Last Saturday at noon some 600 farmers and town people enjoyed a delicious barbecue dinner as guests of the O'Donnell Co-op held at the Grade School cafeteria. The meal was prepared by L. D. Jackson.

At the meeting of the stockholders which followed the lunch, W. A. Skinner gave the address of welcome. The auditor's report was made by Hugh S. LEAF WORMS HEAVY IN THIS AREA

Light to heavy rains fell over a part of this area during the past few weeks. Falls were sufficient to aid the late cotton in many local fields. The will tend to produce excess moisture in the soil of plants in many big fields. Such growth of plants will make the crop more susceptible to late season insects. The pest which is the only insect which has been reported in this area is the leaf worm. The larvae of this insect are in the process of hatching and will be in the field in a few days. Heavy leafworms have been reported in the Dawson, Gaines, Garrettsburg and Lynn counties. Interest thereon, financial and in medium infestation of the area is being reported. The State of Texas has authorized the necessary funds to be expended for the purpose of eradicating the pest.

FLIES CARRY MANY DISEASES

Domestic flies are suspected of playing an important role in the spread of filth diseases due to their indiscriminate movement from human and animal excrements to human foods. Recent studies in the Lower Rio Grande Valley by the U.S. Public Health Service and the State Department of Health have shown a significant reduction in cases of bacillary dysentery by applying effective fly control measures.

Included among the domestic flies are the house fly and numerous species of blow flies and flesh flies. The house fly is by far the most important species which enters homes.

House flies develop prolifically in animal excrements, although any warm, moist organic material will support some breeding. The length of time from egg to adult is dependent upon such factors as availability of food and the temperature. During summer eggs hatch in 8-12 hours; the larvae feed for 6-8 days; and 2-3 days are spent in the pupal or resting stage. In Texas, fly breeding occurs throughout the year, although at a reduced rate during the winter in the northern half of the state.

House flies live for a month or two during warm weather and for longer periods during winter if protection from extreme cold is found. Adult house flies have been shown to be capable of flying 10-12 miles but are believed to do so if favorable breeding sites are more accessible.

Fly control is the responsibility of private citizens as well as cities.

It is essentially a matter of maintaining adequate sanitary conditions, with the use of insecticides being strictly a supplementary measure. Chemicals are of little value in abating flies when they are produced in enormous quantities in favorable breeding media.

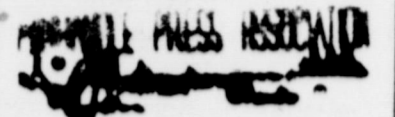

TEXANS ARE RAISING FEWER CHICKENS

Austin - Chickens raised on Texas farms this year were estimated at 14 million by U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. The figure was about half the 1946-55 average and off about 25 percent from the 18 and half million raised in 1956. The trend has been downward since '49 except for last year. The price outlook for broiler and egg producers looks brighter.

New S. S. Setup Given

More than 100,000 disabled workers all over the Nation have been notified that they are entitled to social security disability insurance benefits and will receive their first benefit checks during August, Mr. John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock social security office announced today. Most of the checks will be delivered August 3 and the remaining ones will be mailed on following days.

In making this announcement, Mr. Hutton noted that action is being taken as speedily as possible on all disability applications and that many other disabled workers, who may not yet have received notice of final action on their applications, will be receiving their first checks in coming months. No further action is necessary on their part, he said.

All disabled workers who meet the requirements of the law, and whose applications have been filed with their social security offices before the end of December 1957, Mr. Hutton said, will get benefit payments for the months of July through December. After December payments cannot be made for any month before the month of application.

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the legislation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows:

"Section 49-c. There is hereby created an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called 'Texas Water Development Bonds' and shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law.

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams; for all usual and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board, income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

development Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1952, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds, except that such moneys as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

Turkey flocks infested with external parasites will require extra feed for finishing and are sure to be discounted at market time, warns Extension Poultry Husbandman Ben Wormell. He urges turkey producers to make regular checks of their flocks and to keep them free of parasites.

Fish can't live without oxygen. At this season of year, says Ed Cooper, extension wildlife specialist, oxygen depletion in farm fish ponds often causes fish to die. Cooper suggests that fish pond owners secure from their local county agent a copy of B-213, Farm Fish Ponds, for information on summer pond management.
