

Voting Strength Is Close To 3,500

Lynn county's voting strength in the upcoming Democratic Primary election on Saturday, May 7, is between 3,200 and 3,400, figures furnished The News by George McCracken, tax assessor-collector, indicate.

This would include 700 to 900 people over 60 years of age who are exempted, plus the 2,491 who have qualified by paying a poll tax or registering and under-age exemptions.

There were 2,163 who paid poll taxes, 61 under-age exemptions who qualified, and 267 who registered to vote under the conditional registration period.

Following is the voting strength by precincts, not including over-age voters, No. 1 column being poll taxes, No. 2 under-age exemptions, No. 3 those registered under free vote provision, and No. 4 the total (without over-age exemptions):

I believe in good roads and good county government and I am for anything that will benefit the county.

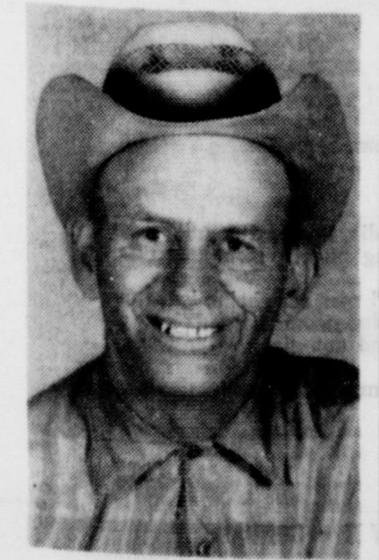
If elected, I will always use the funds available to the best of my ability for Precinct 2.

Heavy Vote Is Expected In Primary Election Saturday

(From Lynn County News)

Lynn county voters, as well as those over the state, go to the polls this Saturday to select a number of officials to serve the next four years in state, district, county and precinct positions.

Although there are several state contests, principal interest locally is in three county-wide and four precinct races.

With County Judge Walter M. Mathis retiring from his office to run for district clerk, which office will be vacated in January by W. S. (Skip) Taylor, V. F. Jones and Woodrow (Ode) Brewer are candidates for county judge.

Mr. Brewer is a native of Lynn county, a farmer, served in World War II, and has been commissioner from Precinct 2 for 12 years.

Mr. Jones is also a farm product, a graduate of Texas A&M, taught school several years, served as county agent of Lynn and Lamb counties a total of 10 years, and returned to Tahoka in 1944 to enter the grain and seed business.

There are two candidates, also, for county clerk, the present incumbent, C. W. Roberts, who lived at Grassland many years before assuming the duties of the office, and Mrs. Billie Carr, a widow, who has been county home demonstra-

tion agent of Lynn county.

For county treasurer, there are five candidates, four ladies and a man. The man is L. A. Forsythe, who is a farmer, has lived here most of his life and has had experience as a bookkeeper. The ladies, in order of making their announcements, are: Mrs. H. W. (Margaret) Carter, formerly in the insurance and cotton business with her husband; Mrs. Teddie B. Kelley, formerly of O'Donnell, a secretary and presently assistant county superintendent; Mrs. Jessie Jewel Stevens, store clerk and former long-time manager of a dry goods store; and Mrs. Frances Schneider Hughes of Wilson, who also has had experience as a secretary and bookkeeper.

Four men, all farmers, are running for County Commissioner, Precinct 2, all well known and respected citizens of the precinct. They are Gus Sherrill, Willis Pennington, Marvin E. Pierce, and Dorman L. Gandy. Mr. Pennington once before served as commissioner of the precinct.

In Commissioners Precinct 4, the present incumbent, L. K. (Heavy) Nelson, is opposed by B. A. Young, a farmer near Tahoka.

For Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, which centers at Tahoka, E. A. (Lefty) Hargrave and D. F. (Boss) Hanes are the candidates.

At O'Donnell, Justice of the Peace Precinct 4, the present incumbent, Horace Brunette is being opposed by Mrs. Elsie Mae Jackson.

Local candidates unopposed include Truett Smith, for district judge; W. M. Mathis, for district clerk; Jerry D. Cain, for county attorney; and J. P. Hewlett, for county school superintendent.

Little State Interest

There has been little interest shown locally in state-wide races.

Governor John Connally, and Lieutenant Governor Preston Smith are in no apparent danger from their opponents, and Land Office Commissioner Jerry Sadler's opponent, Fred Williams, is not too well known.

Wagoner Carr, present attorney general, is running for U. S. Senator and is opposed by Jack Willoughby of Harris county, but he is expected to win the Democratic nomination and then make his big bid against Senator John Tower.

For Attorney General, Crawford C. Martin, Franklin Spears, and Galloway Calhoun are engaged in what may be the only close race for a major office.

Candidates for Railroad Commissioner are Byron Tunnell, Paul B. Haring, and P. S. (Puss) Ervin.

For Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, W. T. McDonald is opposed by Jack Onion of San Antonio.

All other state and district candidates are unopposed.

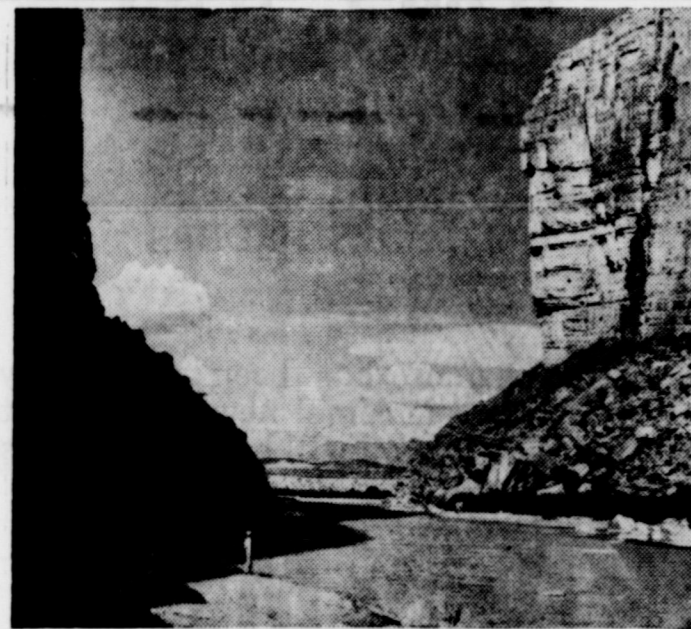
