Vote May Be Called On Public Improvement

4 Projects Planned

Friday night some ten residents including two ladies representing the study clubs met with the City Council in a called meeting. Mayor Jimmy Forbes presided. The meeting was to hear a bond representative from Lubbock explore the possibilities of a bond election to finance several proposed civic improvements.

The figure of \$50,000 was suggested as being feasible from the point of view of the ability of the town to service the bonds. Without any new debt the City would be clear of debt in 13 years.

If the \$50,000 was made available by public approval of the bonds, it was proposed that —

1. A public park be built.
2. A swimming pool be built
3. A community club house
4. A new fire station.

It was estimated that valuation of taxable property may be raised more than 1-3rd to retire the debt in 10 years. Where a person is now paying \$1 in city tax he would pay \$1.33 if the proposal is approved by property owners.

Record Population Here Now
The town is currently growing after a good crop last year and the prospect of a good one this year. The purpose of the proposal is to make Big O more attractive to more and more prospective residents and as the valuation grows in the years ahead and our population grows, the tax load per person will go down.

If an election is called by the citizens the Index will run a series of questions and answers and give as fair a picture of the proposal as possible.

Q— I'm a World War Two veteran who has been carrying a \$10,000 GI term insurance policy for a long time now I'd like to convert to a permanent plan, but I can't afford to convert the whole \$10,000 all at once. Can I put \$2,000 of my term into a permanent plan now and convert the rest later?

A— Yes. It will be all right for you to start the conversion of your term insurance with a \$2,000 installment. The law says that the initial amount converted must be at least \$1,000. After that, conversion of the remainder must be made in even multiples of \$500.

WHO INHERITS PROPERTY IN ABSENCE OF WILL?

What will happen if you should die without executing a legal and proper will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it—but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all of the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

V. A. Quiz

Q—As a veteran, may I get a GI loan to go into business with a friend who is not a veteran?

A—Yes, you may join with a non-veteran in obtaining a loan. However, the amount of the loan on which VA guaranty or insurance can be based will be in proportion to your interest in the loan. Guaranty or insurance cannot extend to any part of the loan which represents the nonveteran's contribution to the business.

Q—I'm about to start on-the-job training under the Korean GI Bill. How many hours a week are considered to be full-time training?

A—Full-time training is considered to be the standard work-week of the firm where you are taking your training. However, it generally may not be less than 36 hours a week.

Q—I am eligible for training under the War Orphans Education program. Can I use my right under the program to take a correspondence school course in cartooning?

A—No. The law does not permit you to receive benefits for correspondence school training. Also prohibited, under the War Orphans Education program, are courses in dancing, personality development, and bartending; on-the-job and on-the-farm training; training given

Q—The other evening I was discussing GI insurance with a friend who has a boy going into the Army soon. I told him I thought no GI insurance was now being sold to fellows entering service. Is that right?

A—That is correct. No new GI insurance policies have been sold to servicemen since April 25, 1951. However, if a man entering service today should have a service-connected disability at the time of his discharge or when released from active duty, he may apply for a special type of GI insurance for the service-disabled.

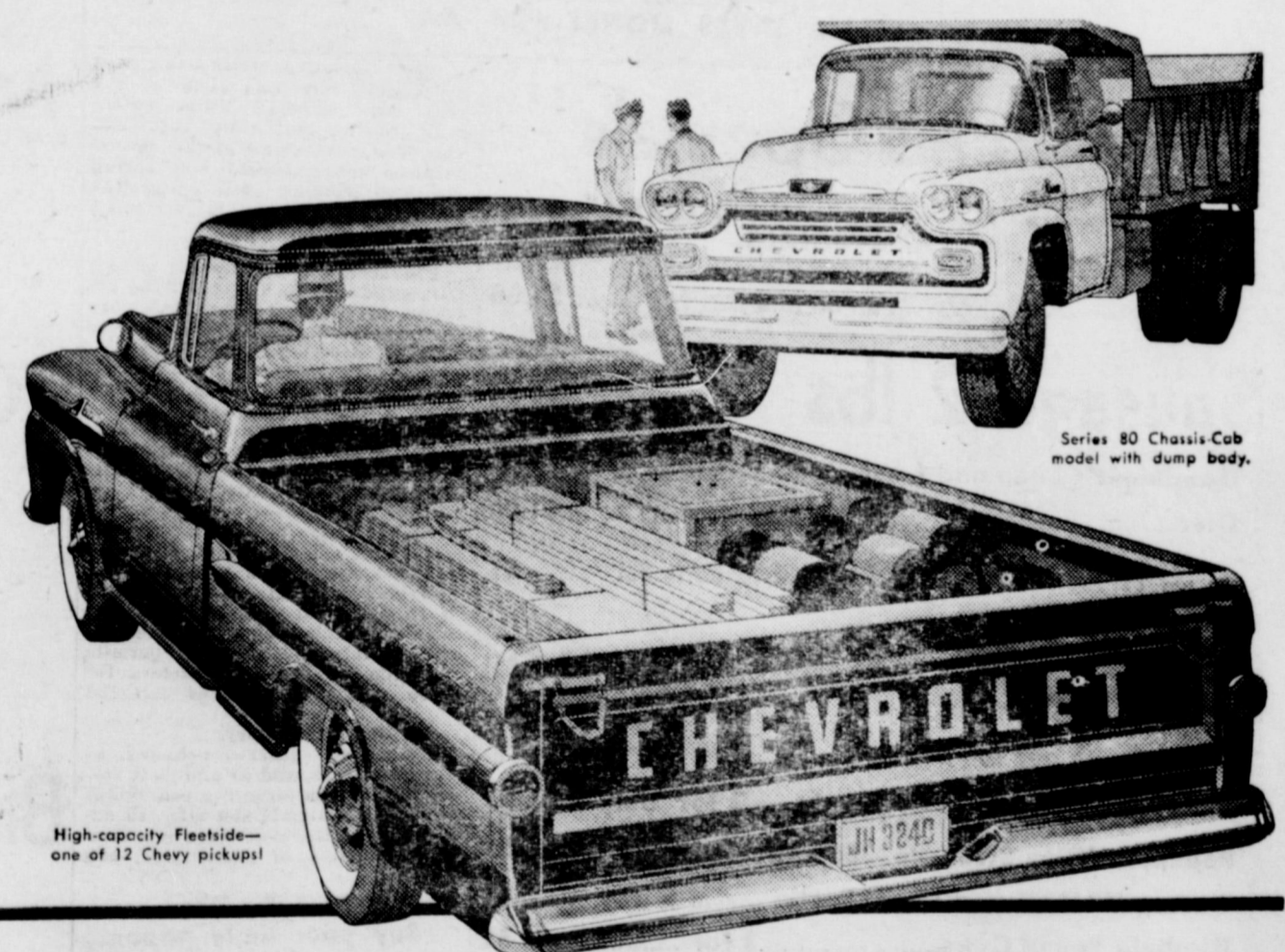

Small eggs are usually the most economical buy this time of the year, says Marshall Miller, extension poultry marketing specialist. They are more plentiful this season because hens hatched last spring are now coming into production and the first eggs they lay are small he adds.

Producers of 95 percent of all milk produced in Texas will be affected by the new brucellosis control regulations which will become effective September 1.

By that date, dairymen operating under Grade A permits must have adopted one of two carefully described plans of herd management, each aimed at eradicating brucellosis from dairy cattle.

Under both plans all breeder cattle over six months of age must be blood tested. Plan A requires the slaughter of reactor animals within 15 days, but does not insist on calfhood vaccination as a protection against infection. Plan B permits retention of branded reactors for three years, and makes calfhood

vaccination mandatory. Brucellosis, otherwise known as Bang's disease, and as undulant fever in its human form, is a contagious disease of animals and man. In addition to cattle, brucellosis is a common affliction of goats, pigs, and horses.
