If you have not had an audit made recently of your physical assets and liabilities, go to your doctor now and have it done is the advice of the State Health Officer to all grown-ups in Texas. It is quite as important to check up on your physical resources as it is to look intto the state of your financial possessions. By regular care under your physician's direction, you can conserve your physical assets and avoid the accumulation of destructive liabilities.

Each of us starts with a certain amount of physical capital. Merely as a business proposition, it worthwhile to conserve it to the best of our ability. In infancy and childhood our physical resources, as a rule, are safeguarded for us. As we grow older, the responsibility for doing so rest upon the individ-ual. The critical period may come in middle life with the sudden realization that the physical capital is yielding diminishing returns in the way of physical well being. A large number of the deaths reported each year in Texas is due to the degener-ative diseases of middle age. Nearly all of these diseases have

slow beginnings, and their onset can often be recognized in the course of a thorough physical exam ination before they have gained serious headway. In the majority, early detection of menacing conditions with a readjustment of physical example the serious head of the serious and a better hudger. al expenditures and a better budget ing of activities, under a physician's direction, will help to shift the balance from unfavorable to the favorable side of the ledger.

#### Farmers' May Retire

In a previous article in this series we told you about farm workers and self-employed farm ers coming under social security many for the first time—on January 1, 1955. Beginning then earnings for farmers and farm hands will be counted under Social Security. But no doubt many of you are wondering what you are "buying' when you pay your social security taxes. You are buying oldage and surviyors insurance; that In a previous article in this age and survivors insurance; that is, when your earnings stop because of your death or because of your retirement at age 65 or lager, payments will be made from the fund you helped build up, and will be made to you and your dependents, or to your survivors. Here are the tpes of benefits:

1. RETIREMENT PAYMENTS
(1) Monthly payments to you as a retired farm hand or farm-

er.
(2) And monthly payments to a. Wife, age 65 or over. b. Child under 18.

c. Wife, regardless of age, if caring for child entitled to

benefits.
d. Dependent husband.
SURVIVORS' OR DEATH PAYMENTS.

(1) Monthly payments to your-a. Widow, age 65 or over. b. Widow, regardless of age, if caring for child entitled to

benefits. c. Child under 18.

d. Dependent widower, age 65 or over. e. Dependent parent, age 65

or over.

(2) Lump-sum payment to youra. Widow or widower, or
b. To the person who paid bur-

b. To the person who paid burial expenses.

Benefits for a retired worker run from \$30.00 per month to \$108.50 per month, depending on the amount of your past earnings from employment of self-employment covered by the Social Security Act. Family benefits may run as high as \$200.00 per month. 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




