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FLIES CARRY MANY

Domestic flies are suspected of playing an inportant role in the spread of filth diseases due to their indiscriminate movement from hu man and animal excrements to hu-man foods. Recent studies in the Lower Rio Grande Valley by the U.S. Public Health Survice and the State Department of Health have shown a significant reduction in cases of bacillary dysentery by ap-plying effective fly control mea-

Included among the domestic flies are the house fly and numer-ons species of blow flies and flesh The house fly is by far the most important species which enter

House flies develop prolificanly in animal excrements, although any warm, moist organic material will support some breeding. The length of time from egg to adult is depen-dent upon such factors as availa-bility of food and the temperature. During summer eggs hatch in 8-12 hours; the larvae feed for 5-8 days; and 2-3 days are spent in the pupal or resting stage. In Texas, fly breeding occures throughout the year, although at a reduced rate during the winter in the northern half of

House flies live for a month or two during warm weather and for longer periods during winter if protection from extreme cold is found. Adult house flies have been shown to be capable of flying 10-12 miles but are believed to do so if favorable breeding sites are more acces-

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

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
