

### **Brain Surgery** Fails to Cure Criminal Urge

PITTSBURGH - A delicate brain operation has failed to cure a thief of his tendency to steal, and Dr. Yale Koskoff has admitted "cutting a cable" in the thief's head failed to produce a change in personality. Millard Wright, 42, risked operation in 1947 to be rid of the urge that kept him in prison half his life, but was back in prison charged with burglaries recently.

"I guess the combination of paychosurgery, psychotherapy, and kindness were not sufficient to alter the asquisitive process in this patient," Dr. Koskoff said.

Wright, who had been paroled three years from Western Penitentiary after two years' observation led to the conclusion he was cured, used shorter words:

"With me, it just didn't work." Wright was arrested after Regis Splane, Pittsburgh, identified him as the source of stolen goods Splane had pawned. Thousands of dollars' worth of merchandise believed stolen in burglaries through Northern West Virginia and Eastern Ohio were found in Wright's home.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH

The operation performed on Wright is known as perfrontal lobotomy. It usually is used to relieve insufferable pain, especially in advanced cancer cases and in victims of severe mental disorder.

#### Nerves Are Cut

The nerves leading from the prefrontal lobe of the brain-the "think ing cap"—to the section of the brain that is the seat of the emotions are severed.

Dr. Koskoff volunteered to perform the operation after Wright volunteered for it. Wright spent 63 days in a hospital, at a cost to Allegheny county of \$30 a day.

Wright became a model prisoner.

After parole in 1949 he apparently stayed honest for three years. He married about a year ago. His lawyer and physician thought he was

leading an exemplary life.
When detectives asked Wright why he had reverted to crime, he turned surly.
"You fellows know the questions,"

he snarled. "So you ought to know the answers."

### **Outcome No Surprise**

Dr. Edward E. Mayer, head of the Behavior Clinic attached to the Alleghany County courts, said he was not surprised by the outcome.

"In the first place, a lobotomy reduces self-control," he said. "There-fore an operation of that kind cannot be, in my estimation conceived as one to give the individual better control over his impulses."

#### Bids Churches Do More To Help Brotherhood

MINNEAPOLIS - Groups such as the Urban League and the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People have done more to promote brotherhood than have the churches, a Negro Episcopal rector declared at the annual community interracial service here.

"Christians should bow their heads in shame for not having stood for things that make for brotherhood,' declared the Rev. Denzil A. Carty, rector of St. Philip's Episcopal church, St. Paul.

"There will never be peace or goodwill unless men solve the problems of human and race relations and look upon each other as brothers," Mr. Carty said.
"Although America stands ready

with economic aid and scientific knowledge, she lacks spiritual resources to solve these human problems and succeed as a world leader.
"Christianity has not failed. We,

Christians, simply have failed to carry out the will of God. All political ideologies will lead to destruction unless the particular way of life involves the carrying out of God's

The service was held at the Cathedral Church of St. Mark (Episcopal), here. Clergy of several Protestant denominations participated in the service and an interracial chorus and a Japanese-American choir provided music.

#### Saturday Night Bath Now Thing of Past

NEW YORK-The Saturday night bath is becoming as outmoded as the horse and buggy despite the fact that most people are keener than ever about personal hygiene

The Gas Appliance Manufacturers association, which makes a study of such things, says that the once-a-week dunking is going down the drain in favor of the daily shower or dip in the tub.

Better plumbing, more scientific bath fixtures, improved soaps and, most important, automatic hot water, have brought about the bathing revolution. With it have come higher living standards and better health.

Nowadays, the association re ports, the average family uses two to four times as much hot water as a family of comparable size 20 years ago. Where a 30-gallon hotwater tank sufficed in 1932, today's household demand tanks of at least 40-gallon storage capacity and they want heaters that heat water fast and keep it hot for bathing even while dishwashing or laundering to going on

#### Described as Effective **Against Rootworms**

Growers of corn, peanuts, sugar beets, sugar cane, small grains and similar crops may get economical control of soil insects with Aldrin, a new insecticide.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture recently accepted the new chemical for registration for use against soil insects, grubs, harmful orms and other burrowing pests, following proof of its effectiveness by many experiment stations.

It is described as being particularly effective against rootworms, wireworms, and white grubs-and in far smaller doses than those needed in previously known treatments. Damage to crops by aboveground insects is easily seen, and until recently has been the primary concern of the farmer. But damage to plant roots by soil insects, while not so readily recognized, is often more widespread and serious.

The new insecticide may be applied by any method available to the average farmer; by mixing with starter fertilizer, with manure, or
