FIRST GRADERS MUST HAVE PROOF OF AGE

Parents have their hands full remembering all the things needed for a child beginning school for the first time. But one item they should put on their list is a birth certificate. This word comes from W. D. Carlin, state registrar, whose vital statistics staff at the Texas State Department of Health is responsible for handling the flood of requests for birth certificates for children entering school for the first time in September. Many parents tend to put off requesting copies of their youngsters' birth record until the last moment, resulting in a heavy work overload. The vital statistics staff, despite long hours of night and week end work, can process just so many requests before school begins.

More than 270,000 children are expected to enter elementary schools of Texas for the first time this fall. The estimate is based on calculations made by the Texas Educational Agency. A good many parents, some of whom may have waited too long in past years, have already requested and received birth records on this year's new scholars but tens of thousands of additional records will have to be processed between now and the first time that first school bell rings in September. More than one youngster has been forced to postpone his first days at school simply because his parents couldn't produce proof of his age when it came time to register for him.

All you have to do is give the child's name and place of birth, the mother's maiden name, and the name of the father. This information, with the necessary fee, should be addressed to the local county clerk or to the State Department of Health, Section on Records and Statistics, 416 East 5th St., Austin, Texas. Centerville folks had been too busy helping the boy's dad, S. A. Brewster, pay the hospital and the doctors to think about toys for the small lad. They had already raised about \$300 for medical expenses and \$40 to buy James some clothes.

After his sighing remark about not playing again, James went up town with his sister, Mary Dean, 12. He wore a neat sports shirt, blue jeans and new shoes. His sister bought him a soft drink and held the bottle while he sipped. Then they went home.

Upon arrival, they found the toys that the people of Centerville had been too busy to buy before. James was so happy that he declared he would learn how to play all over again.

Free Speech Issue In Court Proceeding

LINCOLN, Ill.—Free speech was the issue here in a contempt of court case in which nearly 600 persons faced possible fines and jail sentences.

The defendants, many of them members of a reform group known as the "Good Government Council of Logan County," were cited for contempt for petitioning Circuit Judge Frank M. Bevan to replace a state's attorney in a case involving the prosecutor's friend.

Judge Bevan said the petition contained "odious, defamatory language concerning an official of this court," State's Attorney Edwin C. Mills.

Members of the Good Government Council contended Judge Bevan could not hold them in contempt and said if the prosecutor felt he was defamed by the petition he could sue them in a civil court.

The case arose when, as a result of action taken by the Good Government Council, Justice of the Peace Vincent Jones was charged with illegal diversion of funds collected in overweight trucking fines. Mr. Jones was charged with perjury, embezzlement and malfeasance.

The council followed up the case with a petition asking that Mr. Jones be replaced by a special or assistant prosecutor.

Most Drinking Starts Before College Days

NEW HAVEN, Conn.—Four out of every five college men who drink began their drinking before entering college, a researcher at Yale University's laboratory of applied physiology reported recently.

Robert Straus, research associate, disclosed for the first time preliminary results of a five-year study into the drinking habits of American college youth. This study was made by Mr. Straus and Selden D. Bacon, director of Yale's center of alcohol studies.

Of the American women students who drink, 65 per cent also started drinking before entering college, Mr. Straus said.

"The probability that a young person will drink at all," he continued, "is closely related to the practices of his or her parents."

"Of the men whose parents both drink, 90 per cent are themselves users. However, only half of the men (51 per cent) whose parents both abstain, drink."

"Where both parents are users, 83 per cent of the women drink on occasion. However, when both parents abstain, only 19 per cent of the women students drink."

He declared that parental advice on abstinence seems to be much stronger than advice from either church leaders or teachers.

Family income is a large factor "closely associated with the probability that one will use alcohol. Among those whose family income is under \$2,500, two thirds of the men and only 30 per cent of the women students drink."
