Board Orders Integration

At the regular July meeting of the O'Donnell School Board last Thursday, the Board voted to integ-rate the dual school system beginning this fall term, Tuesday, Sept. 4th. Previously on June 1st voters of the school district voted 112 to 87 to give the school board authority to integrate.

Supt John Criner estimated that cost the local school district over \$10,000 a year to operate the Negro school. To open the Negro school this fall would have taken an additional \$15,000 for repairs. The annual net saving to the school is roughly \$15,000. Such savings would employ from 2 to 3 ADDIT-IONAL teachers out of LOCAL. of all races supervised baseball rewould employ from 2 to 3 ADDIT-IONAL teachers out of LOCAL funds. The State allots teachers funds in proportion to average daily attendance of the past year.

To maintain our being accreditated the State Educational Agency warned the District that EQUAL facilities must be available. Most farm workers are now cov ered by the social security law. In order to determine if the work on your farm must be reliaw provides certain be reported, guidelines. Generally if you employ a person to do farm work and pay him as much as \$150 cash wages in a year, or if he works for you 20 or more days for cash wages figured on a time basis, hourly, daily, etc. you mus. make a social security tax report. John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock Social Security Office, pointed out that there is a question in he minds of some farmers concerning tax reports for crew leaders and crew members.

The crew leader is the employer of any crew of workers he furnishes to do farm work and pays sufficient wages (either for himself or for you, the farmer). If he brought a crew to your farm, it is his responsibility to keep a record of the name, address and social security number of each crew member who works enough to meet the \$150 cash wage or 20 day test mentioned above. He should wishold 3 1-8 percent tax from the pay of each such worker and match it with the employer's 3 1-8 percent when he files his tax report at the end of each calendar We would like to thank all our friends who were so kind during the illness and death of our mother, for the prayers, food and every word of kindness. 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
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

FCOD POISONING CAN BE

Almost as quickly as you can say "please pass the potato salad" a tiny, microscopic speck of bacterial life can make a shambles of that great American summer time instit-

Called straphylococci -- "staph" Called straphylococci -- "staph" for short -- these pernicious bits of living matter are said by health authorities to be by far the most common cause of food poisoning.

About the picnic -- if you are careless in preparing the food, staph may invade and multiply in items on the bill of fare. The ham, for instance, or the chicken salad, or the creamed filled layer cake In or the creamed filled layer cake. In a matter of hours, once eaten, they

can turn a strong man into a cramp-ed, tormented weakling. But it is easy to prevent this fin-wrecking development: simply keep the foods chilled between the time of preparation and service, and serve as soon as possible. State health authorities are quick to point out that staph caused food poisoning isn't limited to summer nor to picnics but can occur whenever conditions are right regardless of the time or place. Conditions are more apt to be right during summer when outdoor eating is in vogue and staph can team up with heat and lack of refrigeration to spoil food.

As a point of academic interest, it is not the organisms themselves that do the damage, but a toxin oroduced by adult organisms. Adnittedly, the point is of little containing to the wrung out victim but it does provide a clue to prevent

ing other cases.

Staph germs are so widely distributed in nature -- in no e and in throat secretions, in exudate of boils and carbuncles, on skin and clothing, in the very air - that there is little chance of avoiding them completely

The best thing is to keep them from getting in the food to begin with, by washing hands thoroughly before preparing food. Also if you happen to have a boil, pimple, infected scratch, or a runny nose, it would be smart to leave the food preparation to someone else.


