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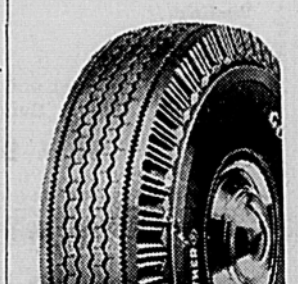

Soil Conservation District News

Great Plains Conservation Program funds are now available for farmers and ranchers in Callahan County.

The County Program Committee has formulated a program for the county in keeping with the local conservation needs. The Callahan County Program Committee is composed of Tommie Harris, chairman of the County ASC committee; John D. Wolf Jr., County Farmers Home Administration Supervisor, and D. C. Cox, Soil Conservation Service technician. This committee working with Glen Green, County Agent; C. M. Garrett, Central Colorado Soil Conservation District Supervisor, and John D. Isenhour, Lower Clear Fork Soil Conservation District Supervisor, formulated the County program. The representative of the Soil Conservation Service is chairman of the committee as authorized by Public Law 1021, 84th Congress.

The objective of the program is to assist farmers and ranchers in developing and carrying out, on a voluntary basis, a plan of operations that will bring about greater stability in agriculture. This stability will be achieved through cropping and grazing systems, land use changes and the application of enduring soil and water conservation practices. This program will be coordinated with all existing programs.

The Soil Conservation Service has been designated as the agency responsible for administration of the program, however application for assistance may be made through any agency of the Department.

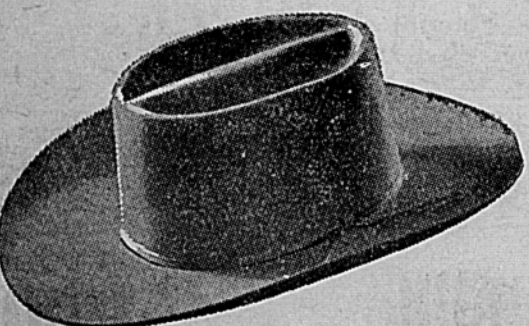
