City/Area Tournament Sign-Up Is Underway

Now in its second week, the Muleshoe area clean-up is in full swing, and all over Muleshoe you can see home owners, residents, and businesses busy cleaning up, painting and in general, brightening up 'their own corner.'

The vacation home is on Screamer Mountain, just outside of Clayton. Your balloon came to rest on the side of a mountain ridge, at the edge of the forest. My wife and I were walking down the mountain (to buy an ice cream cone) when we

found your balloon. The altitude at that point is approximately 2500 feet above sea level.

Texas Producers Urged To Apply For Conservation Award Program

Farmers and ranchers utilizing practical soil and water conservation methods in their operations may be eligible for a \$1,000 cash prize and an all-expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. in a nation-wide conservation recognition program according to Texas Farmers Union.

The initial step toward ultimate selection of three \$1,000 national winners will be taken in early June, when state nominees are selected in Texas for the National Conservation Awards program.

The annual awards program is designed to reward producers who are pioneering conservation methods, and to publicize the effectiveness of such techniques.

The program is sponsored nationally by the National Endowment for Soil and Water Conservation, and the DuPont Company. Coordinating the Texas program is the Texas Farmers Union.

Chairman of the National Endowment, Emmet Barker, says, "The purpose of the awards program is to salute those farmers and ranchers who are implementing sound, innovative and cost-effective techniques. These outstanding farmers and ranchers deserve special recognition. Through this program, their conservation initiatives are brought to the attention of other agricultural producers and the public."

Texas producers have until June 1 to submit applications for designation as a "state nominee" in the program. The application consists simply of a letter not exceeding four pages explaining the conservation technique(s) utilized, the intent of the applicant to bring a major portion of his operation under improved conservation practices, a description of the type and size of the farming operation involved, and the name, phone number and address of the applicant.

The basic eligibility requirements

are: Nominees must be individual producers, partnerships, or family farm or ranch corporations, must derive a substantial portion of their income from their agricultural operation, and must agree, if selected as the state nominee, to allow their conservation techniques to be used as demonstration projects for the purpose of public information.

Mike Moeller, President of the Texas Farmers Union says, "The Texas Farmers Union feels honored to again have the opportunity to coordinate such a worthwhile program. We hope to increase public awareness to the contributions made by family farmers and ranchers to conserve our precious soil and water resources. Also, we want to give special recognition to individual farmers and ranchers who have made outstanding conservation improvements on their own operations."

The Endowment Technical Advisory Committee will review the conservation work of the 50 state nominees, selecting 10 national finalists on the basis of their accomplishments in soil and water

resource management and pollution abatement.

The 10 national finalists and their spouses will receive an expense paid trip to an awards ceremony, where they will receive official certificates of award. Three national winners will be selected from among the 10 finalists.

The National Endowment for Soil and Water Conservation, established June 1982, is a non-profit, privately funded, non-political organization dedicated to conserving natural resources and fostering a sense of stewardship of the land.



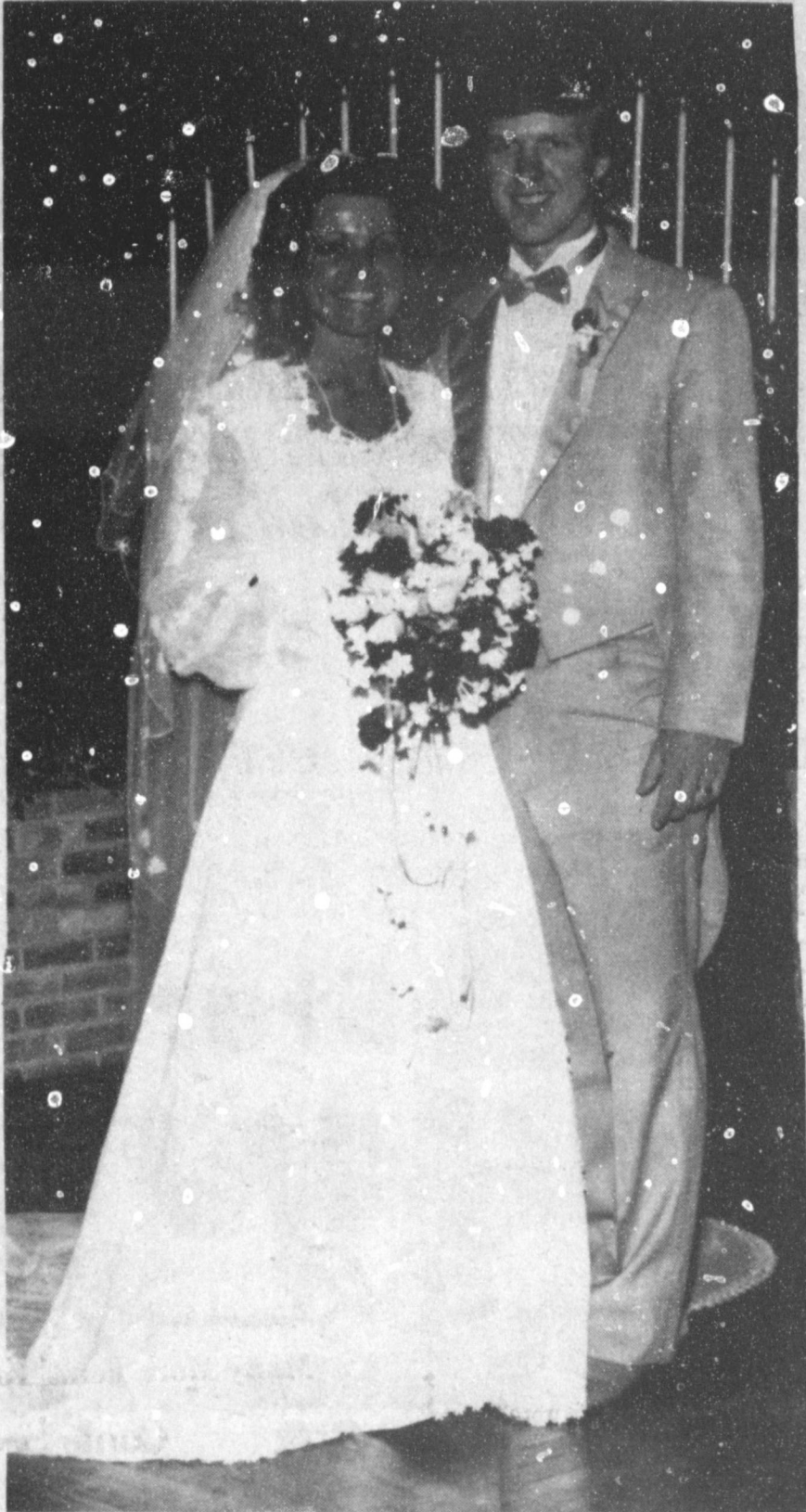

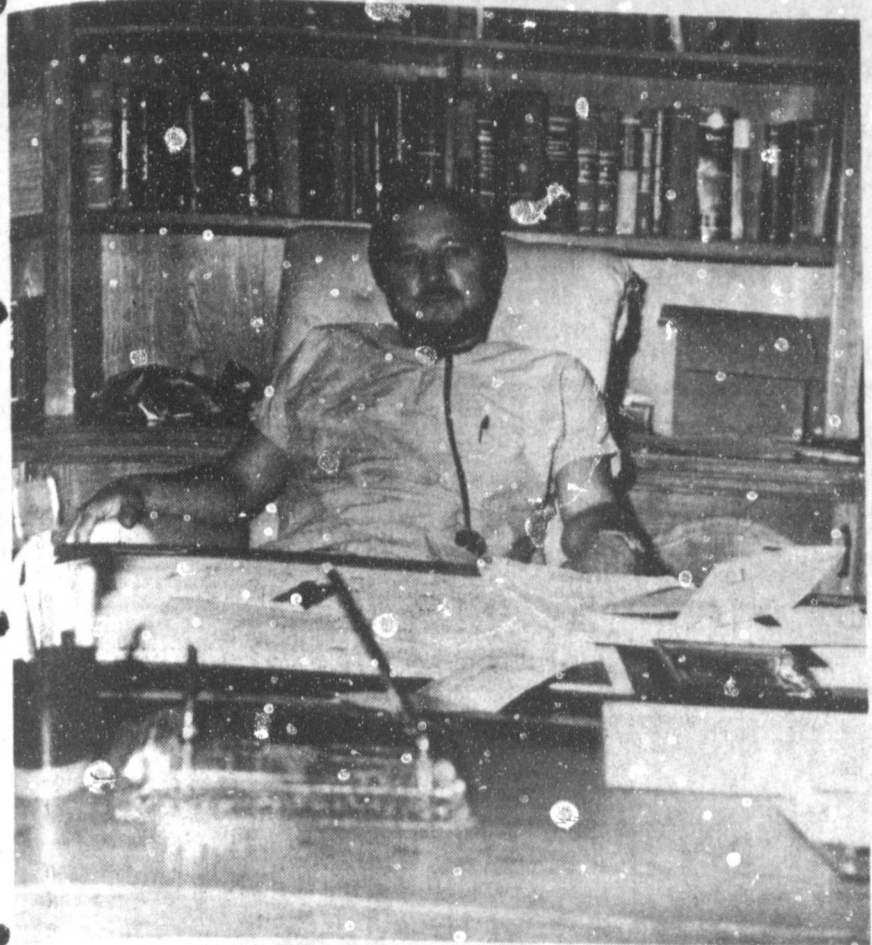

"I just want to take care of my patients, see my sick patients, and my pregnant patients," said the doctor.

He has very positive thoughts about Westword Community Healthcare, Inc. who took over operation of the hospital on January

"We need to have a good firm hospital, and good patient care," said Dr. Purdy, "and I feel the new group is our answer to our financial problems."

He believes Westworld has good plans for the future of the hospital and supports their efforts. A lot of changes have already been made, and other changes will be due in the future as Westworld begins to implement their long-range plans for West Plains Medical Center, and hopefully, will turn it into a hospital offering outstanding regional care.

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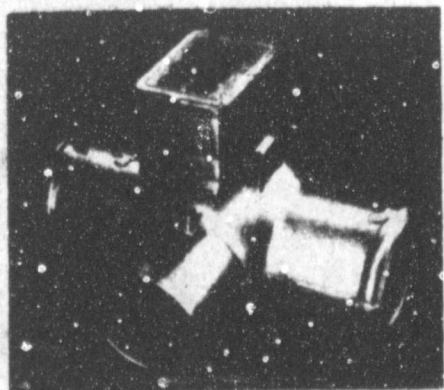
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Disability Claims By Appointment

The Lubbock Social Security Office has a new unit specializing in taking disability applications by telephone. This new unit operates on an appointment system that eliminates waiting time for disability applicants who have appointments.

The disability unit began operation April 1 and the people in the unit take all claims for all disability under Social Security and/or Supplemental Security Income (SSI) by appointment only.

About 50 percent of the total claims workload taken in the Lubbock Social Security office are claims for disability benefits. In the last six months, 1,218 disability claims have been filed in the Lubbock office. The average disability interview takes between 30 and 45 minutes.

There are five experienced claims representatives and two development clerks in this unit. The claims representatives act as the appointment clerk/disability information specialist on a rotating basis. When

you call or come in for an appointment that person can tell you what documents you will need for your particular case and can answer any questions you may have at that time.

Disability claims can be filed by telephone or in-office visits. Either way, an appointment will be made especially for you. The appointment time will be between the hours of 9:00 am and 3:30 pm, Monday through Friday.

Generally, you will need to furnish the following proofs at the time you file your claim: The last two year's W-2 forms, or income tax returns if you were self-employed. We will also need birth certificates of each eligible family as well as Social Security numbers: names, addresses and telephone numbers of doctors who

have treated you for disability in the last two years. If you are filing for SSI benefits you will also need to furnish your last bank statement and savings passbook, insurance policies, and current market value of any property you own jointly or solely, excluding the home in which you live.

The number to call for an appointment to file a disability claim is 743-7376.

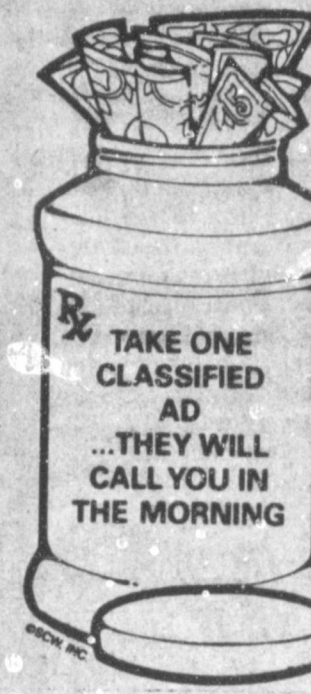

Wheat Check-Off Yields Big Returns

Though not a substitute for effective farm legislation, market development efforts, funded through state wheat check-off programs, have added an average of 31 cents per bushel to the price American farmers receive for wheat, according to a recent study by Chase Econometrics of Bala Cynwyd, Pennsylvania.

The study was undertaken for U.S. Wheat Associates, the international marketing arm of the Texas Wheat Producers Board and similar organizations in other wheat states, to measure the impact of market development programs on the U.S. wheat sector.

The preliminary results of the study were presented by Harry Barman, Director of Agriculture Services, Chase Econometrics, to the U.S. Wheat Associates Executive Committee during their recent meeting in Washington. Texas' USWA representative and Board member, W.R. Moore, Jr., Munday, and Robert Graves, Association President, Perryton, attended.

U.S. Wheat Associates' President, Winston Wilson, originally from Quannah, now world-wide Administrator, says that the study indicates that over the last thirteen

years, each dollar contributed by producers for market development purposes through their Boards and Commissions has returned \$100 of additional income to the growers from expanded wheat sales, and returns \$133 to the U.S. economy.

Texas Wheat Producers Board Chairman, Otis Harman, of Tulia, was also pleased with the results of the study, which was conducted since last August. "A thirty-cent-per-bushel higher price over what it would have been without any promotion is a significant return for the one half cent per bushel that Texas farmers invest in the program through the Texas Wheat Producers Board which operates now in only 34 counties of the Panhandle-North Texas area," he said. The Board is now in the process of conducting a state-wide referendum of wheat producers to expand the Texas level of funding and directing such activities.

According to Harman, the study will be very useful in guiding the direction of the wheat promotion program in the future, as it identifies those regions of the world where U.S. wheat farmers can expect the greatest returns from increased program expenditures.

U.S. Wheat Associates, headquartered in Washington, D.C., carries out market development activities through its 13 offices serving 90 countries around the world in principal wheat potential market areas. Primary funding is received from wheat Boards and Commissions in California, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Minnesota, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Texas, Washington and Wyoming, and matching funds are provided by the Foreign Agriculture Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Child Abuse Volunteers Praised By Gov. White

Governor Mark White today urged support for legislation to prevent child abuse and neglect and praised volunteers and two Texas corporations for their work to promote child safety.

"Last year, Texas child care workers confirmed almost 37,000 child abuse or neglect cases in our state. If we want to stop child abuse, we must emphasize prevention," Governor White said.

"We know that child abusers are often abused as children and that our prisons are filled with individuals who were victimized as children before they turned their anger

against society," the Governor said. "I believe there are steps we can take to end this tragic cycle."

Governor White said he supports legislation by Sen. Chet Brooks and Rep. Stan Schlueter that increases marriage license fees to raise money for a Children's Trust Fund to help underwrite the cost of community-based child abuse prevention programs.

The Governor said he supports requiring criminal background checks for those who operate and work in day care centers—a legislative proposal sponsored by Sen. Ted Lyon, Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos and Rep. Erwin Barton that authorizes similar background checks into employees of the State School for the Deaf and the State School for the Blind," Governor White said.

The Governor praised LDS-Long Distance Service for contributing a 24-hour toll-free crisis counseling telephone line to Parents Anonymous of Texas. "Once this number is operational, parents in Texas can call and discuss their problems with a trained volunteer. This service will offer parents and children one more important protection against child abuse," he said.

Governor White thanked Southland Corporation for producing

radio and television public service announcements on child abuse prevention narrated by Linda Gal White.

The Governor will sign a proclamation at 3 p.m. today designating April as Child Abuse Prevention Month in Texas. Members of 23 organizations will witness this signing and attend a two-day conference sponsored by the Texas Coalition for the Prevention of Child Abuse.

"Texas has a child abuse prevention movement we can be proud of, and I hope more Texans will volunteer to do their part," Governor White said. The governor's state budget proposed spending \$7.4 million in new federal funds available to Texas over the next two years to hire 65 additional child abuse investigators at the Department of Human Resources and to purchase additional treatment services for abused and neglected children.

The Governor's Office also provides the Runaway Hotline, the Communities in the Schools Program, and the Juvenile Justice Education Project—all of which target child abuse prevention efforts to those at greatest risk of becoming runaways or juvenile offenders.

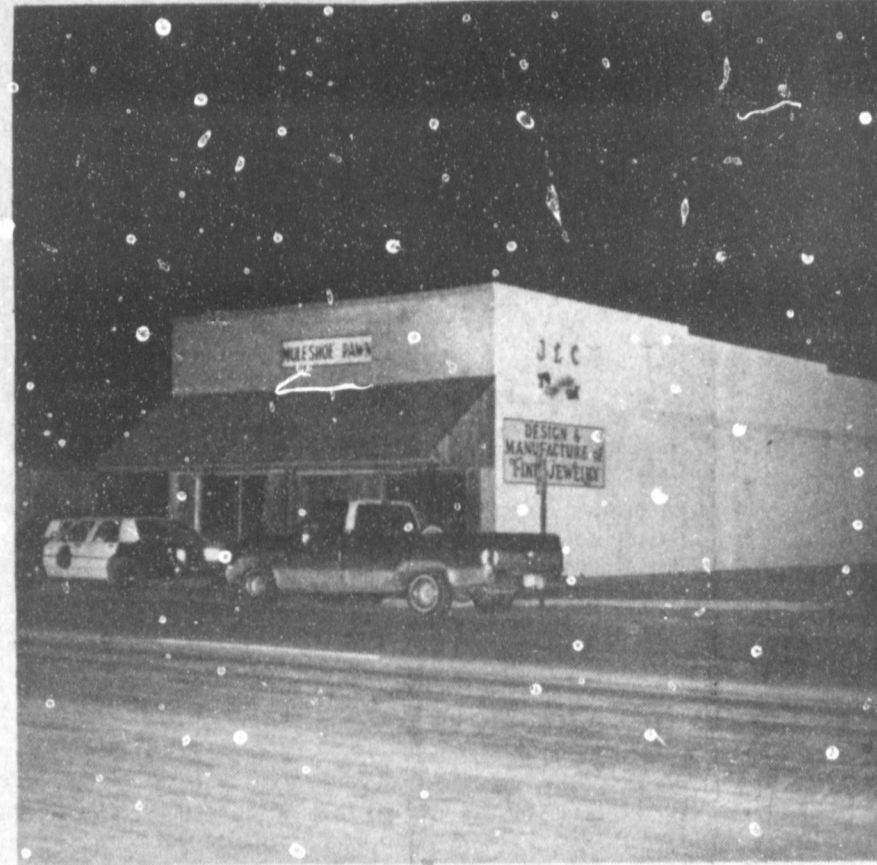
