Howell Well Has Show

Northeast of O'Donnell Houston Oil Co. and Seaboard Oil Co No 1 H B Howell, Pennsylvanian wild cat, cored over the week end after getting signs of Spraberry production. Last report was coring between 6,414 feet in lime and sand. There was a show of oil at 6345 feet. The drill stem test at 6247 to 6320 feet recovered 140 feet of oil and gas cut mud. The well is 6 miles northwest of the newly opened O'Donnell field just east of Draw. Two offsets to the Garza No 1 discovery in the new field are drilling ahead.

One of the offsets, Magnolia No 1 W W Caswell, step out from the discovery, to the west, topped the Spraberry sand of the Permian at 5,943 feet. The section between 5,943 and 5,965 feet showed slight signs of gas and oil but not enough to warrant a drill stem test. The Caswell well is 28 feet low to the discovery on the basis of the Spraberry sand. The Caswell well will drill ahead to test the pay at 8750 feet.

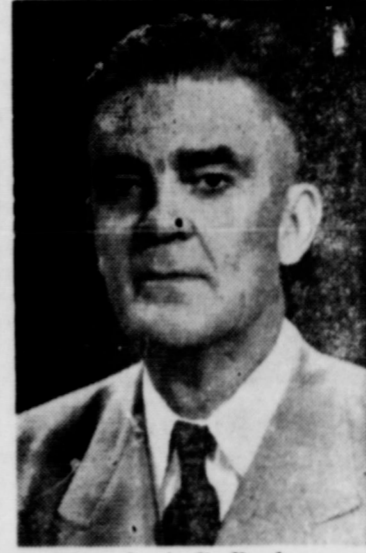

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

UN Flag Ordered Flown In Korea; Gen. MacArthur Named Commander Of International Forces in Area

UNITED NATIONS: Fights Aggression

There are moments in the march of current events that make history. In the eyes of many political observers such a moment occurred recently when Secretary General of the United Nations, Trygve Lie, picked up the three by five-foot blue and white UN flag and handed it to Warren R. Austin, chief U. S. delegate to the UN, and asked him to send it to General Douglas MacArthur.

UN Flag



The blue and white flag of the United Nations has been sent to Korea to be flown by troops battling the Communist invaders from North Korea. Gen. Douglas MacArthur has been named commander in chief of the United Nations forces.

The Security Council had just authorized the UN flag to be flown alongside national standards in operations against the Red Korean invaders. And as he handed the flag to Austin, he said: "Bring it back when the job is done."

On these words hinge the hopes of the free world. Observers saw in them a belief that the United Nations efforts in Korea will be successful and at last a world organization has been formed that will endure and protect the minorities for generations to come.

Observers were particularly impressed because it climaxed firm and positive action by the community of nations to secure world peace.

Up to this point the United Nations had:

- (1) Demanded the withdrawal of Communist invaders from South Korea.
(2) Quickly endorsed the United States action of sending aid to South Korea and called upon all members of the United Nations to render assistance to carry out the police action against the Communists.
(3) Appointed General MacArthur commander of international forces in Korea.

THAT SMELL: Not The Russians

Four towns in Illinois and three in Iowa provided the nation with a chuckle, but it was not funny at the time at least to residents of those towns.

A foul smell crept through Moline, East Moline, Selvis and Rock Island, Ill., and then spread across the border into Muscatine, Bettendorf and Davenport, Iowa.

Some residents went into hysterics, one man insisted to Selvis police that "the Russians are flying over and gassing us," citizens were forced from their beds and from taverns, police switchboards were jammed with calls and firemen kept on a near-emergency basis. Scores of Moline residents jumped into their cars and drove in their night clothes to high ground and fresher air.

When the excitement died down investigation disclosed the odor resulted from a leak in a tank of entalarm being hauled through the area on a truck headed west. Entalarm is an odorant used to inject a smell of natural gas, normally odorless, to permit detection of leaks. It is not injurious but can cause nausea.

REORGANIZATION: New Plan Killed

President Truman's plan to create a new department of health, education and security has been killed by the house. It was, incidentally, the first time this session the house has rejected a reorganization plan. The senate has killed six.

The house adopted, 249 to 71, a resolution of disapproval of the measure. It was killed apparently by opponents who argued it would be a step toward "socialized medicine."

Democrats who supported the plan, however, denied it had any bearing on socialized medicine. They said only congress could bring this about by passing necessary legislation.

RETAIL PRICES: Up Another Notch

The Korean situation was not the only worry of Americans during the past week or so. Living costs went up another notch with the prices of meat and bread being increased in retail stores. Cocoa, coffee, sugar, hides and tin continued upward. Cotton soared to \$15 a bale, and cattle went to the highest price level in a year. It is all blamed on the Korean war, but other factors entered in.

GOOD CITIZEN

Laws Are Rules People Make So They May Live in Harmony

This is the fourth of a series of ten articles from the booklet "Good Citizens" published by The American Heritage Foundation concerning the rights and duties of an American.

THE THIRD promise of a good citizen: I will respect and obey the laws. I will assist public officials in preventing crime and the courts in giving evidence.

Laws are rules people make so they can live together without stepping on each other's toes.

The simplest law of all, perhaps, is the traffic light. When it is green it's supposed to protect you against the other fellow. When it is red it's supposed to protect the other person from you.

Ours is a government of laws—not men. Our constitution guarantees that our laws may be made in one way, and one way only, by the people, through their elected representatives—not by one man, or a few men, or by any appointed group.

No man in this country is so big that he is above the law, and none so insignificant that he cannot look to the law for protection.

A good citizen cooperates with the law. He assists public agents in preventing crime, and the courts in giving evidence.

A good citizen does not evade the law. He does not say, "I know somebody who can fix my ticket." Laws necessarily change with needs of the times. A good citizen's attitude toward a law which he regards as unfair, unreasonable and out of step with the times is that of working to get it changed—but obeying it while it is on the books.

There is the letter of the law—and the spirit of the law. You cannot make good men by laws, and the hope of law and order is grounded in the reverence of a majority of people for justice, truth and goodness. But, in the final analysis, a law has teeth in it. Using federal offenses as an example, one great historian says:

"If you refuse long enough to make out a correct income tax return and refuse to obey an order to appear in court, you will get a touch of government power. Three or four husky fellows will take you by the scuff of the neck and the seat of the pants and hustle you into a police van motored by the power of internal combustion."

To guard against hasty and ill-advised action or the concentration of powers in any one man or body of men, a system of checks and balances is provided by the federal constitution. Of these:

It would take six years completely to replace the elected branches of the federal government composed exclusively of members of one party by the members of another.

This is due to the fact that: The President is elected for four years; the members of the house of representatives are elected every two years, and one-third of the senators are elected every two years but for a six-year term.

Laws passed either by the senate or by the house of representatives must be approved by a majority of the other body.

The President can veto laws enacted by congress, and his veto can be overridden only by a two-thirds vote of each house.

The courts have the right to interpret laws passed by congress and to review the legality of acts of officers of the government charged with the administration. In many cases the courts have held acts of congress invalid as being in conflict with a provision of the constitution.

The senate has the power to review and reject Presidential appointments of diplomatic, judicial, and certain other officers of the government, as well as the power to approve or reject treaties with foreign governments.

The house of representatives has the power to impeach and the senate the place of trial and to remove from office all civil officers of the United States including even the President.

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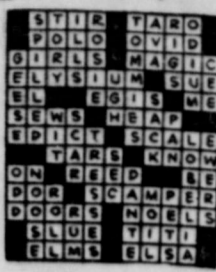
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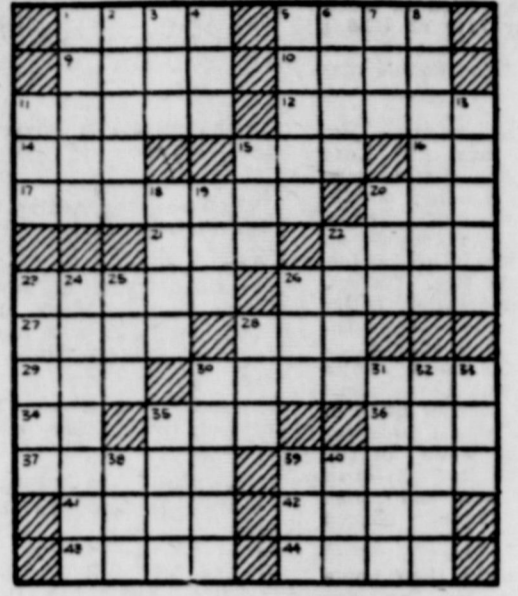
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CROSSWORD PUZZLE

Television Versus IQ—It Can Be Made Cultural Medium

As an old blab merchant, I seldom pay much attention to the other fellow's speeches, and when I do it's generally to take umbrage rather than notice.

This week, however, I'd like to turn coat and tables on myself and do some hefty hollering about a speech delivered by Dr. Millard Fought, an economist, at the University Club of Chicago. I happened to pop-eye a copy of it the other day, and while I haven't the space to give you the whole 4,000 words, here's a bit of the cream off the top...

To begin with, Dr. Fought axioms that TV can be used for a lot of things besides selling eyewash, mouthwash and hogwash, and insists that its full potentialities will never be realized if we allow it to be taken over lock, stock and antenna by the hucksters. In his opinion, the new dingus can do an unprecedented job for us in a dozen esthetic fields providing, of course, that a method can be devised whereby someone besides the advertiser foots part of the bill.

The gimmick he suggests is a television box office operating on a pay-as-you-see-it basis, and the one he specifically mentions in his speech—Phonovision—is due to be tested in Chicago this fall with the blessings of the F.C.C.

LEAVING ELECTRONIC double-talk out of it, Phonovision, which was recently demonstrated for me, is simply this: a system whereby 99 per cent of an image is telecast free of charge, but shows up on the

IN A FEW DAYS NOW, close to a thousand mammoths, mastodons and gazelles will be turned loose on the public domain. These represent the pro football crop for 1950, with peace finally established. There will be 13 teams in action, where each squad will be large at least in the earlier days of practice, before the pruning knife falls.

Just what the aggregate weight of these 13 squads will be beyond our guess but the weights run from 155 to 285 pounds and there are more players over 200 than under 200. The 13 head coaches and their aids have a tough job to face in reducing the oil and fat content where steaming blubber must be taken off in tons.

The new season will open with a Philadelphia explosion where the Eagles and Browns are figured to draw some 100,000 clients. It might interest Joe McCarthy to know that no manager ever left the scene with a better press than the departing Red Sox leader drew around the circuit.

Maybe a manager who wins nine pennants and seven world series doesn't need too many boosts.

Either an extra charge of TNT has been inserted in the ball or an extra zip has been removed from pitching arms, something is wrong — to break the news mildly.

Easily Made Night Clothes Relief to Family Budget

By Eritta Haley

TAKE A GOOD look at your clothing budget, those of you who have big families. Is it out of line and hard to meet?

You may not have enough time to sew all the clothes for all the members of the family, but if you can make your own night clothes, such as gowns, house robes and pajamas, you can relieve a lot of strain on the family's clothing budget.

These are easy garments to make, and you can frequently press old clothing, pieces of remnant or good but inexpensive pieces of material into service.

Gowns and pajamas are usually given to beginners so they can learn to sew, so you need not worry about their being difficult to make, if you are inexperienced at sewing. If you feel pressed for time, then this is a job that will require little of precious time and energy.

With home sewing, you can make garments that are suitable and fitting, as well as those which will require few laundering problems. With good materials and carefully chosen styles, you can also eliminate many mending problems, which will be a saving in time for you later.

For warm weather, choose lighter weight materials such as seersucker broadcloth and percale. Nainsook, batiste and voile may be used for girls' gowns.

Old robes discarded by older members of the family frequently yield enough serviceable material to make garments for the younger set. These will not have to be ripped

to the youngster four-years old or younger.

If you desire, you can also make the younger child's pajamas in a style that has a back belt which slips through the side seam belt loops and ties in front. In this way, buttons are eliminated and the child can tie the pajama in front and requires little help.

One-piece pajamas require less material than two-piece and can be used in the four to seven year age group. After this, two-piece pajamas are preferred again, but if they are made in a midly style top, buttons again can be eliminated. When there are no buttons, you can cut down button and buttonhole sewing, and thus make mending and ironing much easier.

If you're planning making pajamas for colder weather, make those for tots with feet so they may have greater protection and warmth. Some of the older children may prefer them, too, if the climate is cold.

Gowns for girls may be of ankle or above ankle length, especially

at the seams. The new garment can be cut from back or front, especially if it's a small size.

Robes should provide warmth, but they shouldn't be too bulky, as this makes them difficult to sew and uncomfortable to wear.

Choose Correct Patterns For Children's Pajamas

One of the best aspects of being able to sew pajamas at home for youngsters is that you can assure proper and comfortable fit. This is decidedly important, especially if the child is a chubby and has difficulty in getting ready-made clothes.

The legs on the pajamas should be comfortable without bagging; Shoulders and neck should fit smoothly to have proper set and comfort in the garment. The armholes should be roomy to accommodate different sleeping positions, and the crotch must be long enough.

Smaller children do best in two-piece pajamas that button at the waistline. Two pairs of pants, and one top are usually ideally suited



and robes in suitable styles.

for warm weather. If these are made with elastic in the waist the gown stays on better.

Use Appropriate Materials For Children's Clothing
If you have a growing family, chances are that there are always

materials around the house that can be pressed to use for such items as night clothes. Now is a good time to check through storeroom, closets and drawers, so that you can make space for some things which will be purchased this fall.

Seersucker, percale or broadcloth bedspreads frequently yield materials for night clothing. If there is not enough material in the spread for both pajama parts, use something that will harmonize with what you have.

A broadcloth top can easily go with seersucker pants, or two contrasting cottons, one in print, and the other in a solid, might well go together.

If you have enough material for both pajamas and robe, then by all means make the three-piece outfit, as it will thrill the child.

Cotton flannel materials are excellent when you make cool weather materials. Choose masculine prints for the boys, no matter how young they are. Flowered prints and plaids are nice for the girls, either by themselves or combined with a solid color to match one color in print or plaid.

Dad's old house robe or a light-weight suit in a flannel would make appropriate robes for the boys when cut down. A robe in dark blue or gray would be good even for girls, especially if piped in bright red or maroon, for the girls.

Chenille, purchased by the yard, or cut from an old spread, might also be used to make robes. It's

warm without being too bulky, and is excellent to use after a bath.

Durable Construction Helps Clothes Wear

You'll encounter no great construction difficulties with pajamas or nightgowns because the seams are straight and simple. The stitches should be adjusted to weight of material and threads, as for any other clothing.

Simple seams may be used in the pajama top, but flat fell or French seams are usually employed in the pants, as they give better tailoring, more comfort and wear.

If you're using elastic bands at the pants' waist, make certain it's of good quality, so it doesn't have to be changed during the life of the garment. It should be tight enough to keep the pants on, but not too restricting as this interferes with sleeping comfort.

Buttons which will not withstand laundering are a poor investment on clothing such as this which needs frequent launderings. Have them simple but durable, and with buttonholes that will accommodate them readily.

Trimming Should Conform To Style of Garment

Trimings are not at all essential on pajamas and nightgowns, but if they are used should be of the simplest variety. Contrasting bands are seen on sleeves and sometimes at the pants' ends, the latter being used to lengthen them when the child gets too tall.

Girl's Mother Is too Ambitious

TODAY'S rather sad and difficult appeal comes from a St. Louis girl of 15. She is not strictly a resident of that city, but her father works there, and she does not want her particular suburban town identified. Hers is an old and subtle problem, and I am not sure I can help with it, although I have met it hundreds of times.

"My mother is everything that is sweet, generous, tactful," writes Norma. "She is small, dainty, and most amazingly capable. She loves home, Daddy and me; she keeps everything fresh and sweet, is merry and affectionate, and everyone loves her."

"I am tall, steady and practical in type—my father's child. I am shy, making friends slowly, and getting confused in any social crisis. I am completely happy with books, walks, fishing trips with my father, and a few girl friends. We board three men students from a nearby business school, and I like those we have now, but all three are five or six years older than I, and all have girls. Mother would not want me to fall in love with this type of boy, however, so she doesn't worry about that."

Doesn't Belong

"My trouble is that my mother is ambitious for me. She comes from a family higher in the social scale than Dad's; she had every advantage as a girl, and many beaux. Lots of her old friends are nice to me, and invite me to their children's affairs, but I do not belong there. I haven't the right clothes

I save my mother all the fussing and money worry and risk of snubs and disappointments that all this means, and live the quietly happy life that is right near me, and yet so far away!"

Poor little 15-year-old Norma, this really is a hard situation. Often love complicates an affair like this, for the last thing you want to do is hurt your mother, and yet you can't help hurting her all the time. She evidently is resigned to the fact that your father is not ever going to give her the luxury she once had, but she is fighting to gain it for you. Already she is dreaming of a distinguished marriage; you must have the big house and the servants and the trips and honors she will never have.

My suggestion is that you compromise. Give in occasionally, go off determined to enjoy one of these deadly affairs at which, in spite of the fact that you are, I suspect, infinitely superior in most ways to other youngsters, you simply can't seem to get in, to get started, to show them your real self.

Then develop your own social group. Do this by attending evening classes and really working hard at architecture, Spanish, drama. You'll meet real people; a spectacled, shabby boy who wants to write poetry, a hard-working young giant who means to be a big doctor some day, a merry little couple painting tomorrow's masterpieces in an attic, a middle-aged widower wistful for something more than the drudgery of office days. And presently you'll find the man who will rescue you from your mother's fluttered, anxious plans.

Colors Clue To Personality

Blue for Introverts, Red Indicates Vigor

NEW YORK—Picking personality types from the colors a person prefers is a new parlor pastime.

A house decorated predominately in blue, for instance, would indicate that the owner was introverted, intelligent, conservative and maybe just a bit lazy.

That is part of the color theory included in Faber Birren's new book, "Color Psychology and Color Therapy." Birren, who is 49, has been experimenting with color since his college days and has written 14 books on the subject.

Yellow, he says, is the color of the high minded. The yellow type is inclined to be stand-offish, though he makes lasting friendships.

Red indicates a hearty, vigorous person "who is likely to run roughshod over other people's feelings." Birren advises the person who prefers red to marry someone who likes blue or green, since they're the more conservative, stable types.

If you're thinking of repainting the children's room in pink, maybe you'd better pause for a second thought.

"It's the goal of most Americans to make pink personalities of their children," Birren says. He characterizes a pink personality as one who likes life and who is interested in the world, but doesn't want to be reminded that it isn't a kind and gentle world.

The pink woman, he says, probably has been pampered and protected since she was a child.

But I feel as if I couldn't bear years of this, until I am older, can take a job, and perhaps marry some quiet man that no other girl wants. How can

Must the Mother-in-Law Help to Make the Marriage a Success?

A young man married a girl whom his mother considered a social inferior. After the wedding, the mother continued to treat her son's wife very coldly—making no effort to establish a friendly feeling in the family. The marriage didn't last long, and the girl finally sued her mother-in-law for alienation of affections. However, the court turned down her claim. The judge said that the mother-in-law's conduct, whether wise or unwise, was still legal. His Honor explained: "Parents may hold aloof from their son's wife, may decline to recognize her, may show no interest in her. The law doesn't require anything from in-laws, except that they don't meddle with the domestic felicity of the young couple."

May a Judge Act Gallantly Toward a Female Witness?

Injured in a night club brawl, a girl sued the management for damages. At the trial, she appeared in the courtroom with a nurse. Mother-in-Law's Acts Are Legal

Would the Courts Enforce A Purely Moral Obligation?

Just before his death, a broker asked his business partner to "look after my wife when I'm gone." Solemnly the partner promised to do so. Soon after the broker died, the partner realized that the company's future was none too bright. He sold his share — but did nothing about the interest of his partner's widow. It wasn't long before she realized that she had been left "holding the bag." Angrily she sued the partner for damages, claiming that he had broken his deathbed promise to her husband. But the court refused to do anything about it. The judge said the partner's promise was unenforceable because it was based on mere "friendship and good will" — instead of some legal obligation.

If a Workman is Stabbed By a Maniac, May He Collect Compensation?

A laundryman finished making a delivery, and started back toward his truck. Just then a maniac appeared on the sidewalk, wielding a knife with great ferocity. He rushed up to the laundryman and, before other bystanders could restrain him, inflicted several wounds on the man's shoulder. When the victim later tried to collect workmen's compensation for his injuries, the company opposed the claim on the ground that the mishap had no connection with the job. But the court disagreed and granted the claim. The judge pointed out that a laundryman's duties require him to be on the street at times, and therefore he should be protected against "street risks."

Slot Machine Always Wins, Player Learns Hard Way

JASPER, Ind.—William Summers, of Washington, Ind., found out what millions have already learned: you can't beat a "one armed bandit."

Summers lost on a nickel slot machine at the Moose lodge for about five hours. He got so mad he picked up the quarter machine and walked out. On the way to his car, he slugged a bartender who tried to stop him.

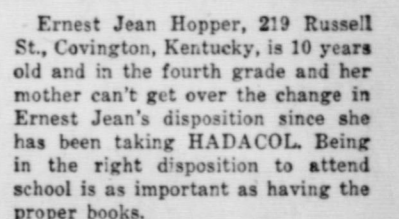

High Quality Hay Cuts Dairy Costs

Feed, Labor 80 Percent Of Production Cost

Good pasture and high-quality, low-cost hay will cut feed and labor costs and greatly increase net returns for dairymen, declared Timothy Hodge, Michigan State College agricultural economist.

Hodge estimates that feed and labor expense represents 80 per cent of the cost of keeping a dairy cow. The lower the feed and labor costs can be made, the bigger will be the dairyman's net return.

Pasture and hay are the cheapest feeds a cow can get. Agronomists re-

port that 25 pounds of good alfalfa hay will supply all the protein needed to produce about 30 pounds of 4 per cent milk daily and furnish calcium, carotene and vitamin D as well. Good pasture cuts labor expense, because the cows do the harvesting.

Three essentials needed to maintain good pasture and get maximum returns from pasture crops are: (1)—a good legume-grass mixture best adapted to your growing conditions. (2)—a fertile soil that will steadily furnish a well balanced supply of plant foods. Soil tests will show the land's need for lime and for phosphate and potash fertilizer. (3)—Good management which rotates grazing and avoids overworking some areas while others become coarse and unpalatable. Good management also involves harvesting pasture growth at the peak of its protein value to insure high quality hay.

Farmers Report New Disease Among Pigs

A strange disease of little pigs that makes them shiver, jerk and sometimes "dance" is worrying quite a few farmers.

What causes the condition is somewhat of a mystery, the American Veterinary Medical association says.

It strikes newly born pigs. Some of the affected animals merely shiver and tremble. In other cases, the pigs may not be able to keep their feet still, resulting in an involuntary "dance."

The latest report, by Dr. H. C. H. Kernkamp, a research veterinarian at the University of Minnesota, indicates that the disease, known as myoclonia congenita, is still almost as baffling to scientists as it was when first described in 1922.

Electric Hired Hand



Electricity can lighten farm chores and greatly increase productivity. How it's done is shown in a new color film, "Electrified Farming" which has been released by General Electric.

Crop dryers, barn cleaners, milking machines, water pumping systems, electric brooders, and ventilating fans are cited as examples of the widening use of electricity in production on modern farms.

Soybeans Important Cash Crop in Minnesota

Soybeans as a cash crop in Minnesota responded to high prices during the war and post-war years. The acreage harvested for beans increased from 30,000 acres in 1939 to 920,000 in 1947 and then dropped back to 709,000 in 1949. Most of the increase occurred from 1944 to 1947.

In 19 counties 5 per cent or more of the tillable land was in soybeans harvested for beans in 1949.

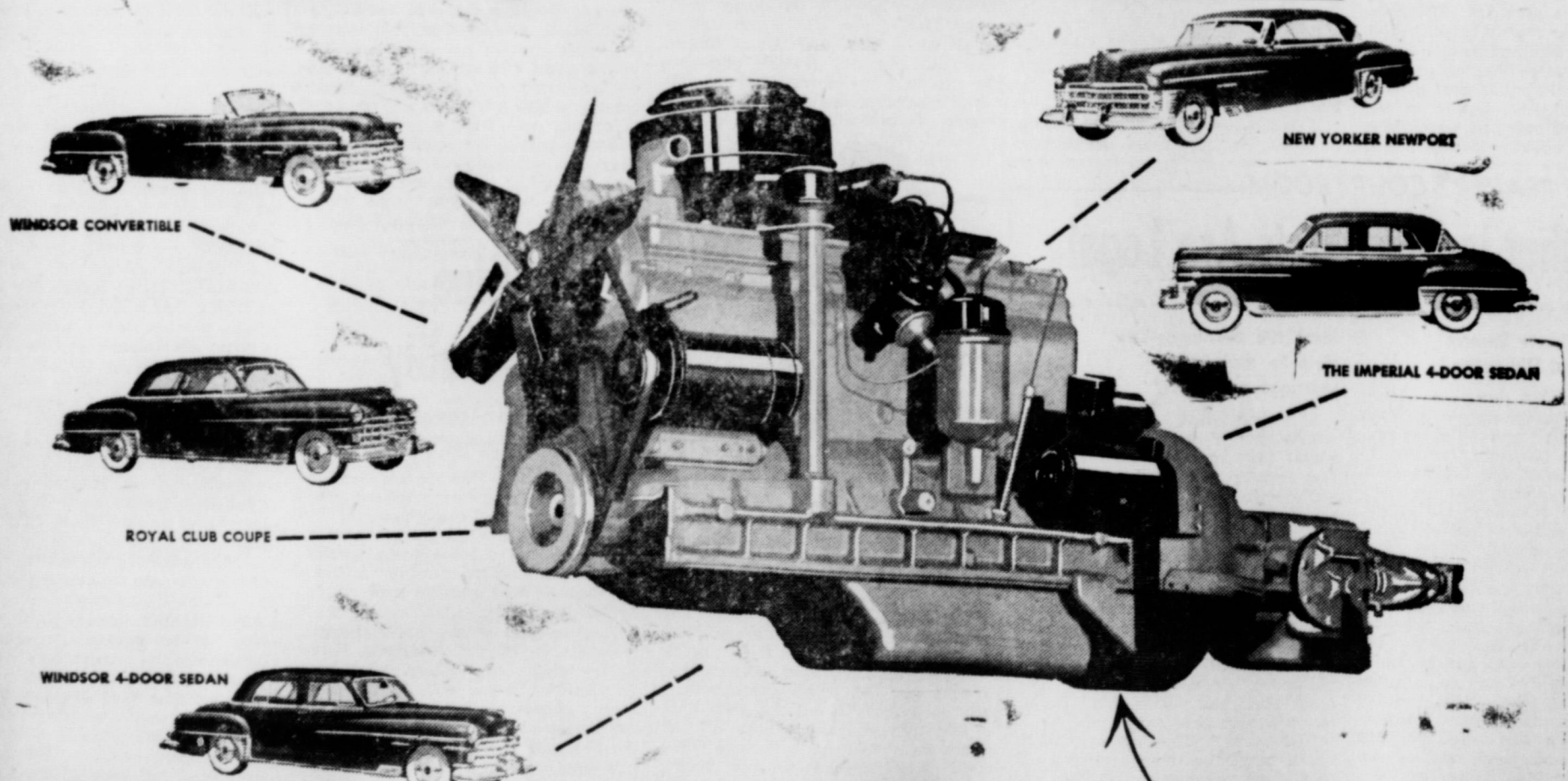

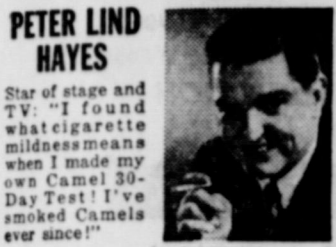

Crusade for Freedom

THE GREAT moral crusade for freedom, based on the spiritual belief in the dignity, worth and accountability of the individual human soul is the one factor lacking in the materialistic, godless United Nations set-up.

Gen. Lucius D. Clay, former military governor of the American sector in Germany, General Eisenhower, James A. Farley, Sen. Herbert Lehman and others who have identified themselves with this global movement, have sparked a "spiritual airlift" which is expected to carry our message of American friendship and goodwill to men and women everywhere over the most powerful and extensive network of radio power that it is possible to assemble.

The huge freedom bell which was struck at Crocyden, England from metals brought from all the free nations of the world, is expected to be hung at Templehof airfield in Berlin, behind the iron curtain, probably October 24, United Nations day.

The bell, weighing 10 tons, bears the inscription: "That this world, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom." As contrasted to the United Nations which does not even open its sessions with prayer, the crusade for freedom and the freedom bell dedication will have a deep religious significance. World church leaders will be present to emphasize the truth that all human rights are derived from God, that freedom has its foundation in faith and that personal liberty is impossible in a godless society."

Millions of Americans are expected to join in this great freedom crusade and plans are underway to publicize it throughout the nation, to have great rallies in major centers throughout the country following an opening rally set for Labor Day in New York. A cavalcade of planes and personnel, perhaps some from the Berlin airlift itself, will visit 30 metropolitan centers throughout the country, bearing a giant replica of the freedom bell. Public rallies will be held in the grassroots towns and smaller cities also. It is the proposal to make of the freedom bell at Templehof airfield a permanent shrine and enroll as a permanent part of the records the names and addresses of every man, woman and child in the country taking part in the crusade.

Programs Planned

According to present plans, the world dedication ceremony on October 24 will call simultaneous celebrations throughout the civilized world. Church bells, city hall bells, school bells, bells everywhere will ring-out throughout Europe and America. While the committee is not planning to conduct a fund-raising drive, contributions of nickels and dimes from school children on up will be accepted to help underwrite the bell and the crusade through the newspapers, radio and television.

Purpose Outlined

In a statement of purposes the Crusade for Freedom looks toward the soul of the world... freedom, friendship and faith.

"Our nation is the symbol of these fundamental principles to liberty-loving men and women everywhere. Today these principles are being denounced and reviled. We have suffered seriously set-backs in the contest of ideas between our way of life and totalitarianism.

"In the five years since the United Nations charter proclaimed the determination of all nations to reaffirm in fundamental human rights and in the dignity and worth of the human person we have seen the most highly organized and widespread campaign against human rights and fundamental freedoms that the world has ever known."

"In the conviction that countless citizens throughout our country would welcome the opportunity to participate in such an effort, representatives of all the major groups of American life are joining forces to initiate the crusade for freedom... We are the greatest, most enthusiastic nation of salesmen in the world. In the cause of freedom and friendship we have the greatest product in the world to sell."

Speed Up Crusade

With Russia transferring its action from subversion to aggression and sponsoring a hot war as opposed to a cold war in Asia, the hope goes up that this Crusade for Freedom will get underway as fast as possible, that it will gather momentum and sweep this nation and the rest of the God-fearing nations of the world everywhere. It is the best hope for peace in this nervous world of war scares.

Fruit Canning Is Easy

FRUIT CANNING yields big returns for little effort, every homemaker admits when she goes to her canning shelf to load her arms with a jar of pears for the luncheon salad, berries for pie, or peaches for dessert.

It's delightful, too, to gaze on the colorful jars of fruit and berries, with their luscious array of colors and marvel at the juicy goodness in them.

Fruit canning is simple, too, because the fruit requires only a short cooking time to prepare for the jars. This cooking before packing helps shrink the fruit to give a better pack and, at the same time, extracts some juices which may be used for packing.

Select Ripe Fruits

FOR FRUIT canning, it's wise to choose fruits which reach full maturity on vines or trees in place of getting green produce which you have to ripen on the window sill or out on the back porch. Naturally ripened fruits and berries have firmness that makes them easier to handle as well as sweetness which can be acquired in no other way.

Plan to can only the amount that you can handle efficiently for speed is required so there is no spoilage on the way to the jar. When fruit waits around after one step for another, it will be exposed to air and will lose much of its flavor and appearance.

Making A Water Bath

THE USE OF a boiling water bath canner has been widely used and recommended for processing fruits since it gives such good results. This can easily be made at home if you do not already have one.

Select a large preserving kettle, lard pail or even wash tub. The vessel should have a cover which fits tightly so that you can cover it during processing and thus prevent the water from boiling away. Even so, it's a good idea to have a kettle of water bubbling on the range to replace whatever does boil away and escape in steam, as the jars must be well covered during the whole processing time.

Whatever vessel is used for a canner as described above

LYNN SAYS:

Use These Tips For Fruit Canning
To help decide how many jars you'll need, use these figures as a guide. Two to two and one-half pounds of the following will give you one quart canned produce: apples, apricots, peaches and pears.

Heavy syrups give the most luscious packs in canned fruits. Use three or four cups of sugar to a quart of water. Bring to a boil and cook just until sugar is completely dissolved.

should also have a rack that keeps the jars off the bottom of the canner about one-half an inch. If you cannot buy a rack to fit, use jar lids, fitting these all around the bottom.

Use this Routine for Canning

THE SAME ROUTINE applies to all fruits, berries and tomatoes, the latter being included in this class rather than with vegetables since tomatoes are a acid like fruits instead of non-acid, as are vegetables.

Get together pint and quart jars as needed, and see that they have no imperfections such as cracks or chips off them. Check, also, to see that you have enough suitable covers as well as jar rings, if you are using the cap and rubber closure.

Fill the canner almost full of water—the jars will take up some room, so it does not have to be completely filled, and turn on the fire so the water can start to come to a boil as you work on the fruit.

Prepare the fruit with a thorough washing. Bacteria lodge in soil, and you want to get rid of this so that none will rub into the fruit as you pare or cut it.

Use the chart for preparing the fruit for jars. If you want excellent results, you'll grade the fruit for size and ripeness as much as possible when packing jars.

Fill one jar at a time to within ¼ inch of the top with both fruit and syrup (or, fruit juice or water, as desired). Run a spatula down the inside of the jar to remove air bubbles. Wipe top clean and put on the jar, as directed by the manufacturer.

Process and Cool Jars

AS EACH JAR is filled it should be placed into the canner, without touching or giving them a chance to bump against each other. When the canner is full, check to see there is enough water to cover jars thoroughly.

When water comes to a boil, start counting processing time. When time is up, lift the jars out on a folded cloth or several thicknesses of newspaper. Tighten those covers which need it, according to the type which you use.

Fruit or berries which you plan to use for pie or as juice for jelly can be canned without sugar. You'll add this when the fruit or juice is used.

The riper the fruit or berry, the less it will need in the way of sweetening. However, allow at least some syrup for sweetening the fruit as you'll need liquid for filling the jars.

Pick plums for canning just as they begin to ripen. If too ripe, they will be mushy. If too green, they lack flavor.

Poultrymen Are Advised To Purchase 'Quality'

"Good chickens can not be sold at a low price," G. S. Vickers, field manager of the Ohio poultry improvement association said in cautioning farmers to "buy on quality—not price."

Outlining a procedure to inspire wise chicken buying, Vickers said: "Investigate your local hatcheryman first. See if he has a careful and thorough pullorum disease control program. See if he obtains good breeding stocks; see if he keeps up the quality and constantly improves it by careful selection and the use of ROP pedigreed or other good breeding males from good brooders."

Summer Eggs Must Always Be Kept Cool, Odor-Free

The poor quality of summer eggs is not the fault of the hen. "Hot-weather" eggs, with their thin whites and flat, weak yolks cause many people to stop buying them.

This waste could be prevented, top poultrymen say, if farmers would gather eggs at least three times a day in hot weather. All handlers of eggs need to keep them cool at all times, and away from odors

Egg Preservation Methods Seen Due for Improvement

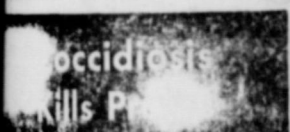
Present methods of preserving table eggs may be revolutionized by the use of a new compound developed by Dr. Alexis Romanoff and W. D. Yushok of Cornell's agricultural experiment station.

The compound, a mixture of a plastic substance called polystyrene, with chlorinated rubber and other chemicals, forms a film over the egg and preserves it at ordinary temperature.

Great Man's Faith

Lesson for July 30, 1950

NO MAN is too busy to serve God. He may think he is, but the excuse will not stand. There are too many busy men who do serve God. One of the most famous men in history is a shining example.

If ever a King was "too busy" to attend to religion, David would have been the man. His kingdom was a new one, cemented together from tribes that had been at one another's throats not so long before. He was surrounded by enemies who kept him at war most of the time. He was commander-in-chief of the army, chief justice of such courts as there were, chief executive in civic affairs; and furthermore, the times were not "normal" but turbulent in the extreme. Still he had time for religion. He led in that as in everything else.

Public Religion
THE first thing he did as king was to conquer the "unconquerable" city of Jerusalem, which had been in enemy hands for hundreds of years. And the next thing he did was to bring the Ark to Jerusalem and settle it there, making Jerusalem not only the civil but the religious capital of the nation.

In an almost spectacular way the king made himself sponsor for the organized religion of his people. For centuries before David, the Ark and all the formal worship that went with it had been stuck off in minor towns, inaccessible and unpopular, in fact disregarded by most of the people, as the book of Judges shows.

Now David, by bringing the Ark to Jerusalem and selecting for it a site on the city's highest hill, made sure that in his realm religion would never be an obscure thing. Sometimes we hear people say, "I believe in Christianity but not in the church." That is like saying, "I believe in justice but not in the courts." "I believe in love but not in marriage." "I believe in education but not in schools."

David knew that if organized, public religion has to hide in holes and corners, it will not only lose respect, but people will soon forget all about it. The Ark was not an idol; neither is the Church. But if the Ark then, and the Church now, do anything else for religion, at least they keep it out where people can't help knowing about it.

Private Religion
DAVID knew, as some of his successors did not, that public worship is not the whole of religion. His personal relationships were controlled by his religious faith. Take the case of Mephibosheth (chap. 9) for instance. If David had followed the usual pattern, he would have had poor Mephibosheth beheaded before breakfast. For this young man was the one remaining grandson (so far as we knew then) of David's bitter enemy, King Saul.

In those days you always went on the principle that if a man was your enemy, so were all his relatives. It was generally true, too; and under the customs of those days Mephibosheth might have been expected to plan revenge, sooner or later, for his grandfather's and father's deaths.

David did not let him sink into obscurity but gave him what we would call a pension, a princely one too, treating him as if he were one of his own family.

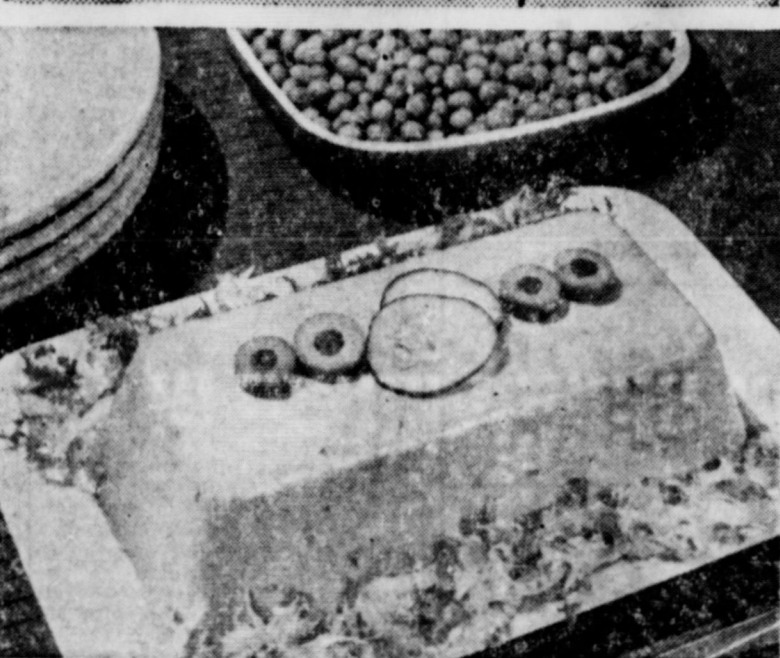
The Inner Life
WELL, religion has its outside but it also has its inside. Public worship and loving your neighbors are not the root of religion but its fruit. The roots of it are deep within the soul. And David had that true faith which comes from within.

He was humble, not proud, as Psalm 24 shows. Great king though he was, he knew there is only one King of Glory. He was confident, as every leader must be; but his confidence was based not on himself but on his God. (II Sam. 22, which is re-written as Psalm 18.)

And when David sinned, as he shamefully did, he did not make excuses for himself or sink with easy satisfaction into his worst self. If to be a saint is to be without sin, then David was no saint (and you are one?). But if being a saint means that in spite of sin one comes to have the cleansing kind of experience that Psalm 51 records, then David was a man after God's own heart.

Serve Taste-Tempting Salads for Summer

(See Recipes Below)

Salad Days
THERE'S NOTHING quite so cooling as a jellied salad brightly garnished with crisp greens. There's nothing quite so delicious as well chilled fruit or vegetables attractively arranged on frosty looking lettuce, watercress or endive.

You can make a meal out of a salad that's protein-rich, or, if you prefer, you can combine both the salad and dessert course into a luscious fruit salad.

***Jellied Tomato Salmon Mold** (Serves 8-10)
 2 envelopes plain gelatin
 1 1/4 cups water and juice from salmon
 1 10 1/2-ounce can condensed tomato soup
 1 3-ounce package cream cheese
 1 tablespoon grated onion
 1 1/2-ounce can salmon, drained well
 1/2 cup mayonnaise

Soften gelatin in 1/2 cup water. Combine soup and remaining water; heat to boiling. Remove from heat. Add softened gelatin and cream cheese; beat with rotary beater until smooth. Cool. Add onion, salmon and mayonnaise. Pour salad into a greased 8 1/2 inch mold. Chill thoroughly.

Tomato Aspic Ribbon Loaf (Serves 8-10)
Layers 1 and 3:
 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
 3 1/2 cups canned tomato juice
 2 teaspoons onion juice
 1/2 teaspoon salt

Layer 2:
 1 1/2 teaspoons unflavored gelatin
 2 tablespoons cold water
 4 eggs, hard cooked and diced
 1/2 cup finely chopped celery
 1/4 cup finely chopped green pepper
 1/2 cup light cream
 1 teaspoon prepared mustard
 1/4 cup mayonnaise
 1/2 teaspoon salt

Layer 1: Soften gelatin in 1/2 cup cold tomato juice. Heat balance of cold tomato juice to a full boil. Add onion juice, salt, and gelatin. Stir until gelatin is thoroughly dissolved. Place half of mixture in a loaf pan (8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/2 inches). Chill until firm.

Layer 2: Soften gelatin in cold water. Place over boiling water and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add to balance of ingredients and mix well. Spread over first layer. Chill again until firm.

Layer 3: Pour remaining aspic over egg mixture to form third layer. (Soften aspic, if necessary, over hot water.) Chill again until firm. Unmold and garnish with salad greens. Slice to serve.

Fruit Basket Salad (Serves 8)
 2 avocados
 1 cup cottage cheese
 1 cup chopped pecans
 1 cup chopped ripe olives
 1 teaspoon minced parsley

Scrambled eggs, mixed with some grated onion, chopped green pepper and prepared horseradish, to which are added some bologna strips make a delicious and filling hot sandwich.

Pare avocados; halve. Fill halves with cottage cheese combined with nut meats, olives, parsley, and salt. Press two halves together; sprinkle with lemon juice. Arrange fruits on water cress. Pass Fruit Dressing: Combine 1/2 cup sugar or light corn syrup and four

teaspoons enriched flour; gradually add 1/2 cup vinegar. Cook over low heat until smooth and thick, stirring constantly. Add one teaspoon salt, two teaspoons paprika, one tablespoon onion, minced fine and two teaspoons celery seed; mix thoroughly. Pour 1/4 cup salad oil into mixture very slowly, beating constantly with rotary beater.

Party Chicken Salad (Serves 8-10)
 3 cups cubed, cooked chicken
 1 1/2 cups diced celery
 3 tablespoons lemon juice
 1 cup seedless grapes
 1 cup toasted almonds
 1 teaspoon dry mustard
 1 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon pepper
 1 tablespoon capers
 1/4 cup light cream
 1 cup mayonnaise

Combine chicken, celery and lemon juice. Chill one hour. Add grapes and almonds. Combine remaining ingredients. Add to chicken. Toss. Garnish with slices of hard-cooked egg.

Cool Sea-Food Platter (Serves 6)
 1 7-ounce can tuna
 1 cup crab meat
 2 cups shrimp
 2 tablespoons French dressing
 1 cup diced celery
 1/2 cup diced cucumber
 2 tablespoons chopped radishes
 1 tablespoon capers
 2 tablespoons lemon juice
 1/2 cup mayonnaise
 Salt, pepper, paprika

Flake tuna and crab meat. Remove black line from shrimp. Marinate tuna, crab meat, and shrimp in French dressing 15 minutes. Combine with remaining ingredients. Arrange all in lettuce-lined salad bowl. Garnish with additional shrimp, water cress, and lemon wedges. Hostess serves from salad bowl. Pass more mayonnaise.

Grated American cheese mixed with chopped green pepper, diced onion, chopped hard-cooked eggs, stuffed olives and seasoned with catsup makes a good mixture to spread on buns. Broil until cheese bubbles.

Sauteed, corned beef hash makes a hearty luncheon sandwich when served on toasted, buttered bread or buns. Spread the hash with tartar sauce and top with lettuce and another piece of bread or top half of the bun.
