BANKRUPTCY

In bygone days when a man got himself hopelessly into debt, the courts would jail him until he paid Or, as in our colonial days a man became an "indentured" survant, and would come to America to work

off his debt Neither jail nor servitude proved practical. A man in jail could not earn anything to pay his debts. It was drastic — something like the Siberian salt mines—to send a man

to serve for years across the seas.

Through hard luck, illness, easy credit, impulse buying, or shifts in world affairs, men and women may find themselves hopelessly in debt. Our bankruptcy laws aim to permit an honest but unlucky or weak debtor to turn over a new lead. They allow him to file a voluntary petition in bankruptcy. He accounts for all his property and turns it over for his creditors' bene it. The court sets up machinery to get as much of their money back as pos-

The court then adjudges the man The court then adjudges the man a bankrupt. This means, with some exceptions, that the court will discharge him of his debts. Any income he gets after that time cannot be reached incourt to pay his old debts.

About Wills

The death of an interstate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems re-Mr and Mrs. Rob Lane visited Mr estate. In the preceding column and Mrs. Freddy James and family investigate the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where seperate property is involved, a completely differerent set of rules applies in determining heirship and appor-tioning the estate among the right-

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or interitance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property untl the contrary is clear-

ly proved. Now, here is a general idea as to how your seperate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions pror to your death.

If either your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased child-ren, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full(fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest n the remaning one-third of the real property, whic hpasses o nto the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse

The rule for distributing personal property — cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate ferent. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wfe survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.
With regard to real estate, the

survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided ayour brothers and sisters mong (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.





About Wills

The death of an interstate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his seperate estate. In the preceding column we investigate the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where seperate property is involved, a completely differerent set of rules applies in determining heirship and appor-tioning the estate among the right

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or interitance. Any other property acquired after property acquired after property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property untl the contrary is cleary proved.

Now, here is a general idea to how your seperate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions pror to your death.

If either your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants in mediately physics. ants immediately obtain a full(fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest n the reman-ing one-third of the real property, whic hpasses o nto the children and their descendants upon the death of he spouse

The rule for distributing personal property — cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate — is dif-ferent. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descend-ants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wfe survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants In this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal prop-





About Wills

The death of an interstate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his seperate garding distribution of his seperate estate. In the preceding column we investigate the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where seperate property is involved, a completely differerent set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants ful claimants

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acqured after marriage by gift or interitance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property untl the contrary is clearly proved.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants in this case the surviving scouse inherits all of the personal progrety involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full tiles.

to how your seperate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions pror

If either your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving shouse tate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest n the remaning one-third of the real property, whic hpasses o nto the children and their descendants upon the death of

the spouse The rule for distributing person al property — cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate — is dif-ferent. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third.

survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the en-tire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who sur-
