



**NOTICE OF ELECTION TO BE HELD WITHIN THE CANADIAN RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY ON THE QUESTION OF APPROVAL OF A CONTRACT WITH THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA**

TO ALL QUALIFIED VOTERS WHO RESIDE IN THE CITIES OF AMARILLO, BORGER, BROWNFIELD, LAMESA, LEVELLAND, LUBBOCK, PAMPA, PLAINVIEW, O'DONNELL, SLATON AND TAHOKA, TEXAS, AND WITHIN THE CANADIAN RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY THEREIN AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 22nd day of November, 1960, within the CANADIAN RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY, in compliance with resolution and order duly enacted by the Board of Directors of said Authority on the 12th day of September, 1960, and which resolution and order is a part of this Notice, being in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

"A RESOLUTION calling an election to be held on the 22nd day of November, 1960, in the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said Authority who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation the question of whether or not the Board of Directors shall have the authority to enter into a contract with the United States of America, for the construction of the Canadian River Project as authorized by public law 898, an Act of Congress which became effective December 29, 1950 and for payment by the Authority of the reimbursable cost of the construction, operation and maintenance of the project in accordance with Reclamation Law; prescribing the voting places for said election; designating the presiding judges of said election; prescribing the form of ballot to be employed in said election; and enacting other provisions incident and relative to this resolution."

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Canadian River Municipal Water Authority has determined upon the construction of certain facilities commonly known and referred to as the "Canadian River Project" for the purpose of providing a source of water supply for the member cities of the Authority, for municipal, domestic, industrial and other useful purposes permitted by law, to-wit: a dam and reservoir on the Canadian river at Sanford, Texas; pumping stations, nine lines of aqueducts and other works and facilities designed for the purpose of impounding, processing and delivering water for the aforementioned

purposes; and WHEREAS, this Board finds that plans have been filed in the office of the Secretary of the Authority as well as a report of the United States Department of the Interior Bureau of Reclamation covering the plan, plants, facilities and improvements to be purchased and constructed, together with maps, plats, profiles and data fully showing and explaining same, which report is open to inspection by the public; and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid report contains among other things a detailed estimate of the cost of such improvements and an estimate of the time required to complete same so that service therefrom can be commenced; and

WHEREAS, a summary of said estimate of the cost of said facilities and improvements including the cost of property to be purchased, as shown in the report aforesaid, is as following:

WHEREAS, this Board has received from the United States Department of Interior Bureau of Reclamation a form of contract whereunder the United States Government is to construct the facilities embraced in and at the cost estimated by the aforementioned report and whereunder the Authority shall be obligated to repay all reimbursable costs incurred in such respect by the United States government; and

WHEREAS, copies of said form of contract are on file in the office of the Secretary of the Authority, have been placed in the hands of the governing body of each member City, and are available for examination upon request of any interested party at the office of the Secretary of this Authority; and

WHEREAS, this Board, upon due deliberation, considers that such contract is in the best interest of the Authority and its inhabitants and that same should be entered into when authorized by an election held in the manner provided by the laws of the State of Texas; and

WHEREAS, this Board finds that due notice of its intention to call the election herein ordered has been duly given by mailing and publication as prescribed by Section 15 (1) of Article 8280-154 R. C. S. of Texas, as a condition precedent to the enactment hereof; that no resolutions have been received from the governing body of any member city requesting withdrawal from the Authority under the provisions of the aforementioned statute; and that according to this Board is empowered to call and hold said election throughout the Authority and in each of the member cities of which it is comprised; and

WHEREAS, this Board has concluded that it should now proceed to submit the proposition for its authority to enter into said contract to an election as provided by law:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF CANADIAN RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY:

SECTION 1: That the aforementioned report of the Department of the Interior Bureau of Reclamation is hereby in all things approved and adopted.

SECTION 2: That the aforementioned form of contract presented this Board by the United States Department of the Interior Bureau of Reclamation be and same is hereby approved for submission at the election herein ordered.

SECTION 3: That an election be held on the 22nd day of November, 1960, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same taxation, the following question:

SECTION 4: That for the purpose of the aforesaid election the area and boundaries of the Authority shall include all lands located within the defined corporate limits of the Cities of Amarillo, Borger, Brownfield, Lamesa, Levelland, Lubbock, O'Donnell, Pampa, Plainview, Slaton and Tahoka, Texas.

SECTION 5: The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the general laws of the State of Texas, except as otherwise provided by the aforesaid act creating the Authority.

SECTION 6: Each of the cities of Amarillo, Borger, Brownfield, Lamesa, Levelland, Lubbock, O'Donnell, Pampa, Plainview, Slaton and Tahoka, Texas, shall constitute separate election precincts and each voter shall vote in the city of his or her residence.

SECTION 7: The aforesaid election shall be held at the voting places below indicated, it having been determined that the said voting places conform as nearly as conveniently possible with those customarily designated as voting places in the respective cities. Said polling places and the presiding judges thereof are as follows:

The presiding judge of each polling place aforesaid shall appoint the necessary assistant judges and clerks required to assist in holding such election.

SECTION 8: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V. A. T. C. S. Election Code, adopted by the Fifty Second Legislature in 1951, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR CONTRACT WITH THE UNITED STATES" "AGAINST CONTRACT WITH THE UNITED STATES"

AS TO the foregoing proposition, each voter may mark out with pen or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

SECTION 9: The election officers from each of the polling places hereinabove designated shall make due return of said election in triplicate to the Board of Directors within five (5) days or to be retained by the Presiding Judge, one to be delivered to the President of the Authority, and one to be delivered to the Secretary of the Authority. The ballot boxes and other election supplies shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Authority at his office and be preserved in said office as provided by law.

SECTION 10: The Secretary of the Board of Directors is hereby authorized and directed to give notice of the aforesaid election by publishing a substantial copy of this resolution, or notice containing same, signed by the President and attested by the Secretary, in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation in each city contained in the Authority, on the same day in each of two consecutive weeks, the first of said publications to be made at least twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date fixed for said election; said publication in the manner aforesaid shall constitute proper notice of said election.

PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED, this 12th day of September, 1960.

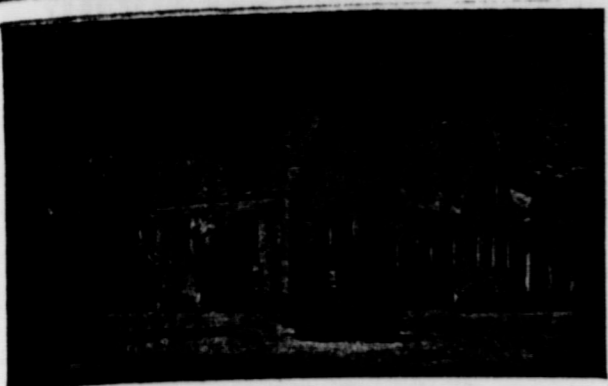

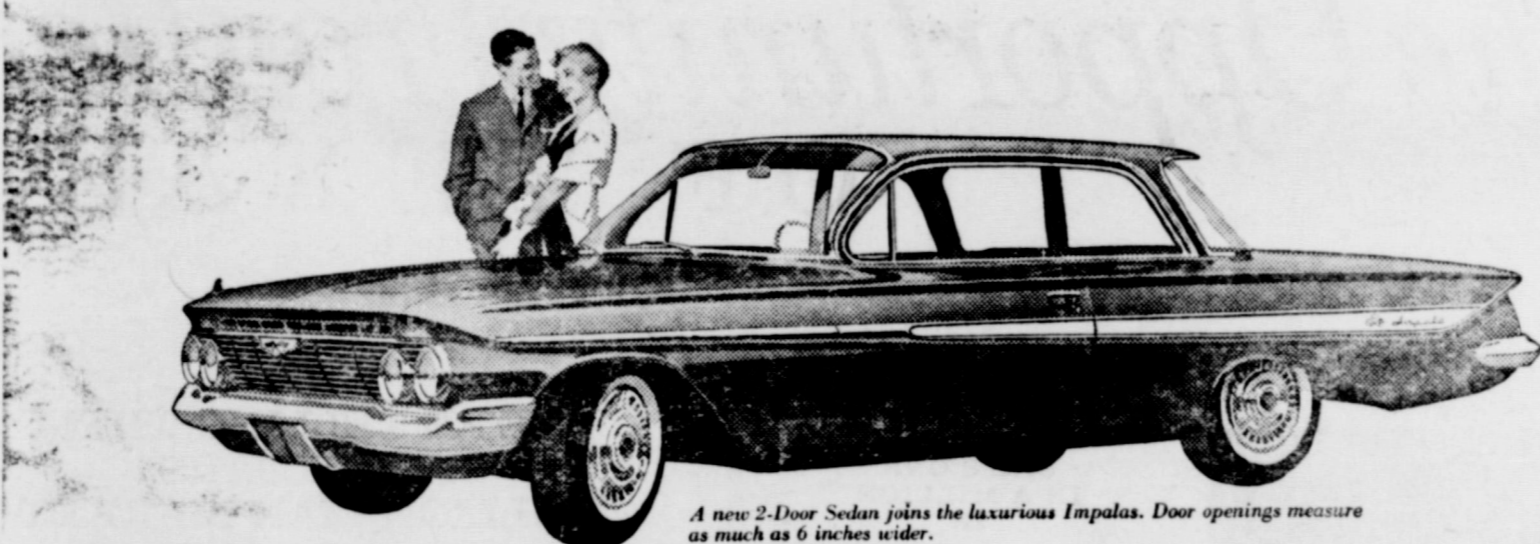

**BANKRUPTCY**

In bygone days when a man got  
himself hopelessly into debt, the  
courts would jail him until he paid  
Or, as in our colonial days a man  
became an "indentured" servant,  
and would come to America to work  
off his debt  
Neither jail nor servitude proved  
practical. A man in jail could not  
earn anything to pay his debts. It  
was drastic — something like the  
Siberian salt mines—to send a man  
to serve for years across the seas.  
Through hard luck, illness, easy  
credit, impulse buying, or shifts in  
world affairs, men and women may  
find themselves hopelessly in debt.  
Our bankruptcy laws aim to per-  
mit an honest but unlucky or weak  
debtor to turn over a new leaf.  
They allow him to file a voluntary  
petition in bankruptcy. He accounts  
for all his property and turns it  
over for his creditors' benefit. The  
court sets up machinery to get as  
much of their money back as possi-  
ble.  
The court then adjudges the man  
a bankrupt. This means, with some  
exceptions, that the court will dis-  
charge him of his debts. Any in-  
come he gets after that time can-  
not be reached in court to pay his  
old debts.  
Debtors may try to gain in ways  
not intended by the bankruptcy laws  
if so, creditors may object. Besides,  
the courts may deal drastically with  
such debtors under our criminal  
laws.  
Under the bankruptcy laws, a man  
is not required to surrender to his  
creditors certain items. In this State  
they usually include the family stove,  
refrigerator, radio, wearing apparel,  
working tools of ne's trade and cer-  
tain other items which vary with  
each individual case.  
Even though items may be ex-  
empt from the creditors in bankrupt-  
cy, however, if they were purchased  
under a conditional sales contract,  
the unpaid seller may nevertheless  
repossess such goods despite a bank-  
ruptcy; so, too, the holder of a  
chattel mortgage on such goods may  
require them to be turned over to  
him.

**About Wills**

The death of an interstate person (one who has made no will) may give rise to many problems regarding distribution of his separate estate. In the preceding column we investigate the manner of dividing the community estate upon the death of a husband or wife. Now we shall see that, where separate property is involved, a completely different set of rules applies in determining heirship and apportioning the estate among the rightful claimants.

It may be well to recall that the separate estate of a husband or wife includes property owned by either before marriage, and that which is acquired after marriage by gift or inheritance. Any other property acquired after marriage is presumed by law to be community property until the contrary is clearly proved.

Now, here is a general idea as to how your separate property will be divided if you do not make a will with contrary provisions prior to your death.

If either your husband or wife survives and if, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of previously deceased children, the children and their descendants immediately obtain a full (fee) title in two-thirds of the real estate involved. The surviving spouse receives a life interest in the remaining one-third of the real property, which passes on to the children and their descendants upon the death of the spouse.

The rule for distributing personal property — cash, stocks, bonds, furniture, or any other items not constituting real estate — is different. Here the surviving spouse gets full ownership of one-third, and the children and their descendants inherit the balance.

Now suppose your husband or wife survives, but there are no surviving children or their descendants in this case the surviving spouse inherits all of the personal property involved.

With regard to real estate, the survivor obtains full title to one-half, and the other half is divided between your mother and father, if both survive you. If only one of them survives, he or she receives only half of this portion, and the other half (or one-fourth of the entire real estate) will be divided among your brothers and sisters (and their descendants) who survive. If there are no surviving brothers and sisters and their descendants, then the one surviving parent inherits the full one-half.

Industries can install special smoke reducing apparatuses and devices which significantly reduce odor, soot, and dust.

**BANKRUPTCY**

In bygone days when a man got himself hopelessly into debt, the courts would jail him until he paid or, as in our colonial days a man became an "indentured" servant, and would come to America to work off his debt.

Neither jail nor servitude proved practical. A man in jail could not earn anything to pay his debts. It was drastic — something like the Siberian salt mines — to send a man to serve for years across the seas.

Through hard luck, illness, easy credit, impulsive buying, or shifts in world affairs, men and women may find themselves hopelessly in debt. Our bankruptcy laws aim to help a debtor to turn over a new leaf. They allow him to file a voluntary petition in bankruptcy. He accounts for all his property and turns it over to his creditors' benefit. The court sets up machinery to get as much of their money back as possible.

The court then adjudges the man a bankrupt. This means, with some exceptions, that the court will discharge him of his debts. Any in-chance he gets after that time cannot be reached in court to pay his old debts.

Debtors may try to gain in ways not intended by the bankruptcy laws. If so, creditors may object. Besides, the courts may deal drastically with such debtors under our criminal laws.

Under the bankruptcy laws, a man is not required to surrender to his creditors certain items. In this State they usually include the family stove, refrigerator, radio, wearing apparel, working tools of his trade and certain other items which vary with each individual case.

Even though items may be exempt from the creditors in bankruptcy, however, if they were purchased under a conditional sales contract, the unpaid seller may nevertheless repossess such goods despite a bankruptcy; so, too, the holder of a chattel mortgage on such goods may require them to be turned over to him.

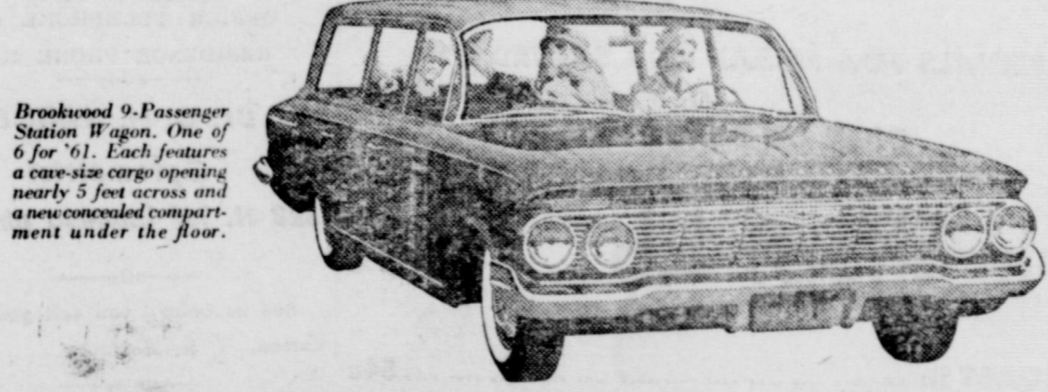
