Economic Outlook For 1966 Is Better

College Station—Taking all factors into consideration, the year ahead should be one of vigorous and generally well balanced economic growth. That's the word from John G. McHaney, Extension economist at Texas A&M University.

The economist has just returned from the National Outlook Conference held in Washington, D. C., with facts and figures to back up his forecast.

There will be increases in total employment and consumer incomes, he says. The gross national product is expected to continue upward at a rate in line with the increase of the past year.

Increased private investment in new plants and equipment; larger government purchases of goods and services; and further expansion of consumer expenditures are expected to make their contributions to the advance.

McHaney sees no great changes in residential construction nor in the net exports of goods and services.

Estimates now indicate that industry will spend \$55 billion for plant equipment in 1966. This is \$4 billion higher than estimated capital spending in 1965 and more than \$10 billion over 1964.

Nitrogen Tests Grain Sorghums

A new series of off-station soil fertility tests conducted by Texas A&M University scientists should show if there are grain sorghum yield differences between fall or spring applications of nitrogen.

Test plots will be in Deaf Smith and Parmer Counties and on the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center, at Bushland. Each plot will receive three different rates of nitrogen applications and each rate will be applied at five different times.

The three rates are 80, 120 and 160 pounds of nitrogen per acre.

The scientists will be comparing the yield differences of applying the nitrogen before shredding, after plowing, after listing, after irrigation and in an early side dress. They also hope to learn how fall applications affect decomposition of crop residue.

Personnel at the Bushland Center and at the South Plains Research and Extension Center, near Lubbock, will conduct the study in cooperation with county agents and local farmers.

Harvey Walker, of the South Plains Center, says if there are insignificant yield differences between fall and spring applications, more nitrogen applications could be made in the fall. This would ease the spring rush for both farmers and fertilizer dealers.

The South Plains Research and Extension Center has been conducting off-station fertility tests for 12 years. This year they had plots in 20 locations representing every major soil type in the area.

Rural Aid On Water Offered

More than a million people in rural America may benefit from an expansion in financial support

for rural community facilities and family farms authorized by recent legislation, L. J. Capplaman, Farmers Home Administration State Director for Texas said today.

Private investors will provide the bulk of the funds on an insured basis through USDA's Farmers Home Administration.

The legislation signed into law by President Johnson on October 7.

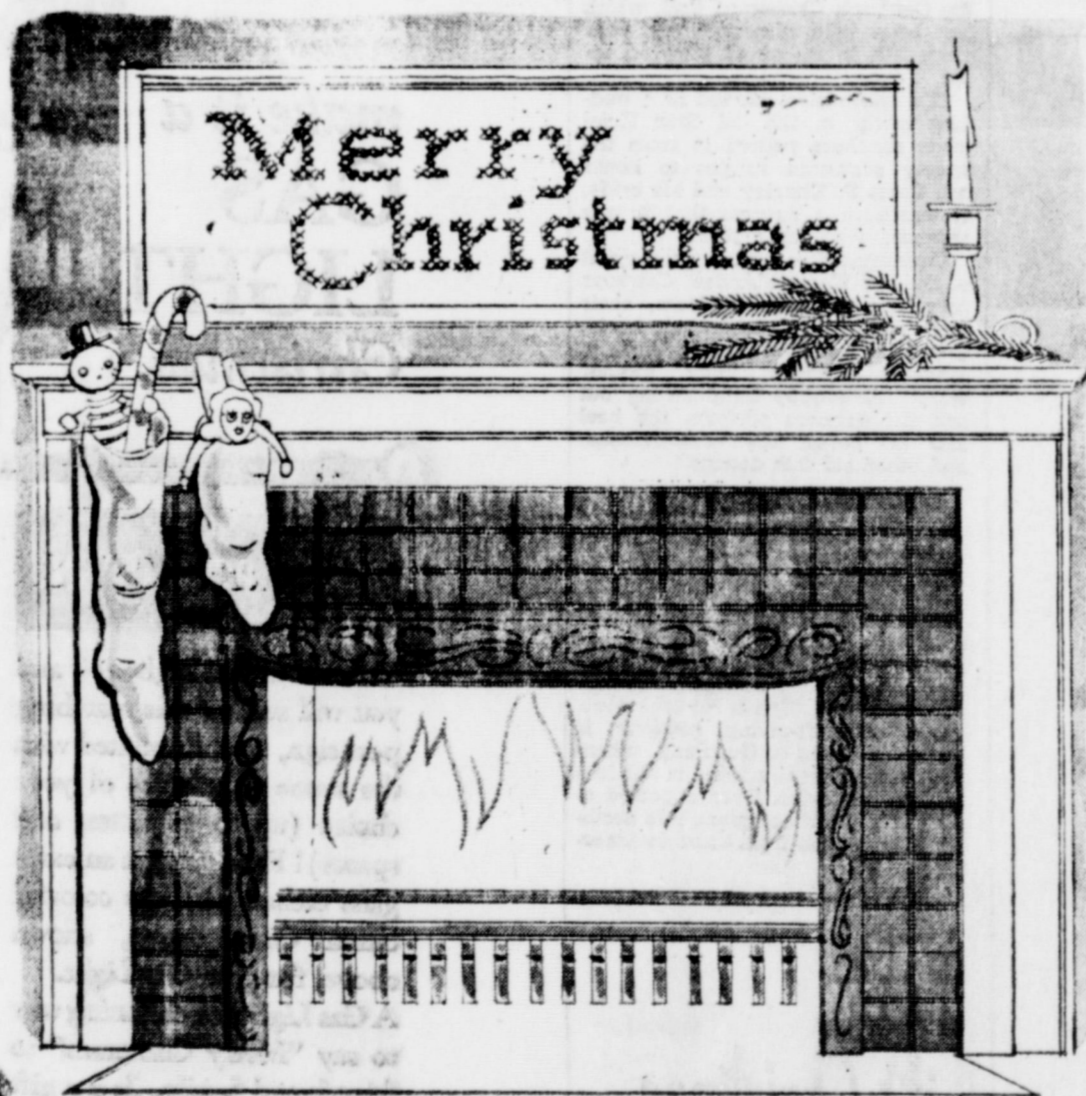

STATE AND COUNTY TAX PAYMENTS GOOD

State and county tax payments have been unusually good, although very slightly behind last year, according to George McCracken, county tax assessor and collector. About 65 percent of the roll has already been collected.

December is the last month during which a discount will be given. Three percent discount was allowed for payment of taxes in October, two percent for November, and one percent for December. Taxes become delinquent after Jan. 31.

Total collections through November have been \$170,582.04, compared to \$171,701.97 for the same period last year. By early payment, taxpayers received discounts totaling \$5,157.08.

Payments dropped off considerably in November, however, only \$11,246.94 being paid during the month of the \$170,582.00 total.

Broken down, a total of \$27,174.73 has been paid in state taxes, \$137,718.26 in county taxes, \$1,062.81 in Water District taxes for a total of \$175,739.12 before discounts.

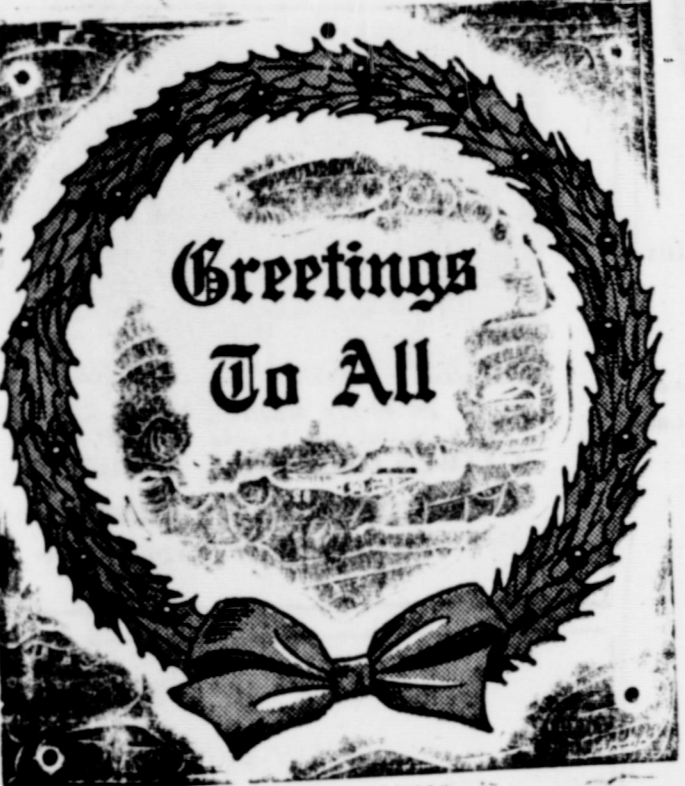
Origin of Symbolic Tree Shrouded in Old Legends

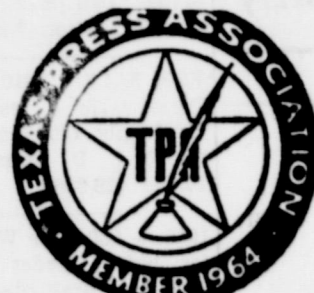

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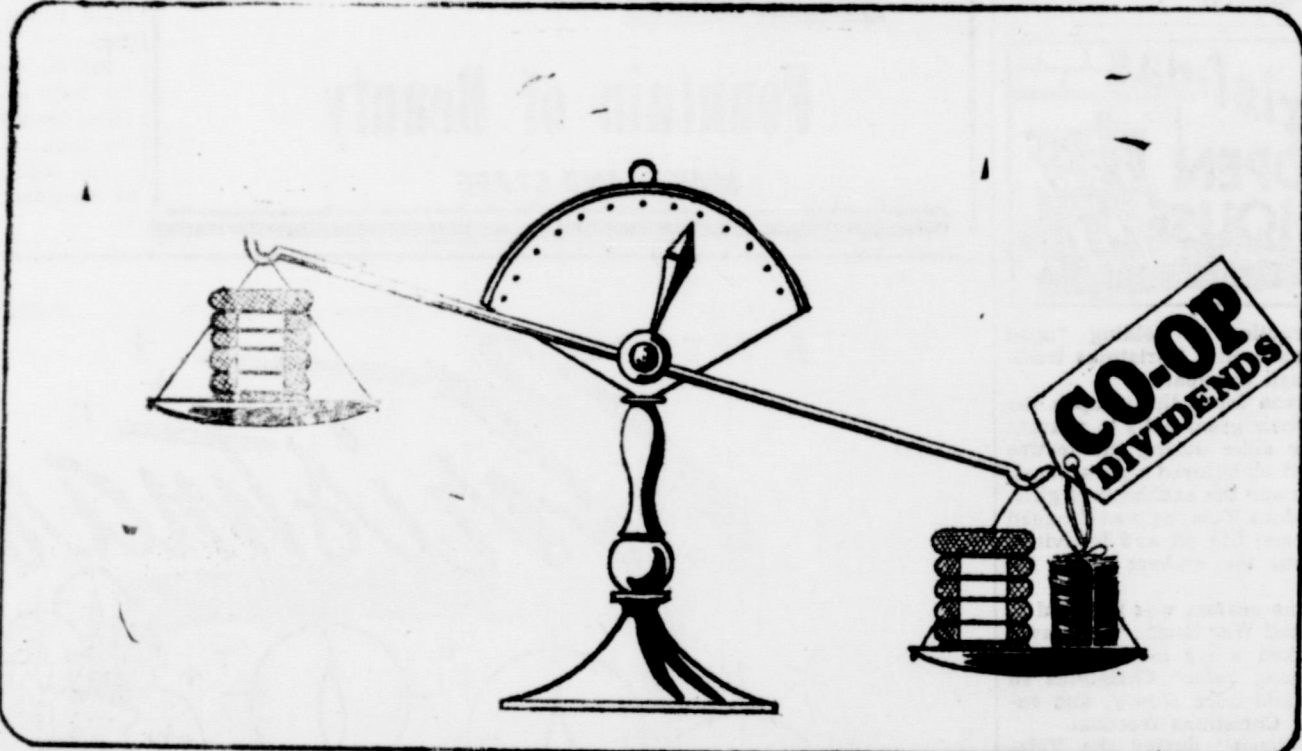

Basic coverage is automatic, but supplementary coverage, if desired by the person, must be signed-up for at a premium of \$3.00 per month.

Below are some of the highlights of the program furnished The News by County Agent Bill Griffin and the local Committee on Aging. For further information, see the Social Security representative at the Lynn County court house on the first and third Monday mornings at 9:30 o'clock.

Basic Coverage

Hospital Care: Full coverage after the first \$40 for up to 60 days in each period of illness; coverage for up to 30 additional days, for which patient pays \$10 a day. Psychiatric care is included for up to 60 days in each period of illness, with a lifetime limit of 190 days.

Nursing Home Care: Post-hospital care for 20 days in each period of illness at no cost to patient, plus 80 additional days.

Home Nursing Care: Up to 100 visits by nurses or technicians in each period of illness at no cost to patient.

Outpatient Service: 80% of hospital diagnostic service costs after the first \$20 for each diagnostic study period of up to 20 days.

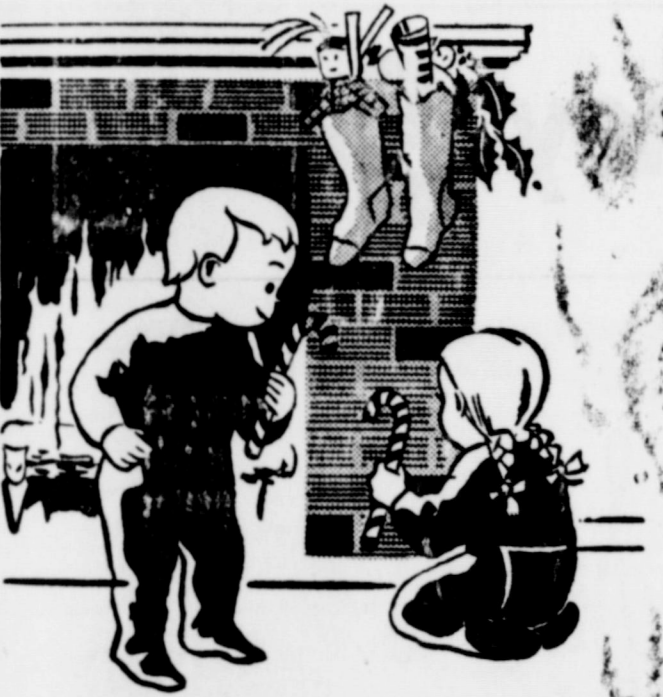

Deadline Is Set On GI Insurance

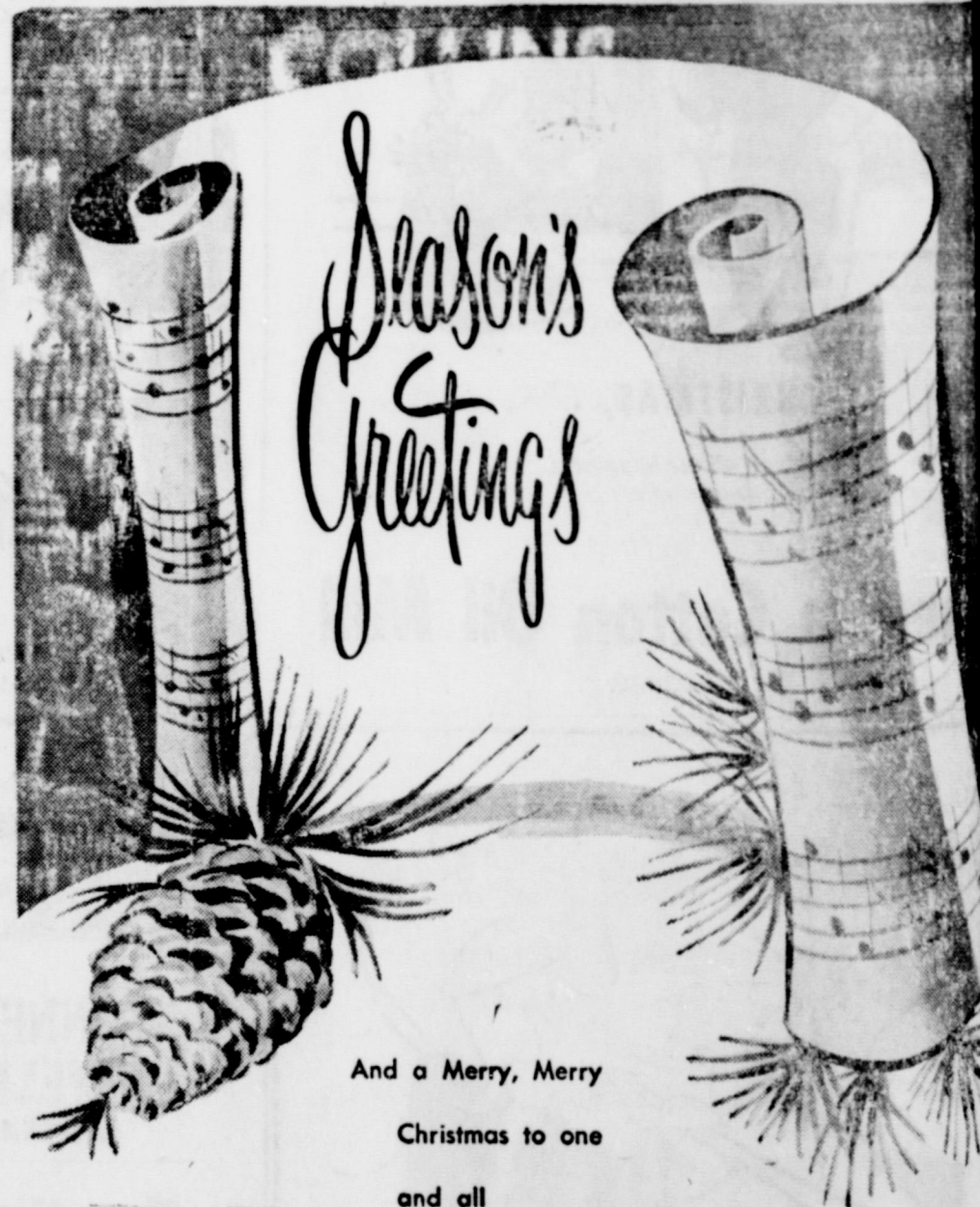
