NEW LAW WOULD HELP ALL

Proponents of one of the Constitut ional Amendments to be voted in the General Election Nov. 6th claim that its passage will save the taxpayers money. The proposed amend ment would allow Commissioners Courts to reallocate the amounts Commissioners levied for their four regular oper-ating funds: General Fund, Jury Fund, Permanent Improvement Fund and Road and Bridge Fund on an annual basis. Now the amounts that can be levied for these funds are fixed by the Constitution and cannot be changed except in re-

allocation every six years or oftener. The porposed amendment guarantees that the total tax rate could not be raised, for it sets the same maximum as now provided, 80 cents on the \$100 valuation.

No private business could long operate well if it had to guess six years in advance on its fiscal operations. Adoption of this amendment would free the counties to operate on a more efficient, business-like

The people, by adopting this amendment, therefore, can save in two ways: First, their Commissioners Courts will be given the opportunity to operate their fiscal affairs in a modern way which will make for economy, and Second, they will save the cost of expensive reallocation elections every few years.

### CHANGAS DISEASE IS BEING STUDIED

State Health Department lab. personnel this week launched a three year study of Chagas disease, a rare but potentially dangerous disease entity in Texas,

Dr. Holle said the study is being supported by a \$10,000 research grant from the National Institute of Health. It will run an stimated three years. The study will concern the entire state but will be mostly confined to Gulf Coast regions. Only two human cases of the disease have ever been reported in the nation - one from Corpus Christi and one from Houston, Both occured last year Why more cases haven't developed has long been a matter of puzzlement since six species of the transmitting bugs in Texas have been found to be naturally infected. The disease is transmitted by various species of reduviid or triatoma bugs commonly called kissing bugs, giant bed bugs, blood suckers, or assassin bugs. The malady has been of considerable concern in regions of Central and South America for many years. The infection is transmitted in the de-jecta of infested bugs. The reservoir of the causative organisms, known as trypanosomes, are such mammals as wood rats, house mice, armadillos and oppossums. Children most often have the disease.

TWO MAIN TYPES OF APPENDICITIS

All of us at one time or another have pain and cramping in the abdomen. Fortunately, most of these pains are unimportant. However, if the pain persists it should not be ignored. It may be the beginning sign of appendicitis, a disease which, althou far from being simple, is easily and safely cured if surgery can be performed in time, says Dr. Henry Holle, Commissioner of Health,

There are two main types acute and chronic. Acute appendicitis strikes suddenly and is usually marked by severe pain that generally grows sharper and stronger. Occasionally the pain may let up or stop entirely but this must not be taken to mean that the attack is over. In fact, it may be a warning signal that the appendix has ruptured, thus lessening the localized pain, while more serious condition, peritonitis usually gets a start. Other usual signs of acute appendicitis are slight fever, nausea, vomiting and tenderness over region of the appendtx. Chronic appendicitis just what the name implies; it comes and goes. But it may, at any time, become acute. It results from acute attacks that have been mild enough to subside without an operation. Symptoms in general are the same as in the acute type but they are also similar to other ad-verse abdominal conditions.

### SOWING AND REAPING

There are many factors that determine, to a large extent, the outcome of a farmer's labors; and many of these factors are beyond his control. However, there are two laws that govern completely the results of his labor, and over these he has absolute control. The first of these laws state: "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." The farmer is well acquainted with this law, and he knows that he must plant cotton seed if he is to reap a crop of cotton. The second law states; "He that soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly." The farmer is also well acbusinted with this law. He knows that too few seed will result in a poor harvest; therefore, he plants as many seed per acre as the fertility of his soil will permit. He does not limit his harvest by sowing an insuf-

These laws of nature are easily understood by everyone, how-ever, many people fail to realize that these laws are also operative in the spiritual realm. Paul states: "He that soweth unto his own flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth unto the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap eternal life." (Gal. 6:8) The law of sowing and reaping in the spiritual realm is just as immutable as the law of sowing and reaping in the natural realm. We reap what we sow. Many professing Christians sow continually unto the flesh, and some of them are actually expecting to reap the fruit of the Spirit from the seed of fleshly desire. Such a thing is as impossible as reaping corn from cucumber seed! If we expect to reap the fruit of the Spirit, we must sow the kind of seed that will bring forth that fruit.




