Bids Asked For Mail Service

A new mail service from Tahoka to O'Donnell may be inaugurated within a short time providing suitable bids for carrying of such is received by February 13, according to a statement made Thursday by J. Mack Noble, postmaster here.

No definite time for starting the mail route is contained within the notice, but it is proposed that the mail shall be carried from Tahoka to O'Donnell each day except Sunday—one way, first class mail only.

Service will not be let for a stated period, so Noble says, and no written contract with bond is necessary. This service will be subject to all postal laws, however. No person under 16 years of age will be allowed to enter bids.

A bidder not living on, or contiguous to the proposed route, shall file with his bid an agreement to do so in an envelope sealed and marked "Proposal for Mail Messenger Service" with the name of the bidder written on the outside and handed to the postmaster.

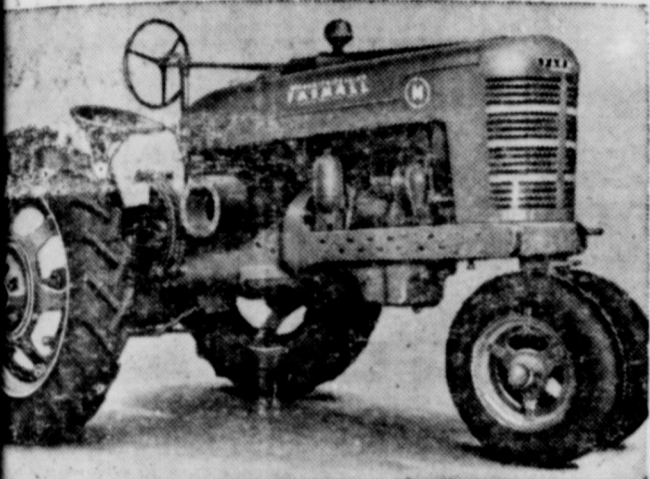

Aten registered in Phoenix, Arizona, where he was employed temporarily, but he gave his home as Tahoka, Lynn county, and was transferred back here.

These four will be inducted into the service in Lubbock on next Monday, February 10, from which point they will be sent directly to a training camp, presumably at Fort Bliss.

The local board has also received notice that another call for seven men, whites, will be made on February 28. Up till Wednesday only one man had volunteered who will

be available on this call. A number of the previous volunteers did not pass the medical examination.
 The last man to volunteer is Jason Glenn Holcomb of Tahoka.
 Those who are selected on this call will be inducted here and sent direct from Tahoka to Fort Bliss, El Paso, according to Mrs. McMahon, clerk of the local draft board.

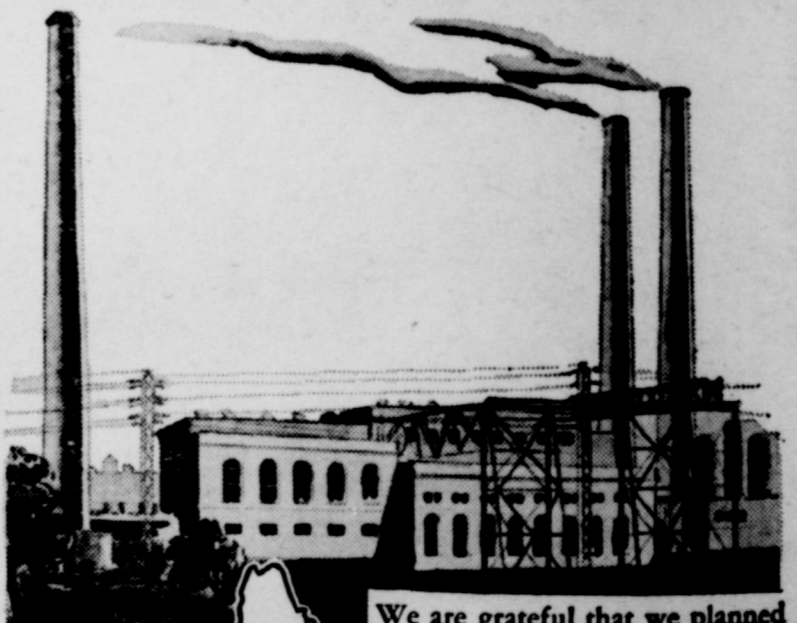
