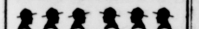
BAND OPERETTA WINS MERITED APPLAUSE

THREE GIRLS INJURED IN WRECK SUNDAY

Thankful for a miraculous escape from serious injury or perhaps death, Misses Juanita Swinney, Alvilda Goughly, and Corine Proctor are this week nursing sundry bruises and cuts received Sunday morning when the Chevrolet coupe in which they were riding turned completely over twice.

The accident occurred a few miles north of town, on the Tahoka highway. A car driven by Stewart Schooler Jr. was about to pass the coupe, driven by Miss Swinney just as they were meeting another car going south. As she swerved off the pavement to give more room for the other two cars, she lost control of the coupe, which proceeded to give an excellent exhibition of plain and fancy tumbling.

NOTICE FARMERS

All farmers who produced cotton in 1940 are eligible to vote in the December 7 referendum to determine effect of cotton marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1941 crop. Fred M. McGinty, chairman of the Lynn County AAA committee, points out:

Last year in the referendum, 891 of the Lynn County farmers participated in the election, 92 1/2 percent of them favoring quotas. In the year previous to last year, 1023 farmers participated. "Voting in the referendum is just as important as voting in any other election," he said. "The outcome of the marketing quota referendum will effect every cotton farmer in the county, so every cotton farmer should vote." Polling places in Lynn County will be located at the following places: Wilson School House, Morgan School House, Grassland School house, Tahoka County A. C. A. Building, Draw School house, O'Donnell school house, New Moore School house, New Home School House, Lakeview Gin office.

MAHON RETURNS TO WASHINGTON

Congressman George Mahon who spent last week in the District returned to Washington Saturday. Members of Congress had been authorized to return to their Districts, subject to the call of the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Mahon left for Washington immediately upon the receipt of a telegram from Speaker Rayburn advising that important legislation would be taken up by the House December 2nd.

Mahon's Lubbock office will remain open as he hopes to visit the District again before the New Congress convenes in January.

CITY ORDINANCE
"An Ordinance defining dance halls and declaring the same to be public nuisances prohibiting permitting the use of premises as dance halls, and participating in dancing in such dance halls, as herein defined, and fixing penalties for the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance."

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

Section 1. That all dance halls, situated within the limits of the City of O'Donnell, Texas, are hereby declared to be public nuisances, and as such the same are hereby declared to be unlawful.

Section 2. For the purposes of this ordinance, any place situated within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell at or in which people engage in dancing and where anything of value is paid, directly or indirectly for admission to such place, and or for the privilege of dancing at such place, and or for the expense of music furnished for such dancing, is hereby declared to be a dance hall.

Section 3. Any person who shall operate, and or be interested in

operating a dance hall, as that term is defined in Section No. 2 of this ordinance, within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars and not more than one hundred dollars.

Section 4. Any person who, as the owner of any property and or as agent of any property situated within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell, shall knowingly permit the same to be used as a dance hall, as that term is defined in Section No. 2 of this ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars, nor more than one hundred dollars.

Section 5. Any person who shall

dance at or in any dance hall, as that term is defined in Section No. 2 of this ordinance, within the corporate limits of the City of O'Donnell Texas shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than five, nor more than twenty-five dollars.

Section 6. That if any provisions of this ordinance shall be held as determined by any proper court of last resort to be invalid or unconstitutional the remaining portions of this ordinance not so held to be invalid or unconstitutional shall be and remain in full force and effect.

Section 7. That this ordinance shall take effect immediately from and after its final passage, approval and legal publications, and it is so ordered.

Finally passed and approved this 25th day of Nov., 1940.

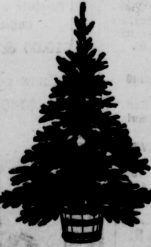
