





We hear some unfavorable criticism, usually of an involved nature, of the fact that the consumer must pay the bill for the degree of reemployment that will produce industrial recovery. Occasionally a critic, who perhaps has not become adjusted to very materially changed conditions in our country, will leave the impression that this obvious fact constitutes some sort of unjust discrimination against a particular class of citizens.

Let us consider a moment: Just as many industrialists have come to a realization during the past few weeks giving the public the benefit of our that the workers they laid off cannot continue as their customers and that they in fact had been their customers: so also the man from whom we buy food_stuffs, furniture, automobiles, radios, clothing, and anything else of the innumerable products we sorely need to buy, is also a consumer. He likewise must buy his supplies from others. The manufacture is not only a consumer of ram materials in his plant, but he is a consumer of all that all of us consume away from his plant.

So a little deduction brings us to the realization that when we say the consumer must pay the bill we actually mean that every American citizen and resident of American territory must carry his share of the increased costs incident to reemployment and business and industrial recovery.

Certainly no clash is discriminated against. All are in the same boat,

Last week we gave some of the reasons why we can not expect to raise both turkeys and chickens on the same ground. To continue the turkey discussion at this time is still in line as evidence by the questions still being raised with us

by the various turkey raisers. For the past several years the turkey area has been steadily advancing west because of the worm and diseases that cause that needed change of grounds.

So many people want a positive remedy for Blackhead that its importance is great. There has been many laboratory tests made of this trouble, none has been found that will work on repeat trials. The infection seems to live for long periods on the range and in the poultry yards and may break out at any time the condition become right. The cecum or pin worm is the opener for the diseases, and these are always present in chickens. They attack the walls of the cecum and in this injured tissue the organism causing so-called blackhead does its deadly work. Sooner or later the man who runs turkeys with chickens will be forced out by this little worm. When turkeys are kept seperate from chickens and free from cecum worms, there is little danger from the disease. It is the raising of turkeys with chickens year by year that drives the turkeys furthes west each year. But the Pacific has a-

course is that little blind gut or rather there are two of them. No medicine will cure it. Good feed and quick isolation of affected birds may help keep down the spreading.

During this hot dry weather most all green stuff is gone from the range and the turkeys are still hunting food so they take to any dead rabbit or any other putrid food in reach and that is the cause of limberneck. Keep any dead flesh from the range. Give a tablespoon of castor oil to each affected bird and most will be saved.

Crooked breast will always be a debatable subject it seems but the reason is rather simple. It is caused by faulty feeding. Good strong stock free from worms and fed a ration of at least 5 pounds of bone meal and 3 to 4 pounds of oyster shell per 100 pounds of growing mash will prevent crooked breast. Sitting on the ground does not have any thing to do with it. It is the strength of bone that counts. If a bone bent so much as to cause the breast to stay bent the turkey would be aware of the fact and change positions all during the night just as they do any way. Most turkeys and chickens

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
