You may still mail your Christmas cards with just your signature not sealed for 4 cents anywhere in the U. S. Although by placing the Angel Gabriel 5 cent stamp on your cards they can either be forwarded to their destination or returned back to you.

Always use your return address on everything that you mail. It is a requirement when mailing a package to have your return address on the package.

It also takes very little time to place the ZIP Code number on the address as well as your own ZIP Code number (79351) in your return address.

Time is growing short to send overseas air parcels and mail for it to reach its destination by Christmas. This should be from Dec. 1 to Dec 10.

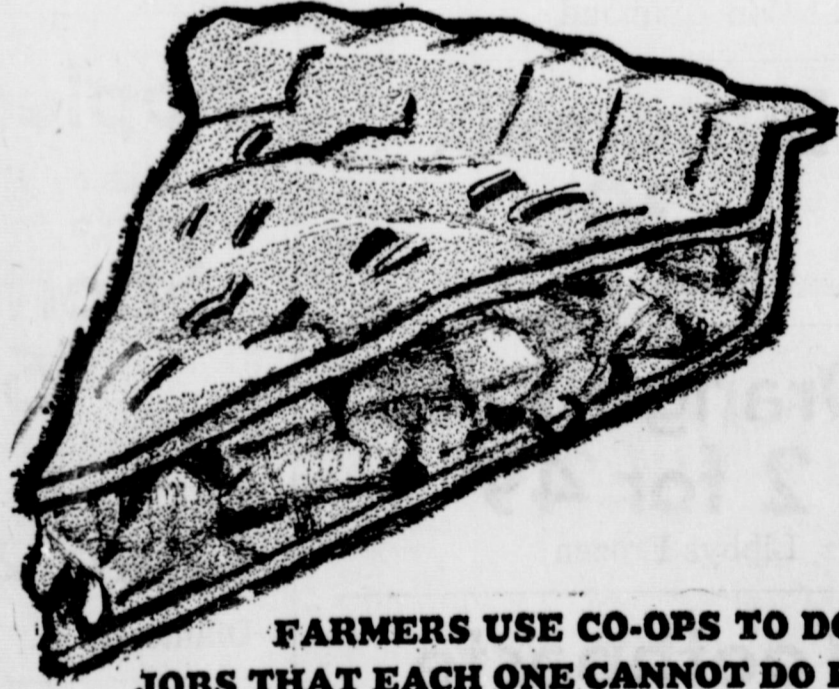

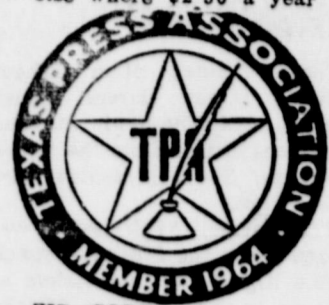


