Something of a record rainfall, least ways so far as intensity, was measured last Tuesday at about 5 p.m. when a thunderstorm netted 1.45 inches of rain in 15 minutes. The total storm lasted about 40 minutes and reached a total of 1.60 inches according to Ben Moore, Sr.

A combination of wind and rain damaged the roof of the Ellis Chevrolet Co. to an estimated \$2,000 in extent. A section of roof some 20 by 50 feet caved in. The wind accompanying the storm front was rather brisk.

Rain fell so rapidly in the storm that the index office and the Burger Bar suffered some invasion from the flood waters. The storm was confined to the general area of the town. Total rainfall to date has been 16.53 inches. Normal is 18 inches per year.

The stomach, the experts say, is largely controlled by the involuntary nervous system. You get keyed up, your stomach over-secreted, and you feel the pain.

Actually, the Department points out, there are many directly traceable causes of indigestion. Lack of sleep or exercise, improper diet, and similar artificial conditions can bring it on.

You've heard the old saw about one man's meat being another man's poison. It's literally true. Even healthful and nutritious foods may rub you wrong. They contain organic acids which upset the balance of your particular stomach.

Your favorite fruit may contain malic-acid, oxalic-acid, or citric acid. One or more of these may give you trouble, causing ungentlemanly or unlady-like belching.

Or the degree of ripeness of a fruit or vegetable may cause fermentation in the stomach, bringing on unpleasant results.

Condiments or strongly flavored foods are other causes of indigestion. They often cause the stomach to secrete too much hydrochloric acid. In normal people the stomach neutralizes what it over-secreted, but people with ulcers suffer painful "indigestion."

Greasy foods are particularly troublesome to people with malfunctioning gall bladders or liver diseases.

Tannic-acid can be found in three of the most commonly used hot drinks. And here's the last straw: Even water, if you drink lots of it, may start your stomach churning and pouring out its digestive juices.

NOTICE OF ELECTION TO BE HELD WITHIN THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS. ON THE QUESTION OF THE ISSUANCE OF REVENUE-SUPPORTED BONDS OF CANADIAN RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY.

TO ALL QUALIFIED VOTERS WHO RESIDE IN THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS, AND WITHIN THE CANADIAN RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY THEREIN AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held on the 8th day of November, 1955, within the CANADIAN RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY, comprised of the cities of Lubbock, Borger, Lamesa, Levelland, Plainview, O'Donnell, Slaton, Brownfield and Tahoka, Texas, in compliance with resolution and order duly enacted by the Board of Directors of said Authority on the 12th day of September, 1955, and which resolution and order is a part of this Notice, being in words and figures as follows, to-wit:

"RESOLUTION calling an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1955, in the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority as now constituted to contain the cities of Lubbock, Borger, Lamesa, Levelland, Plainview, O'Donnell, Slaton, Brownfield and Tahoka, Texas for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said Authority who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation the question of whether or not the Board of Directors shall have the authority to issue the revenue supported bonds of said Authority in the principal sum of \$74,800,000; prescribing the voting places for said election; designating the presiding judges of said election; prescribing the form of ballot to be employed in said election; and enacting other provisions incident and relative to this resolution."

WHEREAS, heretofore the cities of Amarillo and Pampa, Texas, have been eliminated as member cities of the Authority pursuant to the provisions of applicable law; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Dir-

ectors of Canadian River Municipal Water Authority has determined upon the construction of certain facilities for the purpose of providing a source of water supply for the remaining member cities of the Authority (the cities of Lubbock, Borger, Lamesa, Plainview, O'Donnell, Levelland, Slaton, Brownfield and Tahoka, Texas) and other users for municipal, domestic, industrial and other useful purposes permitted by law, to-wit: A dam and reservoir on the Canadian River at Sanford, Texas; a water purification plant; pumping stations, pipe lines or aqueducts; and other works and facilities designed for the purpose of impounding, processing and delivering potable water for the aforementioned purposes in accordance with plans heretofore adopted as contained in a report of the Authority's engineers; and

WHEREAS, this Board finds that the aforementioned plans have been filed in the office of the Secretary of the Authority as well as a report of the Authority's engineers covering the plan, plants, facilities and improvements to be purchased and constructed, together with maps, plats, profiles and data fully showing and explaining the same, which report is open to inspection by the public; and

WHEREAS, the aforesaid engineers report contains among other things a detailed estimate of the cost of such improvements and an estimate of the time required to complete same so that service therefrom can be commenced; and

WHEREAS, by resolution previously passed, approving the aforesaid engineers report, this Board has determined that the sum of \$6,800,000 shall be added to said engineers cost estimate; and

WHEREAS, a summary of said engineers estimate of the cost of said facilities and improvements including the cost of property to be purchased, as shown in the report aforesaid, and the additional sum of \$6,800,000, aforementioned, which this Board has determined should be added to the engineering cost estimates to cover any further items of expense in connection with the aforementioned construction including any additional cost or expense on account of any change or modification made by the Board in the proposed work, is as follows:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF CANADIAN RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER AUTHORITY:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 8th day of November 1955 for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the question of the authorization of \$74,800,000 revenue supported bonds of the Authority as follows:

"SHALL THE Board of Directors of Canadian River Municipal Water Authority be authorized to issue the revenue supported bonds of said Authority in the maximum principal sum of SEVENTY-FOUR MILLION EIGHT HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS \$74,800,000 to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed Fifty (50) years from the date thereof, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FOUR PER CENTUM (4 per cent) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; for the purpose of providing a source of water supply for the Authority's member cities and other users for municipal, domestic, industrial and other useful purposes permitted by law, by the construction of a dam and reservoir on the Canadian River at Sanford, Texas; a water purification plant; pumping stations; pipe lines or aqueducts; and other facilities necessary for impounding, processing and delivering potable water; said revenue bonds to be special obligations of the Authority payable solely from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the revenues derived from the Authority's facilities after deduction of reasonable operation and maintenance expenses?"

SECTION 2: That for the purpose of the aforesaid election the area and boundaries of the Authority shall include all lands located within the defined corporate limits of the cities of Lubbock, Borger, Lamesa, Plainview, O'Donnell, Levelland, Slaton, Brownfield and Tahoka, Texas, as of the 27th day of May, 1953, being the effective date of Chapter 243, Acts of the 53rd Legislature at its Regular Session in 1953, creating the Authority.

SECTION 3: The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the general laws of the State of Texas, except as otherwise provided by the aforesaid Act creating the Authority.

SECTION 4: Each of the cities of Lubbock, Borger, Lamesa, Plainview, O'Donnell, Levelland, Slaton, Brownfield and Tahoka, Texas shall constitute separate election precincts and each voter shall vote in the city of his or her residence.

SECTION 5: The aforesaid election shall be held at the voting places below indicated, it having been determined that the said voting places confirm as nearly as conveniently possible with those customarily designated as voting places in the respective cities. Said polling places and the presiding judges thereof are as follows:

(a) In the City of Borger, Texas, the polling places and presiding judges of said election shall be as follows, to-wit:

Central Fire Station, G. V. Moses Weatherly School, Earl E. Carley

(b) In the City of Brownfield, Texas, the polling place and presiding judge of said election shall be as follows, to-wit:

Lee Brownfield

(c) In the City of Lamesa, Texas, the polling place and presiding judge of said election shall be as follows, to-wit:

W. T. Webb

(d) In the City of Levelland, Texas, the polling place and presiding judge of said election shall be as follows, to-wit:

Gene Aycock

(e) In the City of Lubbock, Texas, the polling places and presiding judges of said election shall be as follows, to-wit:

No. 1 Carroll Thompson Junior High School, R. F. Bayless

No. 2 O. L. Slaton Junior High School, Wyatt Hester

No. 3 Dunbar High School, George Woods

No. 4 College Avenue Fire Station, C. B. Minor

No. 5 J. T. Hutchinson Junior High School, Ray Chapman

No. 6 Zenith Avenue Fire Station, Bruce Barrier

No. 7 Lou Stubbs School, H. A. Tuck

(f) In the City of O'Donnell, Texas, the polling place and presiding judge of said election shall be as follows, to-wit:

City Water Tax Office, J. M. Noble

(g) In the City of Plainview, Texas, the polling place and presiding judge of said election shall be as follows, to-wit:

City Auditorium, W. J. B. Gouldy

(h) In the City of Slaton, Texas, the polling place and presiding judge of said election shall be as follows, to-wit:

Office of the Board of City Development at the City Hall, Phil Brewer

(i) In the City of Tahoka, Texas, the polling place and presiding judge of said election shall be as follows, to-wit:

J. M. Small

The presiding judge of each polling place aforesaid shall appoint the necessary assistant judges and clerks required to assist in holding such election.

SECTION 6: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.S. Election Code, adopted by the fifty-second Legislature in 1951, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE PLEDGE OF NET REVENUES FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF"

"AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE PLEDGE OF NET REVENUES FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF"

As to the foregoing proposition, each voter may mark out with black ink or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition; or, in the alternative, each voter may vote on the proposition by placing an "X" in the square

appearing on the ballot beside the expression of his choice.

SECTION 7: In the event the said revenue bonds are authorized to be issued by a majority of the qualified electors of said Authority, voting at said election, and if same are issued and sold, the holder or holders of such bonds shall never have the right to demand payment thereof out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation; and each bond issued or executed in pursuance of such election, shall contain this clause:

"The holder hereof shall never have the right to demand payment of this obligation out of any funds raised or to be raised by taxation."

SECTION 8: The election officers from each of the polling places hereinabove designated shall make return of said election in triplicate to the Board of Directors within five (5) days, one to be retained by the Presiding Judge, one to be delivered to the President of the Authority, and one to be delivered to the Secretary of the Authority. The ballot boxes and other election supplies shall be delivered to the Secretary of the Authority at his office and be preserved in said office as provided by law.

SECTION 9: That at said election only qualified electors who reside in the Authority and in several cities above mentioned, and who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote. Any person appearing to vote and who is not known to the election officers to be a qualified voter and tax paying property owner, as herein stipulated, or if his vote is challenged, he shall be required to subscribe and swear to the following oath:

"I DO SOLEMNLY SWEAR (or affirm) that I am a qualified voter and a property taxpayer in the Authority. I did not acquire property prior to this election for the purpose of voting, but am a bona fide property taxpayer in the Authority."

SECTION 10: The Secretary of the Board of Directors is hereby authorized and directed to give notice of the aforesaid election by publishing a substantial copy of this resolution, or notice containing the same, signed by the President and attested by the Secretary in a newspaper or newspapers of general circulation in each city contained in the Authority, on the same day in each of two consecutive weeks, the first of said publications to be made at least twenty-one (21) full days prior to the date fixed for said election; said publication in the manner aforesaid shall constitute proper notice of said election.

SECTION 11: That all revenue bonds herein presented are to be ratably secured in such manner that no one bond shall have priority of lien over any other bond, it being the intent hereof to provide for the creation of an indebtedness against the Authority's facilities for the purposes herein stated, and such bonds, if approved by the qualified voters, voting at the election herein and hereby ordered, are to be issued in one or more installments. The aforesaid revenue bonds are to be special obligations of the Authority payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the net revenues derived from the Authority's facilities. As used herein the term "net revenues" shall be understood to exclude any money derived from taxation but to include all income and increment which may grow out of the ownership and operation of the Authority's improvements and facilities less such proportion of the Authority's revenue income as reasonably may be required to provide for the administration, efficient operation and adequate maintenance of its facilities.

PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED: this 12th day of September, 1955.

**STATE AND COUNTY TAXES
 ARE DUE**
 All 1955 State and County taxes
 and poll taxes are due on Oct. 1st
 and are payable at the County Tax
 Office, according to Tax Collector
 J. E. (Red) Brown.
 Three percent discount will be
 allowed on all State and County
 taxes paid during the month of
 October. Poll taxes are \$1.75 of
 which \$1 goes to the schools, 50c
 to the State and 25c to the County.
 A person who becomes 21 years
 of age before Jan. 1, 1955 and a
 person who was not 60 years of
 age before Jan. 1, 1955 must have
 a poll tax to be eligible to vote.
 There are some exemptions. A
 person who becomes 21 years of
 age after Jan. 1st, 1955, is exempt

EYES COME FIRST
 If Johnny should come home cry-
 ing, "Mon, I got something in my
 eye!"—what would you do?
 The sensible thing would be to
 follow this 3-step procedure re-
 commended by the State Depart-
 ment of Health for just such emer-
 gencies:
 Lift the upper lid and pull it
 down over the lower lid. This will
 allow the tears to wash out the
 offending speck. Tears are nature's
 own eye wash.
 If this doesn't work, wash the
 eye with drops of luke warm tap
 water, using an eye dropper and
 holding Johnny's head so the water
 will flow away from the nose, to-
 ward the side.
 If the speck still doesn't dis-
 lodge, bandage the hurt eye lightly
 to prevent Johnny from rubbing it,
 and take him to a physician.
 "Remember," the Department
 cautions, trying to rub the speck
 loose can cause infection that may
 scar the cornea, resulting in par-
 tial blindness.
 Ever heard someone remark
 their eyes were "simply worn out"?
 That's sheer nonsense, says the
 Department. It's impossible to wear
 out healthy eyes by overuse.
 Then why do your eyes feel
 strained? It could be because you
 need glasses or are wearing im-
 properly fitted glasses. Or it could
 be that you are failing to follow
 the rules of good lighting and
 proper eye use. Or the strain could
 be due to an eye or body disease.
 Under correct conditions, you
 should be able to use your eyes as
 much as you want to without
 strain. Healthy eyes give the best
 and most comfortable service when
 you sit erect with your work
 arranged at 45 to 70 degrees from
 the horizontal and from 14 to 16
 inches from your eyes. Tilt-top
 desks or book easels are best for
 children.

WIDOWS MAY BE DUE MONEY
 A considerable number of wid-
 ows and young children of working
 people who died between June 1949
 and September 1950 have failed to
 claim the monthly benefits payable
 to them under a 1954 change in the
 social security law, announced John
 G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock
 social security office. Those who
 do not apply for their benefits be-
 fore October 1, he pointed out,
 will not be able to receive benefits
 for all months back to September
 1954, the effective date of the new
 provision in the law.
 Under this provision, it is now
 possible to pay monthly social se-
 curity to the qualified survivors
 of workers who died between June
 1949 and September 1950 if the
 deceased wage earner had credit
 for as little as a year and a half
 of work under social security. The
 families of many of these workers
 applied for benefits at the time of
 the family breadwinner's death, Mr.
 Hutton said, but were told that
 they could not receive payments
 because under the law, as it stood
 then, the worker had not earned
 enough social security credit to
 provide survivors benefits for his
 family.
 "Announcements of the change
 in the law were made in all news-
 papers, in pamphlets, and on radio
 and television," Mr. Hutton said,
 "and many persons have applied
 for these benefits since September
 1, 1954"
 Where a claim for social security


benefits is filed within 12 months
 of the time a beneficiary is first
 eligible, his payments can be made
 to him retroactively for the whole
 period, Mr. Hutton pointed out.
 But if a claim is delayed for more
 than 12 months, benefits for some
 months will be lost. He therefore
 urged the survivors of workers
 who died between June 1949 and
 September 1950 to get in touch
 with their nearest social security
 offices before Oct. 1, 1955. Quali-
 fied claimants who apply before
 that date can be paid benefits back
 to September 1954.
