew of T Bar, and Mrs. B. B. Vestal of Harmony. This committee has full authority to give emergency relief for any case which is brought to their attention. There is no red tape. During the past twelve months the 183 cases were handled. Type of assistance given included groceries, clothing, lodging, meals for transients, gasoline, oil and tires. This included both local and transient people.

Other services made possible by such local drives is a summer camp near Waxahachie. O'Donnell sends two boys each year to this camp. Home and hospital for unwed mothers at San Antonio, men's social service centers at Dallas, Evaglene Home for girls at Dallas, Ft. Worth, San Antonio and Houston, alcoholics rehabilitation center at Houston, the Disaster Service, Prisoner's Parole Service and the Welfare Counselling service.

Workers for the solicitation will be Elvin Moore, Ralph Beach, Rilda Moore, Gladys Beach, Carlene Dorman, Nancy Mott, Bertha Mae Gardenhire, Mrs. Cecil Pearce of Wells Community Mrs. B. B. Vestal and Mrs. Lois Anderson of Harmony Community. John Criner, school superintendent, will be in charge of the solicitation in the school system. Additional members will be named at a later date. All workers are urged to attend the coffee to receive materials for the campaign.

All members of the committee, and Mr. Harris, urges everyone to give generously this year to the local drive, as the citizens of O'Donnell and surrounding communities will be asked to contribute one time during 1960 to the Salvation Army. It is hoped that the goal of \$1,000 will be reached within one week.

3,058 LYNN POLL TAXES PAID

Poll tax payments totaled 3,058, a new record, said J. E. (Red) Brown, tax assessor and collector. From 4,200 to 4,700 Lynn Co. people will be eligible to vote this year as the estimated over age exemptions total 1,200 to 1,500.

In recent presidential election years, as a comparison with payments this year, 2,902 poll tax receipts were issued in 1956 and 2,606 were issued in 1952 according to Lynn Co. NEWS.

The 3,058 total includes 75 exemptions, young voters becoming 21 years of age, but does not include over age voters who are not required to secure exemption certificates in Lynn county.

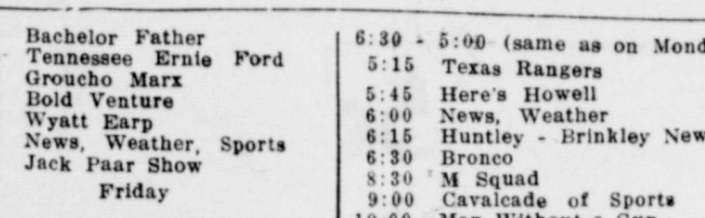

**Free Speech Issue
In Court Proceeding**

LINCOLN, Ill.—Free speech was the issue here in a contempt of court case in which nearly 600 persons faced possible fines and jail sentences.

The defendants, many of them members of a reform group known as the "Good Government Council of Logan County," were cited for contempt for petitioning Circuit Judge Frank M. Bevan to replace a state's attorney in a case involving the prosecutor's friend.

Judge Bevan said the petition contained "odious, defamatory language concerning an official of this court." State's Attorney Edwin C. Mills.

Members of the Good Government Council contended Judge Bevan could not hold them in contempt and said if the prosecutor felt he was defamed by the petition he could sue them in a civil court.

The case arose when, as a result of action taken by the Good Government Council, Justice of the Peace Vincent Jones was charged with illegal diversion of funds collected in overweight trucking fines. Mr. Jones was charged with perjury, embezzlement and malfeasance.

The council followed up the case with a petition asking that Mr. Jones, be replaced by a special or assistant prosecutor.

AMISH CAPITAL

**This Town Has
More Buggies
Than Autos**

ARTHUR, Ill.—On the streets you'll find more horses and buggies than automobiles. The hitch-rack is used every day in the week except Sunday.

For this is the home of one of the larger sects of Amish people in the country. Approximately 1,500 Amish live on the farms nearby. They are prosperous, friendly, and mind their own business.

But strangers stare at them because the men are whiskered, wear homemade clothing and flat black hats. The women dress just as severely, and keep their heads covered. They dislike the automobile, and use the horse exclusively.

Hitch Rack Rules
Arthur has entire streets where the hitch-rack reigns. Signs are posted, prohibiting autos to park in these areas. The highways near Arthur are filled with the black-topped buggies of the Amish farmers.

Strangely the Amish have preserved many Old World traits, and yet form a harmonious segment in the area surrounding them. For although Arthur is known as "Capital of Amishland," there has never been any friction between these people and their non-Amish neighbors. They are extreme pacifists.

Mention of the word Amish generally brings to mind a vague mental picture of queer, Quaker-looking people who ride in horse-drawn vehicles and wear plain clothes of their own making.
